#### NOTICE OF THE PASSING OF ZONING BYLAW

#### (Planning Act-Section 34(18))

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers passed Bylaw 2013-23 on the 26TH day of June, 2013.

The land to which the bylaw applies is described as Harrow Township, Lot 1, Concession 5, Parcel 7133, Plan 53R-17178 Parts 4 to 6, 34A Watson Road.

The purpose for the amendment is to allow for (existing) reduced Front Yard setbacks at the shoreline of Cutler Lake, in the Resource Recreation zone. This application is not subject of any other application under the Planning Act.

The last date for filing a notice of appeal is **July 29, 2013**. A Notice of Appeal must be filed with the Clerk of the Corporation of the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers, setting out the reasons for the appeal. This must also be accompanied by the fee required by the Ontario Municipal Board.

Only individuals, corporations and public bodies may appeal a zoning bylaw to the Ontario Municipal Board. A Notice of Appeal may not be filed by an unincorporated association or group. However, a Notice of Appeal may be filed in the name of an individual who is a member of the association or the group on its behalf.

No persons or public body shall be added as a party to the hearing of the appeal unless, before the bylaw was passed, the person or public body made oral submissions at a public meeting or written submissions to the Council or, in the opinion of the Ontario Municipal Board, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.

This bylaw is available for inspection in the municipal office during regular office hours.

efforts to keep expenses under control, the school board also approved a recommendation that Espanola's A.B. Ellis Public School be relocated Espanola High School to by September 2014. The recommendation stemmed from the intention of the Conseil scolaire cathologue du Nouvel-Ontario to vacate the 12,719 square feet of space it currently leases at the site. "The utilization of Espanola High School will drop 43% in the next five years," said Director of Education Norm Blaseg. "We're really trying to maximize our space and moving A.B. Ellis to the high school will increase the use to 85-90%. It makes more sense, and our hope is also that students will benefit from a shared cafeteria, having a larger gym, and shops for the grade 7 and 8 students."

each other, with A.B. Ellis continuing as a JK – grade 8, and the high school grades 9 -12. "A review of the school site has been completed, and it could accommodate two distinct schools," Blaseg added. As for the fate of the current A.B. Ellis school site, Blaseg says it would be offered to the other school boards for use first. under a Ministry of Education agreement. If no other board steps forward to claim the site, it will be available for other government-run institutions. Failing that, the property would be put up for sale as surplus property to the board. The Ministry of Education must approve the plan before going forward, and Blaseg expects to have a final decision by the end of the summer. A public information session is set for September 19 at Espanola High School at 7:00 p.m. to explain the board's vision to the community.

ESPANOLA OPP LAY CHARGES AFTER AN ASSAULT WITH A WEAPON IN WEBBWOOD - (SUDBURY / ESPANOLA) - Espanola OPP have charged a woman after a disturbance at a residence in Webbwood on July 2, 2013. A approximately 7:45 a.m., members of the Espanola detachment responded to a report of a stabbing in Webbwood. A sixty three (63) year old male had been stabbed in the face. Skye Goodchild was later located and charged with Assault with a weapon and Breach of Recognizance. Goodchild was held for bail.

Impaired Driving and Dangerous Driving Charges Laid After Two Vehicle Collision Near Massey on May 23, 2013 - (ESPANOLA, ON) - Members of the Espanola OPP detachment responded to a two vehicle collision on Highway 17 west of Massey shortly after 10:00 a.m. involving a tractor trailer and a car. Investigation revealed that the westboound car crossed the centre line into the path of the eastbound tractor trailer. The male driver and three female passengers of the car were all taken to hospital by ambulance with non-life threatening injuries. #### **Espanola Police Report**

On June 15, 2013 at 3:35 am, the Espanola Police Service received a complaint that an 18-year old male sexually assaulted a 16-year old female at knifepoint. Upon receiving the complaint, the Espanola Police Service entered into a Criminal Investigation, and learned that the female had attended a residence in Espanola with the male, and soon thereafter, the male began to make unwanted sexual advances towards her. When the female resisted his advances and attempted to leave, the male held a knife to her neck, and confined her in the home, sexually assaulting her. Following the assault, the male escorted the female from the home, but prior to allowing her to leave, he threatened kill her if she told anyone what had happened. As a result of the investigation, 18-year old Jordan Lacosse of Espanola was arrested on June 16, 2013, and charged with Sexual Assault with a Weapon, Forcible Confinement, two counts of Utter Death Threats, and two counts of Breach of Recognizance, as it was discovered that at the time of the offence he was bound by conditions of a Recognizance. The accused was held in custody, and appeared in Bail Court in Sudbury on June 17, 2013.

