Berni's method of removing a tick. First call 911.

Worst summer ever for ticks. Every time the 'parents' freaked. I walk the nearby trail, I get home with at least one or two on me. Getting a tick off you or your pet quickly and efficiently before they engorge in blood and create infection is crucial. Espanola Police Report

On July 3, 2013 at 5:49 p.m., the Espanola Police Service were called to investigate the theft of a 2013 Yamaha 4-stroke 2.5 hp outboard motor from the fenced compound at Trailside Sports on McCulloch Dr., Espanola. The outboard motor is valued at \$1015.00. A police investigation revealed that in the early morning hours of July 3rd, two males parked their vehicle on Penage Lake Road, and walked to the compound, where they climbed over the fence, and in doing so, triggered a motion alarm. The two males fled the scene, but still managed to remove the outboard motor. The males were captured by a nearby video surveillance camera running from the scene, and are described from the surveillance video as one being over 6' tall, 270 lbs, and the second being 6' tall, with a thinner build, wearing a baseball cap. Police have identified a possible suspect vehicle as being a grey 2003 Pontiac Sunfire, which was noted by an Espanola officer parked unoccupied on Penage Lake Road, just prior to the break and enter.

On July 5, 2013 at 3:12 p.m., a resident of Avery Dr., returned home from work to find that unknown person(s) had entered his residence, and removed a 15" Sony Vaio laptop valued at \$1200.00, two 750 ml bottles of Weiser's Deluxe Whiskey, and one 750 ml bottle of Forty Creek Whiskey, valued at \$26.95 per bottle. The homeowner admitted that the culprit(s) likely had easy access to his home, as he seldom locks his door. At this time, there are no suspects in this matter. Police are asking the public to ensure doors and windows are locked at all times when away from your residence, and to remain vigilant in your neighbourhood, and report any suspicious person(s) or activity to police immediately; working in partnership, we can achieve a safer community.

On July 11, 2013 at 1:18 p.m., the Espanola Police Service received information that a 47-year old female residing in Espanola, was responsible for causing the death of an 8-week old Shih Tzu puppy, by placing the live puppy in a plastic bag, then placing it inside the refrigerator freezer in her home, until it died. The female told the person who reported the crime to police that it was necessary to kill the puppy, because she believed that the puppy had suffered a broken paw 4 weeks earlier, and she did not have the money to take the puppy to the veterinarian. As a result of receiving the complaint, police entered into an investigation, which involved clandestinely seizing the female's garbage, recovering the puppy's remains. An autopsy was conducted, and it was revealed that suffocation and hypothermia, or a combination of the two conditions, were plausible causes in the puppy's death. Further, the autopsy showed that the puppy had no evidence of a fracture to its limb.

As a result, 47-year Brenda Gagne of Espanola was arrested, and charged with one count of Injuring or Endangering an Animal, contrary to Section 445(1) of the Criminal Code of Canada, and one count of Causing Unnecessary Suffering to an Animal, contrary to Section 445.1(1)(a) of the Criminal Code of Canada. She is to appear in Espanola Court on the September 3, 2013 at 9:30 a.m., to answer to her charges.

On July 18, 2013, the Espanola Police Service stopped a motor vehicle as it pulled into the driveway of a home on Secord St., Espanola, having grounds to believe that the 3 female occupants were in possession of controlled substances. They arrested the occupants and searched both the occupants, and vehicle.

As a result of the search, the three women were found to be in possession of 69 Oxycodone pills, 17 Hydromorphone pills, 34 grams of Marihuana, 3 Tylenol-3 with Codeine, \$140.00 in Canadian currency, and indicia that suggested the trafficking of controlled substances. The combined estimated street value of the drugs seized is \$1710.00.

