By *Chloe Kneer* – Amazing things can happen when you provide the right atmosphere for children. Imagine seeing a child who is normally withdrawn, shy or fearful leading a group of others through a dance routine. Imagine experiencing the overwhelming sense of joy at watching your child smile from ear-to-ear for the first time while interacting with others. Or imagine witnessing your child displaying affection towards a sibling, or you, his or her parent, freely and without coaxing. For most parents these occurrences are part of everyday life. But for families who deal with autism or special needs on a daily basis, these often taken-for-granted gestures and behaviours are huge milestones to be treasured.

Last fall, Theresa Laurenti, along with Dennis Lendrum organized the debut of the Edge of the Box Theatre and Movement for Autism/Special Needs program in

Espanola Town Council Report

By Chloe Kneer – I took advantage of the terrible winter weather last Tuesday evening to stay home and try out the first online live stream of Espanola's Town Council meeting. I followed the link through www.espanola.ca, but found I had greater success obtaining the live feed through the YouTube app on my iPhone. The sound clarity and volume were good, so all in all, I was pleased not to have to venture out in a snowstorm to attend the regular meeting. The best part is that the videos are archived so if you miss them on council nights (the second and fourth Tuesdays of the month), or join the feed late, you can access them in their entirety at your convenience afterwards. There were two others watching along with me, I noticed, as YouTube informs you if others are also streaming live.

At this meeting, taxes and federal funding took up a lot of discussion. Council passed a by-law for an interim levy in advance of setting the town's final budget for 2017. The move allows for first tax bills to be prepared and mailed to residents (expected by the end of January).

As they did with the provincial government not long ago, council is following suit with other Ontario municipalities

in appealing to the federal government for long-term, predictable and formula-based funding to deal with asset management. Council feels that projects could be funded more readily and plans more concretely made if funding were dealt with in a more consistent manner.

By-laws were also passed to execute agreements with the Minister of Transportation (for dedicated funds for public transportation), OCWA (Ontario Clean Water Agency), H. Dodge Haulage (waste) and Neptune Technology for the installation of water meters on commercial properties.

During councillors' comments, Councillor Ron Duplessis again brought up the issue of a new fire hall, citing that a new truck should be purchased for the fire department in the next few years and a new building is probably the only option to house it. Deciding whether or not to table the construction of a new fire hall has been a back-burner issue for this council since taking office a little over two years ago.

The next regular meeting of council will be Tuesday, January 24 at 7:30 p.m. at the municipal office or online at www.espanola.ca, then click Town Hall, then Mayor and Council to access the live stream link.

Espanola. Donations for the eight week series came from Autism Ontario and from local organizations, businesses and individuals. "Without the generosity of our community, we never could have run a program as successful as the one we have," said Lendrum at the December 7 finale performance, during which the children, ages 6 – 16, presented to families and friends the routines they had been rehearsing for several weeks. Parents were amazed to see their children leading during drumming and dance routines, showing off art work that they had been carefully creating, and, more importantly, cooperatively interacting with other children, wide grins on their faces.

The Edge of the Box program focuses on boosting self-confidence, team-building collaboration, leadership skills, problem solving and friendship building. Each child is encouraged to take a turn during exercises to contribute their unique perspective. As many who deal with autism and special needs on a daily basis know, one of the keys to success for these children is routine and predictability. Surprises are threatening to them; however, in November when it was Lendrum's birthday they all conspired to have a surprise birthday party for him. When their finale performance had to be delayed and then relocated within Espanola High School due to damage to the gym floor, Laurenti sensitively gave them the opportunity beforehand to explore the new area in which

they'd be performing before inviting guests in to watch. Not a single child refused to perform or "melted down" as a result. Both of these are a testament to the progress the children had made. During the eight week series, parents had been sitting in the hallway, banned from entering the space where the children were rehearsing, so they had no idea what to expect. Everyone agreed afterward that they were blown away by the children.

Lendrum says that Autism Ontario has been closely watching what he and Laurenti have been achieving. He says, "It is evidence-based funding." In other words, when there is participation, support and the programs are working, more funding filters in. That is why Lendrum, in his quest for Autism Acceptance, organizes all of his events to include everyone. Events such as sensitive bowling nights at Venture Lanes. "The more likes we get on our Facebook pages, the more registrants we get at our events, the more funding we can secure to help children and families," he says.

The next Edge of the Box program began January 12 for those aged 12 -18. The session is nine weeks this time. The hope is to have the ability to run Edge of the Box regularly for both younger and older age groups, and in many locations. 

Recipe



I woke up this morning and made the following cookies. I wanted to be sure they were good before I shared the recipe with you. Needless to say I had cookies for breakfast. These are a simple, yet delicious and flavourful sugar cookie very similar to a famous premade cookie dough that you buy from the grocery store. The dough is firm yet pliable and is easily rolled into little balls. I found using my stand up mixer was the easiest way to make the dough. They will come out of the oven puffed up but flatten as they cool. The edges of this cookie are crispy but the centers remain soft and chewy.

Cracked Sugar Cookies

- 1 1/4 cups white sugar
- 1 cup butter
- 3 egg yolks
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar



Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Cream together sugar and butter. Beat in egg yolks and vanilla. Add flour, baking soda, and cream of tartar. Stir. Form dough into walnut size balls and place 2 inches apart on cookie sheet. Don't flatten. Bake 10 to 11 minutes, until tops are cracked and just turning colour.