On June 12, 2013 at 2:23 am, the Espanola Police Service received a 911 call from a resident of Secord Street, Espanola, regarding a Break and Enter that had just occurred at her residence. Upon arrival, police discovered that an 18-year old male who is known to the caller's son, had entered the home through an unlocked first floor window, and while he was searching a bedroom for valuables, her son confronted him, and a struggle ensued, causing damage to items inside the bedroom. The 18-year old intruder, identified as Christopher Daoust of McKerrow, managed to exit the home through the front door of the residence, and evaded police. Later, Daoust turned himself into the Espanola Police Service, and was charged with Break, Enter and Theft, contrary to section 348 (1)(b) of the Criminal Code, and Mischief Under \$5000.00, contrary to section 430 (4) of the Criminal Code. The accused was released, and is to appear in Espanola court on the September 3, 2013 to answer to his charge.

On June 10, 2013, a member of the Espanola Police Service, assisted by a member of the O.P.P. Community Drug Action Team, stopped a motor vehicle on Centre Street at Gray Street, Espanola, and having grounds to believe that the two female occupants were in possession of a controlled substance, arrested the occupants and searched the occupants and vehicle incident to arrest. As a result of the search, 27-year old Danette Brandow of Espanola, and 20-year old Stevie Elliot of McKerrow were found to be in possession of 3 Codeine pills, 15 Methamphetamine pills, and a small amount of Cannabis-Marihuana valued at \$480.00. Based on the findings, the two were charged with one count each of Possession for the Purposes of Trafficking in a Controlled Substance, contrary to section 5 (2) of the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act. The accused are to appear in Espanola Court on the July 2, 2013 to answer to their charges. At the time of their arrest, the accused had two infant children in the vehicle, which upon conviction, qualifies them for mandatory minimum sentences under the act.

On June 4, 2013, a member of the Espanola Police Service, assisted by a member of the O.P.P. Community Drug Action Team, stopped a motor vehicle on Centre Street at Tudhope Street, Espanola, and having grounds to believe that the male occupants were in possession of a controlled substance, arrested the occupants and searched the occupants and vehicle incident to arrest. As a result of the search, 29-year old Christian Gauvin, and 28-year old Sean Roque, both of Espanola, were found to be in possession of a small quantity of Cannabis-Marihuana valued at \$45.00. Based on the findings, the two were charged with one count each of Possession of a Controlled Substance, contrary to section 4 (1) of the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act. Further, Gauvin was charged with Breach of Probation, contrary to section 733.1 (1) of the Criminal Code, as it was discovered that at the time of the occurrence, he was bound by a Probation Order to Keep the Peace and Be of Good Behaviour. The accused are to appear in Espanola Court on the July 2, 2013 to answer to their charges.

### Recipe

I was craving something sweet last week and decided to try this recipe. The picture of cinnamon sugar crusted morsels was too tempting to ignore. I made them in the evening and they were gone by lunch time the next day, so I would



say the family liked them. They are a good substitute for a doughnut and you don't have to go to all the effort and mess of frying them.

#### Scrumptious Baked Cinnamon Breakfast Bites

- 1-1/3 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 cup crisp rice cereal, coarsely crushed
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 cup butter-flavored
- 2 tablespoons plus 1/2 cup sugar, divided
- shortening • 1/2 cup milk
- 3 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 cup butter, melted

Mix flour, crushed cereal, 2 tablespoons sugar, baking powder and salt in large bowl. Cut in shortening with pastry blender or fork until the mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add milk and stir just until moistened. Roll dough into approximately 2 1/2 dozen 1 inch balls. Mix cinnamon and remaining sugar in a small bowl. Drop balls into melted butter and roll in cinnamon sugar mixture. Place balls onto greased 8 or 9 inch round pan. Bake at 425 degrees for 15-18 minutes or until inserted toothpick comes out clean. Cool for a few minutes in pan on wire rack before removing. If you are looking for a perfectly rounded ball, try using a cookie sheet or jelly roll pan because they will bake together.

#### **Kids Korner**

#### **Toilet Paper Roll Snake**

- 6 toilet paper rolls
- green, yellow, and blue washable paint
- paint brush
- 2 pipe cleaners
- scissors
- school glue
- 2 google eyes
- 1 small piece of red or orange ribbon, fabric, or felt

Paint the the toilet paper tubes either in solid colours or cool snake patterns. Let tubes dry completely. When dry, cut the ends of the tubes into points. Use the tip of your scissors to poke holes in the ends of each tube (except the 2 for the ends of the snake- those only need holes on one end.) Stick a pipe-cleaner through the holes and fold the ends back to make right-angles. Clip off the extra pipe-cleaner (leaving at least 1/4" folded over). Glue on some googly eyes and add a ribbon tongue.
