Home Security Begins With You: Preventing Home Break-ins



Spring seems to be around the corner, but many of us in the north are heading for warmer locations to get a break from the snow and cold. Getting a break, however, can also lead to a break-in at your home while you are away. Here are some tips to

help you avoid having your home burglarized, whether you are in town or not.

First, it is a myth that most residential break-ins happen at night. In fact, most residential break-ins actually happen during the day, when the majority of people are not at home.

Our natural instinct is to think about ways to keep the burglar out, such as upgrading our locks or installing an alarm When assessing system. a property from the street. most thieves do not focus on the type of lock you have. Instead, criminals look for

opportunities that improve chances for success. In the case of residential homes, burglars look for:

Excessive amounts of landscaping and solid wood fences that help them hide from the neighbours

- Indications that you, the owner, may be away including presence of flvers. newspapers, unshovelled driveways, lawns in need of maintenance, the absence of a car that is usually parked in the driveway, or the absence of appropriate lighting.

There are many things you can do to protect your home, such

as clear views of all windows and doors (not obscured by bushes or a high fence), ensure that newspapers/mail and flyers are collected, the driveway is shovelled and lawn is cut when away. Also, leave lights on timers, both inside or outside when away, install deadbolt locks to all your exterior doors, windows with a single locking device should have a secondary security feature, a safety box for valuables is a good idea. It should be stored in an isolated area of your home. Store your keys in an out-of-sight location and advise your neighbours when you're away.

Balancing the Budget in Espanola



By Chloe Kneer - Budget presentations and deliberations continue in Espanola as the town wrestles with its financial health. The looming repayment of \$4 million in back taxes to Domtar has forced the administration

and council to look at every means possible of cutting expenditures in order to avoid a sharp increase in property taxes to cover the bill.

Residents were happy to hear that the decision was made to sell two properties that the town currently owns: the building where Cambrian College is housed across from the municipal offices and the so-called "doctor's house" on Second Avenue.

It was also decided that an independent service review will be carried out, likely at a cost of \$15-25,000, and that the

strategic plan will be complete. Budge cuts include: print and television advertising budgets have been nixed; public works will see a reduction in the hiring of student workers from 14 to 8; mayor and council car allowances will no longer be paid; honorariums to councilappointed board members will no longer be paid; Espanola will request that all communities in the hospital catchment area contribute to doctor recruitment costs. In addition, the Sudbury and District Health Unit will be asked to identify where surplus municipal contributions

are spent. If the town is not satisfied with the expenditure, they may demand a refund of overpayments. Mayor and council salary concessions were addressed in-camera.

The fire department's budget was accepted as was the police budget, though a review with the police services board is yet to be scheduled.

The recreation budget is to be reviewed on April 9. Clerk-Treasurer/Administrator Cynthia Townsend says she hopes the budget will be finalized by the end of April.

Recipe

Are you looking for a recipe to use up the last of your Easter ham? This is a "quiche" like recipe without the hassle of making pastry. It's great for a quick meal or to serve at a brunch.



Ham & Onion Crescent Squares

- 8 oz. can Pillsbury Crescent Dinner Rolls
- 3/4 cup shredded Swiss cheese
- 3/4 cup shredded Mozzarella cheese
- 1 egg, beaten
- 3/4 cup milk
- 1 cup diced fully cooked ham
- 5 chopped green onions

Heat oven to 375° F. Separate crescent dough strips and place in an ungreased 13 x 9 pan; press over bottom and 1/2 inch up sides to form a crust, sealing separated strips. Sprinkle cheeses over the dough. Combine the egg and milk and pour over the cheeses. Sprinkle the onions and ham evenly over the top .Bake at 375° F for 22 to 28 minutes or until crust is deep golden brown and the filling is set. Cool for 5 minutes; cut into squares.

Makes 4 to 6 servings.
