Espanola Lions Celebrates 70 Years

Twenty years ago was obviously the Club's 50 yr. celebration. Up to that point, it was estimated the Club had contributed over \$1,200,000 to the community. The ball fields, the outdoor pool, Espanola Little Theatre, the hospital were always top priorities. In 1998, attention was focused on the new Regional Complex and in particular the replacement of the outdoor pool with a larger indoor one. The needs of the community are ever changing and so too the response from the Club today.

Who knew on that cold February evening, 70 years ago with over 300 people in attendance, that the goals and activities would change little with time. With the signing of the charter, 62 members

became the Lions Club and for the first time would don the purple and gold: purple for loyalty and gold for sincerity and integrity.

To obtain a Charter to form a club, there were strict guidelines which had to be met. Elections had to be held. Dues had to be paid. Reports had to be submitted. Meetings had to be held regularly. But the most important requirement was: "The advancement of civic, cultural, and moral welfare of the community."

Today, the Lions Club pay their dues, submit reports, hold regular meetings and hold elections. But most important we respond to the needs of our community. It was crucial in 1948 and remains the cornerstone of everything we do today.

Espanola Regional Hydro to be sold to North Bay Hydro

By Rosalind Russell - Espanola and Sables-Spanish Rivers township councils will be hosting meetings to finalize the sale of Espanola Hydro.

The Town of Espanola and the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers announced January 12th that they have accepted a letter of intent from North Bay Hydro Distribution Ltd. The three will now proceed with the next phase of the process, which includes the completion of due diligence and the preparation of a definitive agreement of purchase and sale.

Both local councils agree that their main focus is to ensure affordable, reliable and sustainable electricity to both communities.

“This sale ensures the infrastructure upgrades which are required to ensure the long term dependability and reliability of our service will continue while minimizing the impact on our distribution rates. We are confident that North Bay Hydro will bring value

to the community in terms of distribution rates and customer service,” said Espanola Mayor Ron Piche.

“It is in the best interest of our residents and hydro ratepayers that these services are delivered through the knowledge and experience of North Bay Hydro,” added Les Gamble, the Mayor for the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers.

North Bay Hydro President and COO Matt Payne said the company is excited to welcome the local utility into the fold.

“We are very excited by the opportunity to create a Northern Partnership with Espanola and Sables-Spanish Rivers that will enhance future sustainability for our communities.”

The Town of Espanola currently owns 81.0% of Espanola Hydro and Sables-Spanish Rivers the remaining 19.0%. The utility serves 3,289 customers, which includes households and businesses.

The two local councils decided to sell off the utility last year

and a steering committee was formed in March, 2017 to help with the search.

The councils had a couple of reasons for making the move. This strategic direction is due to the electricity industry witnessing significant changes in operations and regulations, resulting in the consolidation of the number of Ontario municipal electrical utilities (MEUs) from approximately 307 to under 70. This sector has become increasingly complex over the past 18 years and as a result management teams at smaller Ontario LDCs, having less than 30,000 customers, have become overwhelmed by the diverse demands placed on them by the current regulatory, political, economic and technological environment.

“Espanola Regional Hydro is a very small LDC, as of the end of 2015 it ranked 61st out of 67 LDC’s, our relatively low return on investment, combined with the diverse demands has made us take a hard look at our

options,” explained Piche.

“In 2015, The Government of Ontario announced in its budget, a three-year exemption from the Transfer Tax for LDC’s with fewer than 30,000 customers,” added Gamble. “The timing is right for us to review our options.”

“It is happening all around us, a number of LDC mergers have either already taken place, are in the process or are just like us, looking at options.”

The Government of Ontario continues to promote electricity industry consolidation on a voluntary basis. Various government-sponsored reports have recommended that industry consolidation continue until there are only 8 to 12 mid-sized local distribution companies remaining in the Province.

The electricity sector has become increasingly complex over the past 19 years and, as a result, smaller local distribution companies in Ontario have become overwhelmed by the diverse demands.

Recipe

This recipe has been floating around on the internet for a while and I've wanted to try it, but hadn't got around to making it. My friend made it this week and gave me a sample to try. Oh my goodness, it is to die for! It's very simple to make, has creamy layers and a chocolate ganache type topping. What's there not to love? You have to plan ahead because it needs to be refrigerated overnight. You can't go wrong with this dessert. Everyone will love it.



No-Bake Chocolate Eclair Dessert

Filling:

- ❖ 2 (3.5 oz.) boxes vanilla instant pudding
- ❖ 3 c. milk
- ❖ 1 (8 oz.) container Cool Whip (3 cups)
- ❖ Graham crackers

Topping:

- ❖ 1/3 c. unsweetened cocoa powder
- ❖ 1 c. sugar
- ❖ 1/4 c. milk
- ❖ 1/2 cup butter (or margarine)
- ❖ 1 tsp. vanilla

For the filling:

1. Combine pudding mix and milk; beat. Stir in Cool Whip.
2. Place a layer of graham crackers in the bottom of a 9x13" dish. Spread 1/2 of the pudding mixture over the graham crackers. Repeat with another layer of graham crackers and pudding; then top with a final layer of graham crackers.

For the topping:

3. Bring cocoa, milk, and sugar to a full rolling boil; boil about 1 minute, stirring very frequently. Remove from heat and cool one minute. Add butter and vanilla; stir until butter is melted.
4. Pour chocolate topping over the top layer of graham crackers.
5. Refrigerate overnight.
