Co-organizer Candace Mandamin says the walk will acknowledge the grief of family and friends, address the stigma of drugrelated deaths and help spread awareness of overdoses.

She says the day is marked on August 31st and will begin at 3:00 p.m. in the Community Wellness Department parking lot with an opening prayer and smudge ceremony by Wayne Southwind.

The walk will wind its way down to the park by the river where community members will share their stories as well as naloxone training for attendees.

The day will be capped off with the lighting of lanterns in memory of loved ones at 9:00 p.m. She encourages anyone from outside communities to also take part.

She adds the public is also encouraged to wear purple, the official colour of the movement, in support of the initiative.

Fundraiser For Local Area Paramedic Undergoing Stem Cell Therapy

A major fundraiser is being held for a local area paramedic who is undergoing stem cell therapy not covered by government or insurance sources.

Ashley Dieks, a paramedic with the Manitoullin-Sudbury DSAB has been diagnosed with a form of blood

> cancer called Myeloma. While her chemotherapy treatment is covered, which began in June,

she is planning to undertake stem cell harvesting and transplant in Ottawa in October, and that is not covered.

To help her offset those costs, the annual Beacon Ride will be held on September 11th out of the Garson Arena.

The event includes two bike rides, one at \$20, the other at \$60, with all the funds going to Dieks.

Charging Station Contract Up for Discussion

Elliot Lake council is looking further into signing a 10-year contract with an Ontario government company for the installation of an electric vehicle charging station.

Steven Antunes, the city economic development manager told council Ivy Charging Solutions, which is jointly owned by Hydro One and the Ontario Power Generation Corporation is offering a 10-year contract for construction of the

charging station with an estimated cost in the first year of around \$25,000.

Antunes says the city is unlikely to sell enough battery charges to make money in the short term but as more people buy electric vehicles, the initiative could eventually make money.

He adds an expected federal mandate is coming soon that will require 20 per cent of all cars and trucks sold in the country to be electric and that is to increase to 50 percent by 2035.

Antunes adds the city has also applied for a government grant from Natural Resources Canada to cover up to 75 percent of the subsequent costs adding the station.

Council has given initial approval to look further into the initiative with further discussions planned on possible sites.

C-P inks Two Year Deal With Workers

The trains will keep rolling on CP Rail to avoid a strike. lines, at least for now.

The company and the union representing three-thousand engineers, conductors, and yard workers have signed a new two-year deal.

It comes from binding arbitration, which the two sides agreed to enter last spring

The contract sees wage increases of 3.5 per cent each year, plus improved benefits.

The Teamsters Union will also be joining a group designed to improve workers' pensions.

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New Library Concept Receiving Kudos

A new Little Free Library located out of the Lee Valley Community Hall is getting plenty of use.

Nancy Horan says an old china cabinet was repurposed by her sister, Judy Moody of Espanola, with free books being made available to the public.

She says bookworms can also donate books so the world of reading is available to anyone traveling through the area.

In fact, she adds, the first users were travelers from Vancouver heading to the East Coast.

Horan adds there is also an app available so readers can find the little library locations on their travels.

She says the library will remain open until Thanksgiving and reopen in early May.

The library is located on Lee Valley Road at the Cutler Lake/Hunt Road intersection between Espanola and Massey.

The library is in the process of being registered globally and readers will be able to find it shortly on the Little Library map App. https:// littlefreelibrary.org/app/

There is also a guest book for people to sign when they visit the library with some history of how it was constructed.

Horan also shared a bit of the history behind the concept. In 2009, Todd Bol of Hudson, Wisconsin, built a model of a one-room schoolhouse. It was a tribute to his mother: she was a teacher who loved to read. He filled it with books and put it on a post in his front yard. His neighbors and friends loved it, so he built several more and gave them away. They were inspired by community gift-sharing networks, "take a book, leave a book" collections in coffee



shops and public spaces, and most especially by the philanthropist Andrew Carnegie.

Around the turn of the 20th century, Carnegie set a goal to fund the creation of 2,508 free public libraries across the English-speaking world.

That goal inspired Brooks and Bol to set their own goal of surpassing 2,508 Little Free Libraries by the end of 2013. They wound up exceeding that goal in August of 2012, a year and a half before their target date. By 2010, the name Little Free Library was established, and the purpose of these Little Free Library book exchanges became clear: to share good books and bring communities together. The year 2011 brought national media attention, and by the end of the year, there were nearly 400 Little Free Libraries in existence. That number would skyrocket to over 4,000 Libraries by the end of 2012, the same year in which Little Free Library became a registered 501(c)(3)non-profit organization.

By 2016 more than 50,000 Little Free Libraries had been installed in all 50 U.S. states and 70 countries. Little Free Libraries have continued to grow by leaps and bounds every year. In 2022 we surpassed 150,000 registered Libraries in more than 115 countries worldwide.

The Road Warrior Returns North to Promote Mental Well Being

Jonathan Goulet, a retired mixed martial arts star who has set up a foundation for mental wellness is returning to Espanola.

Pete Rodley, who has partnered with Goulet to set up the foundation, The Warrior Path, says a walk and meet and greet will be held in Espanola September 17th to advocate for mental wellness through outdoor activities.

Rodley says the walk will begin at the recreation centre at 10 am and make its way through Espanola ending at Desjardins, the bank on Tudhope Street.

"As a financial cooperative, the well-being of our community is always a priority, therefore, this collaboration with the Warrior Path was a natural fit for us," says Josée Preseault, Vice-President, Regional Sudbury and Northern Ontario at Desjardins Ontario Credit Union.

"We are thrilled to be part of this initiative, it is a great way to bring the community together, all while highlighting the importance of outdoor physical activity and mental health."

Rodley says participants will then have the opportunity to listen to Goulet's story and talk to him about their challenges in a safe environment.
