Lace-up for the 37th Annual **Friendly Massey Marathon**



Chloe Kneer - On occasion, runners, or anyone avidly into racing sports of any sort, experience what's called a "photo finish." Generally, something drastic happens right at the end, leaving spectators wondering, "how did that happen?" The Massey Marathon (Voyageur Marathon, Friendly Massey

Marathon - it's had many names over the years) almost didn't happen this year. It would have been a devastating turn of events for the town, which had hosted the annual running race for 36 years. However, in true "photo finish" style, Dave Stonley stepped in when he heard the marathon may be cancelled. He phoned a few friends, and together, they made certain the marathon would go on as planned; it is set for this weekend.

Securing a healthy crop of volunteers for any event or cause is always a challenge. However, in order for traditions to continue, community members must step up and play a part. "This event essentially puts Massey on the map. It is definitely a community identifier," says Stonley. The marathon is expected to have over 200 participants

Calgary will also host the "International Festival of Animated Objects." It mostly stars puppets and stooges but some members of the Canadian senate will also be featured this year.

Espanola Police Report

On June 10, 2013 at 6:53 p.m., the Espanola Police Service received a complaint of a suspicious vehicle in the area of Annette Street and Marquerite Street, Espanola. The citizen caller was concerned, because the 1991 GMC pickup truck was stopped on the shoulder of the road for half an hour with 3 occupants just sitting inside.

Upon arrival, a member of the Espanola Police Service conducted a computer check on the attached Alberta licence plate, and discovered that the vehicle was reported stolen from the City of Greater Sudbury.

As a result, the three occupants were arrested for Possession of Property Obtained by Crime, but further investigation revealed that only 48-year old Raymonde Swain of Sudbury had knowledge that the vehicle was stolen, and as a result, she was charged with Possession of Property Obtained by Crime Under \$5000.00, contrary to section 355 (b) of the Criminal Code of Canada. The accused will appear in Espanola Court on the July 2, 2013 to answer to her charge.

The other two occupants were released unconditionally.

On the 14 Jun-13 at 12:58 am, the Espanola Police Service received a 911 call from a resident of Hayward Street, Espanola, regarding a Home Invasion type Break and Enter that had just occurred at her residence.

Upon arrival, police discovered that 2 males wearing balaclavas forced entry to the residence, and demanded prescription medication that they believed the female victim had in her home. During the altercation, the 2 suspects assaulted the victim, but ultimately left empty handed. Following the incident, police located the two males, and another male who acted as the lookout, hiding out at a residence on Centre Street. Upon their arrest, police located the clothing and disguises worn by the suspects during the commission of the offence. Charged are:

19-year old Nick Parri of Espanola, with:

- Break and Enter, Commit the Indictable offence of Robbery;
- · Break and Enter, with Intent to commit Theft;
- Wear Disguise during the commission of an Indictable Offence;
- Fail to Comply with OIC Undertaking.
- 25-year old Alex Szablowski of Espanola with:
- Break and Enter, Commit the Indictable offence of Robbery;
- · Break and Enter, with Intent to commit Theft;
- Wear Disguise during the commission of an Índictable Offence;
- Obstruct Peace Officer Resist Arrest;
- · Forcible Confinement;
- · Assault.
- 18-year old Trevor Hanes of Espanola, with:
- Break and Enter, with Intent to commit Theft.

On the 12Jun13, a member of the Espanola Police Service, assisted by a member of the O.P.P. Community Drug Action Team, stopped a motor vehicle on Barber Street near Second Street, Espanola, and having grounds to believe that the male and female in the vehicle were in possession of a controlled substance, arrested the occupants and searched the occupants and vehicle incident to arrest.

As a result of the search, 28-year old Adam White, and 21-year old Susan Cronkite of Espanola were found to be in possession of 8 Oxycodone pills valued at \$40.00; neither person had a medical prescription to legally possess the substance.

