Vaccine Arrives For Long-Term Care Facilities In Public Health Sudbury & **Districts Jurisdiction**



Bv Rosalind Russell - Last week marked the start of the much-anticipated vaccination program for residents of longterm care and high-risk retirement homes within the jurisdiction of Public Health Sudbury & Districts.

Medical officer of health, Dr. Penny Sutcliffe, says the agency is received enough quantities of the Moderna COVID-19 vaccine over the next two weeks to immunize all residents of the facilities in the Sudbury and Manitoulin districts by February 5th.

She adds area long-term care homes will be sequenced over the time based on vaccine availability, COVID-19 case rates and outbreaks, and other factors such as logistics to avoid vaccine wastage.

Needle Disposal Program Implemented In SSRT

As an option in coping with the opioid crisis, the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers has placed a needle disposal box in a highly visible location. Township CAO Kim Sloss

says Public Health Sudbury & Districts provided the municipality with a sharps kiosk for public use.

Councillor Kevin Burke says the box must be located on public property, so it has been placed in front of the Webbwood Public Library.

He adds they appreciate the health agency purchasing the one box and if the program proves successful, township council will consider buying another one for Massey.

He says the township is also responsible for paying for the safe disposal of the contents. In a public statement on Facebook, Deputy Mayor Glenda Massicotte shared her thoughts about the program; This is a wonderful and necessary receptacle. It is in an easily accessible place for people to dispose of all kinds of needles and including insulin sharps needles, lancets for blood glucose checking and more. It is also great as there were many complaints of needles laying around and no where to dispose of them. This receptacle is emptied by a certified company that has been acquired by working with the Township and Public Health Sudbury and Districts. I feel that this a proactive step to keep our communities safe. I wish we had one in each community in our township. Council chose Webbwood as the first to receive this valuable and safe receptacle. I'm happy this is here. The stigma of needle use is not why this has been placed there.

Vaccine Arrives For Long-Term Care Facilities In Public Health Sudbury & Districts Jurisdiction

the successful vaccination of residents, staff, and essential care givers of the Wikwemikong Nursing Home on January 13. Public Health is working closely with community partners to complete vaccinations by February 5 or earlier. The vaccine will be offered to everyone eligible to receive it on a voluntary basis. The vaccine is a safe and effective tool in stopping the spread of COVID-19 and protecting the health of everyone, including our most vulnerable, in the community.

The critical need for COVID-19 vaccine to protect our most vulnerable has been further highlighted with several recent outbreaks declared locally, emphasizes Dr. Sutcliffe.

Most recently, Public Health Sudbury & Districts has declared COVID-19 outbreaks at Pius XII Catholic School, following three associated cases, and at Summit Human Services (group home), a congregate living setting, following the report of one case of COVID-19 in a staff member (as of press time).

"Our worry with the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine supply reductions was that we would have to wait longer and so we are thrilled that supplies of the Moderna vaccine are being made available to protect vulnerable people across the province," notes Dr. Sutcliffe. "I would like to thank long-term care homes and community paramedicine for their support in partnering in this truly unprecedented vaccination plan.

The vaccine outlook at the provincial level.

The person in charge of Ontario's vaccine rollout program says we shouldn't despair about the shortage of COVID-19 vaccines.

Retired general, Rick Hillier, says he's confident the province will still reach its goal of inoculating all Ontarians by this fall.

The provincial government has altered its vaccination schedule, in light of the delay in shipments from Pfizer as it expands its plant in Belgium.

Efforts to cover long-term care staff and caregivers is being paused, so the remaining vaccines can be administered to residents of nursing homes and long-term care facilities.

Premier Doug Ford says it's critical that Ontario's most vulnerable seniors be at the head of the line.

Health Minister Christine Elliott says people must continue to stay at home and follow public health guidelines, until there's a sufficient supply to cover every Ontarian who wants to receive the inoculation.

All the goodness of a Philly Cheesesteak in a meatloaf version. Packed with flavour and melted cheese, it is a perfect winter meal served with garlic mashed potatoes and a salad.

Philly Cheesesteak Meatloaf

- 2 tbsps butter
- 1 small onion, diced
- 1 small green pepper, diced
- 8 ounces of mushrooms, minced 1 cup panko breadcrumbs
- $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp salt
- $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp pepper

- 2 lbs lean ground beef
- 2 tbsp ketchup
- 2 tbsp Worcestershire sauce
- 2 eggs
- 8 ounces Provolone Cheese slices or Mozzarella (reserve half for top)

Preheat the oven to 375 degrees and spray a large loaf pan with cooking spray. In a large skillet, add the butter and the onions, bell peppers, mushrooms, salt and pepper. Cook until vegetables are tender; let cool for five minutes. In a large bowl add the ground beef, ketchup, Worcestershire sauce, eggs, panko breadcrumbs and the cooled vegetable mixture. Add half the meat mixture to your loaf pan and then add half of the cheese to the middle of the loaf in a 2 -inch wide section. (cut the slices into thirds for the right width). Cover with the rest of the meat and form into a rounded loaf shape. Cook for 40 minutes. Remove from oven and carefully drain any grease from around the loaf; cover with the remaining cheese and put back into the oven. Cook for 15-20 minutes. Let rest for 10 minutes before cutting.