Based on the findings, 37-year old Sandra Sandiford, 19-year old Tyana Sandiford, and 20-year old Cecile Trottier, all from Espanola, were charged with:

- · Possession for the Purpose of Trafficking in Marihuana, contrary to section 5(2) of the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act;
- · Possession for the Purpose of Trafficking in Oxycodone, contrary to section 5(2) of the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act;
- Possession for the Purpose of Trafficking in Morphine, contrary to section 5(2) of the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act;
- Possession of a Controlled Substance Codeine, contrary to section 4(1) of the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act; and
- Possession of Property Obtained by Crime, contrary to section 354(1)(a) of the Criminal Code.

Recipe

Baked beans are a family favourite of ours. My mom makes delicious homemade beans from scratch using dried beans and a long, slow cooking time in the oven. My Grandma made them too and I was lucky



enough to inherit her "bean pot". But to be honest, I think I have made them once. It takes a bit of planning to make them and anybody who knows me well, knows that I'm a bit of a procrastinator. (Yes mom, I know I need to renew my passport and get working on my cookbook). So this recipe is perfect for me! Baked beans are a perfect side dish for a barbecue, or a special occasion dinner or just as part of your weekly meal.

Baked Beans the Easy Way

- 4 (16 -20 ounce) cans pork and beans
- 3/4 cup brown sugar
- 1 onion, chopped up
- 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce (or just a good couple of shakes)
- 1 tablespoon prepared mustard
- 1 cup barbecue sauce (whatever is your favourite)
- 1 teaspoon liquid smoke (more or less up to you)
- 3 -4 pieces bacon, diced

Mix pork and beans, brown sugar, Worcestershire sauce, mustard, barbecue sauce, and liquid smoke together in baking pan. Sauté bacon in a frying pan until partially cooked; don't let it get crispy, drain and reserving some of the bacon fat. Stir the bacon in to the beans. Sauté the onion in the reserved bacon fat until just transparent. Stir into the beans. Bake at 350 degrees for 45-60 minutes or until bubbly and delicious.

Hula Hoop Hide-Outs

- Hula Hoop
- Safety Pins
- Twine or Rope
- Tulle and/or Ribbon
- Sheets
- Scissors
- · Cushions and Blankets



Pin the top edge of the sheet to the hula hoop by folding the sheet over and pinning it to itself. Use twine to create a hanger to tie your hideout to the tree with. Using two long pieces of twine, tie each piece to opposite sides of the hula hoop. The two pieces then criss-cross over each other and can be tied together with a third piece of twine. You can use that third piece, to tie the hoop to the tree. Tie on tulle and ribbons or any other embellishments you have if you want to make it a princess or fairy hideout. Hang from a tree branch. Add blankets and cushions underneath your fort so you can be nice and comfy.

NOTICE OF THE PASSING OF ZONING BYLAW

(Planning Act-Section 34(18))

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers passed Bylaw 2013-25 on the 24th day of July, 2013.

The land to which the bylaw applies is described as Victoria Township, Section 19, Parcel 26693, Plan M175 L-F110, 291B Waterfalls Road.

The purpose for the amendment is to allow for a reduced Front Yard setback for a Main Building at the shoreline of Denvic Lake, in the Resource Recreation zone. This application is not subject of any other application under the Planning Act.

The last date for filing a notice of appeal is **August 26, 2013**. A Notice of Appeal must be filed with the Clerk of the Corporation of the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers, setting out the reasons for the appeal. This must also be accompanied by the fee required by the Ontario Municipal Board.

Only individuals, corporations and public bodies may appeal a zoning bylaw to the Ontario Municipal Board. A Notice of Appeal may not be filed by an unincorporated association or group. However, a Notice of Appeal may be filed in the name of an individual who is a member of the association or the group on its behalf.

No persons or public body shall be added as a party to the hearing of the appeal unless, before the bylaw was passed, the person or public body made oral submissions at a public meeting or written submissions to the Council or, in the opinion of the Ontario Municipal Board, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.

This bylaw is available for inspection in the municipal office during regular office hours.