Based on the findings, the two were charged with one count each of Possession of a Controlled Substance, contrary to section 4 (1) of the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act. Further, the driver Adam White was charged with additional Provincial Offences of Failing to Wear a Seatbelt, and Drive Motor Vehicle with Open Container of Liquor, and the passenger Susan Cronkite was charged with Failing to Wear a Seat Belt, and Having Open Alcohol other than Licenced Premise, Residence or Private Place.

The accused are to appear in Espanola Court on the 02Jul13 to answer to their charges.

On the 08Jun13 at 2:24 pm, the Espanola Police Service received a complaint from a concerned citizen of a possible impaired driver in the area of Mead Street, Espanola.

The Police Service immediately dispatched an officer to the area; however, the driver, and described motor vehicle could not be located.

At 3:50 pm, the same officer observed the vehicle from the earlier complaint traveling on Second Street, and stopped the driver to check his sobriety. While speaking to the driver, the officer detected the odour of an alcoholic beverage, and an Approved Roadside Screening Device was utilized, producing a "Fail" reading by the driver.

The 61-year old driver was arrested for Operation with Over 80 mgs of Alcohol, and transported to the Espanola Police Service, where the Approved Instrument obtained readings of 120 mgs and 103 mgs.

As a result, Donald Guay of Espanola was charged with Operation over 80 mgs of alcohol, contrary to section 253 (1)(b) of the Criminal Code of Canada. Further, the accused lost his privilege to operate a motor vehicle in the Province of Ontario for a period of 90-days, and his vehicle was impounded for 7-days.

The accused will appear in Espanola Court on the 03Sep13 to answer to his charge.

On the 20Jun13, the Espanola Police Service received a complaint from a resident on Albert Street in Espanola, reporting that unknown person(s) removed four BF Goodrich size P265/75/16 Mud Terrain Tires on Metal Alloy rims from the box of his pickup truck overnight. The tires, valued at \$2000.00, were secured in the truck box with a cable and padlock.

Police are asking that if anyone saw suspicious activity in the area during the early morning hours of the 20Jun13, or if you have any information as to the whereabouts of the tires, or person(s) responsible, to call the Espanola Police Service at (705) 869-3251 or anonymously through Crime Stoppers at 1-800-461-4899.

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Bad News For Bees Is Bad News For Us All

A few years back I wrote about the challenges for bees (especially honey bees) as disorder colony collapse was a growing concern and phenomenon. Recent news items show the problems aren't reversing but are only getting worse. This is significantly bad news and the implications could be felt in many ways including on your plate.

Bee populations have been in decline for many years. Originally it was thought that a number of stress factors were to blame. Increasingly we are hearing about one class of pesticides called neonicotinoids as the likely culprit pushing global bee populations to the brink.

Within weeks, two mass death events have highlighted the pressing need to address this In June, tens of situation. thousands of wild bumblebees were found dead in an Oregon parking lot after nearby trees were sprayed with a neonicotinoid pesticide meant to combat aphids. In early July, a Southern Ontario bee keeper announced he lost more than 37 million bees after the corn fields that surround his farm were planted with neonicotinoid treated seeds. He claims the dust from the planting killed his bees in short order.

Honeybees are incredible creatures that live in organized society and communicate by dancing (waggle dance). A honey bee can travel as much as 7 kilometres to find flowers and then communicate the information for other bees

to find them with this dance. Studies show there is a loss of communication and memory among honey bees exposed to neonicotinoid pesticides. Some countries such the UK and countries of European Union have banned their use. This is not the case in North America where protection is offered to agricultural and chemical companies while detractors of their products have to provide absolute and irrefutable proof of harm before governments move to ensure environmental or consumer safety. In these instances the idea of the precautionary principle has been flipped on its head to protect monetary interests from the well-being

Something is rotten here and while we wait for action we are placed precariously on the verge of a major disaster which is what a world without bees would amount to. Every third bite on your plate is directly linked to honey bees. Without wild bees our plant diversity would shrink and take the species that depend on them along as well.

of society.

