Espanola Police Report

On January 2nd, 2013 the Espanola Police Service obtained a search warrant to search an Espanola address in regards to a firearms investigation.

During the search; 2 - rifles, 2- shotguns, 1- unregistered 9mm Browning hand gun that the owner did not have a permit for, as well as ammunition for the weapons was seized. During this seizure, 333 grams of Cannabis Marihuana was also located in the house and seized.

As a result of the investigation a 56 year old male and a 57 year old female were charged with various offences.

- Unauthorized Possession of a firearm 91(1) of the Criminal Code
- Careless Storage of Firearm 86(1) of the Criminal Code
 Unauthorized Possession of Prohibited Device 91(2) of the Criminal Code

- Production of a Schedule II Substance 7(1) of the Controlled Drugs and Substance Act
- Possession for the Purpose of Trafficking 5(2) of the Controlled Drugs and Substance Act
- Importing an Unauthorized Firearm 103 (1)(a) of the Criminal Code
- Importing a Prohibited Device 103(1)(b) of the Criminal Code

- Production of a Schedule II Substance 7(1)of the Controlled Drugs and Substance Act
- Possession for the Purpose of Trafficking 5(2) of the Controlled Drugs and Substance Act

Health Unit Urges More Precautions To **Protect Vulnerable From The Flu**

The Sudbury & District Health Unit (SDHU) is urging people to take more precautions to prevent the spread of influenza to people most vulnerable to influenza complications or hospitalizations.

"Residents of long term care homes, young children and seniors, and people with chronic diseases are all at high risk of influenza-related complications," says Dr. Penny Sutcliffe, Sudbury & District Medical Officer of Health. "To date, we have seven respiratory outbreaks in long term care homes across the district five of which are confirmed to be caused by influenza. Limiting visits to long term care homes, getting vaccinated and staying home when sick are all important ways to protect yourself and the vulnerable people around you."

It is strongly recommended that anyone visiting a long term care home use extreme caution and only visit if absolutely necessary. Anyone experiencing flu or cold-like symptoms is asked to defer their visit until they are well.

The SDHU is encouraging all residents, those working with children and seniors, and health care workers to protect themselves and others from the influenza virus by getting the flu shot.

National Advisory The Committee on Immunization (NACI) and the Provincial Infectious Disease Advisory Committee (PIDAC), among others, all strongly recommend

that health care providers get immunized annually against the flu. "All health care workers want to protect the people they care for," notes Sutcliffe. "And immunization against the flu is a key way to do this."

Although everyone is at risk of getting the flu, seniors, young children and those underlying with medical conditions are at higher risk of experiencing serious complications including pneumonia, bronchitis, sinus and ear infections and even death.

Symptoms of influenza may include fever, runny eyes, headache, sore throat, extreme weakness, chills, cough, stuffy nose, muscle aches, and fatigue.

In addition to getting the flu shot, all residents are reminded of the following steps to take to protect themselves and others from illness:

- Wash your hands often and especially before eating using liquid soap and water. Use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer if soap and water are not available - Cough into a tissue or your sleeve and throw away used

tissues immediately - Stay home if you are ill

Free flu shots continue to be available by appointment at all SDHU locations, with drop-in services possible at the main Sudbury office at 1300 Paris Street. The free flu shot is also available at participating pharmacies, walk-in clinics, community health centres, and your health care provider.

Dr. Rocheleau was approached by the municipality to help with the nuisance cats, which he estimates number fifty or more. "The cats are living in the abandoned buildings in the area," he says, "we have

Espanola Animal Hospital's cleaned up an old barn that is in very good condition, but was full of junk." The barn will serve as a feeding and watering station aimed at attracting the cats from the nearby dangerous structures. Once the cats are used to attending the feeding barn,

Dr. Rocheleau and his staff and volunteers will capture them and make sure they are properly cared for before sending them to various agencies who have committed to finding them homes. The undertaking has become known as "The Mead Street Cat Project" and Dr. Rocheleau estimates that it will take years to complete. "It's not just these cats that are the problem," he insists, "it is also the fact that people allow their pets to roam outside of their property, so really there are two issues here." He cited the town's by-law which stipulates that pet owners must keep their animals on their property. "As soon as an animal leaves the owner's property to aggravate the neighbors, it is contrary to the by-law and irresponsible." He hopes neighbors will take this to heart and do their part in helping with the over-

population of cats in this area. The Mead Street Cat Project will be on-going and, as such, will need funding and volunteers. 

Recipe

The other night my daughter and I were invited to my parents for a dinner of fresh fish caught by my dad in a local lake; nothing better than that. Along with the fish my mom made crispy vegetable fries that were delicious and crispy! Sometimes when you



make vegetables in the oven, they don't turn out crispy. The secret is to use an egg wash and to not cut your vegetables too thick. My mom shared her recipe with me and I'm sharing it with you.

Crispy Oven Vegetable Fries

- 1 large russet potato
- 1 large sweet potato
- 2 egg whites • 1 tsp. chili powder
- 2 parsnips
- 2 carrots
- 1 small red onion
- Salt and fresh pepper, to taste
- 2 tbsp. olive oil, as needed

Preheat oven to 425 degrees F. Line 2 baking sheets with parchment. Cut all the vegetables into 1/2-inch thick fries. Whip egg whites until lightly and frothy. Add 2 tbsp. olive oil. Toss potatoes in egg white mixture and season with salt and pepper and chili powder. Divide vegetable fries between baking sheets, making sure they don't touch. Bake until crispy on the outside and tender on the inside, about 20 to 25 minutes. Yield: 4 servings.

A fun winter craft made from the free paint stir sticks you get when you buy a can of paint.

Paint Stick Snowmen

- wooden paint stir stick, painted white
- 6" piece of yarn • white craft glue
- 3" x 3" piece of felt for hat
 8" x 1" strip of material or felt
 black marker or black paint
- 3 buttons or pony beads
- 1/2 of an orange toothpick
- hot glue gun

Wrap 3''x3'' fabric around the top of the stick and hot glue together in the back. If you have more time, you can use white craft glue or felt glue and attach a wooden clothespin to the stick and hat to hold it in place while it dries. Tie varn around the top of the hat and trim ends. Fringe the top of the hat with scissors if you like. Wrap 8"x1" strip of

material around the neck, tie in a knot. Fringe the ends with scissors. Use white craft glue to attach 3 buttons or beads below the scarf and glue the orange toothpick on for the nose. Use black marker, or a toothpick dipped in black paint to create the mouth and eyes and let everything dry.
