All town department heads reviewed the application submitting a report to council outlining and unanimously supporting Taylor's contributions.

Council agreed to having the facility officially named The Rock Taylor Rink with a dedication ceremony planned for later in the season as well as signage installed at the site.



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\$35,000 Raised And Counting For Espanola's Chris Gillis



By Rosalind Russell _ А fundraising campaign to assist an Espanola man on his road to recovery following a devastating motorcycle collision has been successful in reaching its goal in two short weeks. The campaign began on September 15th and by September 28th had reached its goal of \$35,000. As of press time, it was at \$41,000. Chris Gillis of Espanola is well known, not only as a paramedic with ManitoulinSudbury District Services, but also as a long-time volunteer. Just about a month ago, he was involved in a collision with a deer on Manitoulin Island while out for a weekend ride, which left him a paraplegic. A Go Fund Me was set up to raise \$35,000 to go towards supporting him in his rehabilitation and medical equipment, as well as travel costs his family is incurring in taking care of him. The fundraiser reached its'

goal last week and Gillis is now in rehabilitation. His sister, Stacey Gillis, says he continues to improve. She extends a huge thank you to everyone who supported the family, both through donations and words of encouragement. "First of all, I have to say thank you to each and every one of you," says Stacey. "When you set a goal like this, it's almost inconceivable that you could reach it, especially in a small community like Espanola. "It's so heartwarming to see the messages and the support from all of the different facets of Chris' life - all of the different ways that he reaches out and touches the world. It is next to impossible to message my thanks to all of you individually - though I'd love to. Know that I am reading all of the wee notes you attach and am trying to keep Chris up to date on your donations. He is absolutely astounded,

overwhelmed, and humbled by this outpouring. It is a lifechanging amount of money." She says he is doing well. "He is doing very well - all things considered - and is looking forward to getting back to texting and typing much sooner than we expected just a few days ago. He has an amazing team of nurses, doctors, respiratory therapists, occupational therapists and physiotherapists as well as his personal care attendants (Meghan and I) that scratch his nose, put on lip stuff, and change the channel. He is getting stronger and stronger every day and is stubborn and determined - two things that will come in very handy in his recovery. Thank you." Dog Park Possible For Espanola

A billion dollars is a thousand million lights saw their total worth jump by \$37 dollars and comes with - count them nine zeroes: \$1,000,000,000. In Canada, Bezos' poor cousins in the billionaire business - David Thomson at \$37 billion, Joseph Tsai at \$10.2 billion, Galen Weston at \$9 billion and 17 lesser

billion to a total of \$178 billion.

Given these numbers 'Amazon Jeff' could buy out all of our top 20 billionaires and have enough left over to purchase the Hope Diamond, Roman Abramovich's yacht Eclipse, ten Bugatti La Voiture Noire (they only come in black), nine 700-acre polo clubs in Poland, Leonardo da Vinci's Salvator Mundi, the Eiffel Tower, Passion Azteca's Tequila Ley, Heintzman crystal piano, Lanai Island, Hawaii, a Manhattan parking space and a pair of Gucci's eco-washed organic denim overalls with fake grass stains,.

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Recipe

Serve your Thanksgiving guests a hot cup of coffee or tea with this delicious coffee cake and I promise you, they will be impressed.



Pecan Streusel

- 4 tablespoons cold butter, shredded with a cheese grater
- 1/3 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/3 cup brown sugar (light or dark is fine)
- 1/3 cup chopped pecans
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

Cream Cheese Filling

- 1 block (8 oz) cream cheese, softened
- 1/3 cup granulated sugar
- 1 large egg

• 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Pumpkin Cake

- 1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 3/4 cup granulated sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- • 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves
 - 4 tablespoons cold butter, shredded or softened butter
- 1 large egg
- 1/2 cup sour cream
- 1 cup pure pumpkin puree (not pumpkin pie filling)

Heat oven to 350° and spray a 8x8 baking dish with cooking spray. Set aside. Combine all the streusel ingredients in a small bowl and use a pastry cutter, or your hands to combine it together until a crumb-like mixture forms. Set aside. For the filling combine the cream cheese, sugar, egg, and vanilla into a bowl and beat with a mixer until well combined. For the cake - In a large I mixing bowl, add the flour, sugar, baking powder, baking soda, I cinnamon, nutmeg, cloves, and shredded butter. Mix together with a wooden spoon. Add the egg, sour cream, and pumpkin. Beat together, using a handheld mixer, until a thick batter forms. It's ok if you see some small butter chunks in it. ASSEMBLE THE COFFEE CAKE - Pour 2/3 of the pumpkin cake batter into the prepared pan and spread out evenly. Drop spoonfuls of the remaining pumpkin batter over the cream cheese mixture and I try to spread it out as best you can. It's ok if some cream cheese is showing through or if some pumpkin batter is not covering every part. Sprinkle the streusel evenly over the top. Bake for 38-45 minutes or until a knife inserted in the center comes out clean.

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