The potential outcome of this type of disaster actually threatens society in ways that are not even being discussed by our government. Worse, our scientists are muzzled by the current 'control the message' government so we can't be sure we are receiving the opinion of the specialists we hire to do public research on the safety and suitability of pesticides.

There are other potential reasons for colony collapse which will be leaned on by companies with a monetary interest in doing nothing. They have strong lobbying presences and wine and dine the political support they need to maintain status quo. An unfortunate part of that status quo is the acceptance of the widespread decline in bees along with other pollinators and the negative consequences that flows from that. Surely it is time for the government to take this issue seriously.

Recipe

An easy salad to prepare that combines the favourite pasta salad with the ingredients found in a Greek salad. A great salad for summer barbecues, an easy weekday lunch or as a dinner side dish.



Greek Vinaigrette Pasta Salad

- 1 pound pasta (shells are nice in this salad)
- 1 whole green bell pepper, seeded and diced
- 1 whole small cucumber (cut fourths and diced)
- 2 whole small vine-ripened tomatoes, diced
- Greek Vinaigrette Dressing (use as much as desired)
- 1/4 teaspoons salt
- 1/4 teaspoons ground pepper
- Feta cheese (crumbled)

Cook pasta according to package directions. Dice bell pepper, cucumber, and tomatoes. When pasta is finished cooking, combine all ingredients and coat in Greek vinaigrette. Add salt and pepper to taste. Chill in the refrigerator before serving. Before serving add desired amount of feta cheese and toss.

Kids Korner

Glow Stick Lightning Bug

- One 20 ounce green plastic soda bottle, empty and cleaned out (label removed)
- One glow stick
- Three 12 inch pipe cleaners in green or black, for the legs
- One 12 inch pipe cleaner in gold, silver, or black (for the antennae)
- Two yellow pony beads (for the eyes)
- Construction paper or card stock (for thorax and wings)
- Glue
- Scissors
- Black paint
- Clear tape

Clean out a green 20 ounce pop bottle. Remove the label by soaking it in warm water. Wash well and allow it to dry completely. Twist three 12 inch green or black pipe cleaners around the middle of the bottle. Give them a twist to secure, and then bend them to look like legs. Cut a rectangle of construction paper or card stock to wrap around the pop bottle. Don't have it wrap completely. Cut the rectangle slightly smaller so it ends where the legs show. Glue this paper on to the body to secure. Fold another piece of construction paper or card stock in half. Cut a wing-like shape, using the fold to create mirror images of the wings. Glue these on top of the firefly's body. Paint the bottle cap black and allow it to dry. Screw the cap on the firefly. Glue two yellow pony beads to the sides of it, to be the lightning bug's eyes. Then, wrap a 12 inch gold pipe cleaner around the neck of the bottle, twist to secure, and curl the ends to be the lightning bug's antennae. Crack to activate a glow stick and place it inside. You can let it be loose, or use a bit of clear tape to secure the top end of the glow stick near the mouth of the bottle.

In The Loop

The Regular Council meeting for July was again very brief (approx. 11 min)

Included in the agenda package was the June 2013 Financial Report. The Clerk Treasurer/Administrator assured Council that tracking of the 2013 budget numbers showed that the town is on target.

Council accepted a proposal from J.L. Richards to complete a Community Improvement/ Revitalization Plan for Espanola. The cost is estimated to be \$32,956. After federal and provincial grants are factored in the portion the Town has to cover will be \$4950. When this process eventually gets underway, there will undoubtedly be public consultation meetings and we encourage everyone to take part. During final comments Mayor Lehoux explained that the District of Sudbury Social Assistance Board (DSSAB) fund had a surplus

of approx. \$212,000 for 2012. The DSSAB board decided that this money should be returned to the contributing communities. Espanola's share will see a return of around \$30,000.


