Aftershocks in Espanola
 By *Chloe Kneer* - The recent Espanola Domtar mill reassessment decision and the subsequent February 13th public meeting hosted by Deputy Mayor Jill Beer and the Espanola town council has left aftershocks that are still being felt in the community. The looming possibility of higher property taxes has left residents, particularly the large senior population, feeling unsettled and worried. Blair Wilson is so outraged at the thought of his property taxes going up again that he wrote a point-by-point letter to council and is circulating petitions to demand budget cuts rather than raise taxes. Wilson has also requested to be added to the agenda of the March 12th council meeting so that he can present his letter and the signed petitions to the Mayor and councillors. He is upset that ratepayers weren't more well-informed of the meeting, saying, "no one I talked to knew about it...I read about it on the Espanola Historical Society Facebook page." His letter cites many points that are echoed by residents, among them the fact that the tax hike is seemingly being blamed on Domtar. "If I were Domtar's CEO, I would think twice about investing a great deal of money on a mill located in a town where residents are unhappy with how I conduct my business. Domtar is always looking at ways to save money and stay competitive. The ones at fault are MPAC and ARB (the Assessment Review Board) for its decision, and town councils past and present for spending on wants of the best of everything and not



Espanola Police Services Receives \$ 30,000 Grant



The Espanola municipal police are the recipients of a funding grant in accordance with Ontario Regulation 498/06 of the Civil Remedies Act, 2001. The initial application was made in 2011 and in December 2012 the service was notified that its application had been accepted. The grant funds are provided on a one-time basis to purchase specific items not allotted for in the service's regular annual budget. These funds have been made possible by a grant from the Attorney General of Ontario from

funds forfeited to the Crown under the Civil Remedies Act. The following is the acknowledgement statement from the Attorney General.

"The Civil Remedies Grant Program is helping law enforcement agencies across Ontario buy state-of-the-art equipment and establish programs that reduce unlawful activity and support victims of crime. what we actually need." At the meeting, Deputy Mayor Beer emphasized that "anything is on the table" and that council will entertain residents' input on cost-savings. She also said the municipality has reached out to MPP Mike Mantha. When contacted for comment, Mantha said, "At the moment we are trying to collect as much information as possible. I have brought this matter to the attention of the Minister and personally handed him a letter outlining my concerns. Representatives from the town of Espanola have met with Ministry officials. Furthermore my office is attempting to facilitate a meeting with MPAC to shed some light on this dire matter." Espanola resident Bob Yocum hopes that any meeting between council and MPAC be made public, "I would request that this meeting be open to all residents so that they may hear MPAC's explanation first-hand." In the meantime, Wilson outlined several cost-cutting measures in his letter, including selling off some of the new equipment that the public works department uses. He also cited the recreation complex, which has been a hot-button issue for years for requiring millions of dollars in tax payer subsidies to stay open. "If it [the complex] can't even pay for operating costs, then one way or another

get rid of it." Wilson addressed in further detail how a tax hike will affect the town's large senior population, many of whom say they will sell their homes if taxes go up, "this at a time when the province is trying to make it easier for us to stay in our homes longer and ease the burden on hospitals, nursing homes, and long-term care facilities. We are already one of, or the, highest taxed community in northern Ontario."

Seniors may be more vocal, but young families are equally as concerned. Steven Neufeld says, "this problem goes beyond the Domtar reassessment. If this latest fiasco is not enough to wake the people who run this town up, then I don't know what will." A few other residents from the younger demographic wished to remain nameless, but say they are weighing their options and watching closely as events unfold.

"The Town is absolutely looking at cost-cutting measures, I think one has to look at the significance of this and realize, this is not a process that is going to find \$5 million dollars in the next 10 months," says Clerk/Treasurer Administrator Cynthia Townsend, "However, it is certainly one that Mayor, Council, and Administration are committed to in order to deliver a balanced budget for 2013."

School Boards Approve Common Calendar for 2013-2014

Blue-Green Algae Found in Ella Lake

The Ministry of the Environment has advised the Sudbury & District Health Unit that results from samples taken February 15, 2013, from Ella Lake, south east of Nairn Centre, are positive for blue-green algae (cyanobacteria). The samples contained a species of cyanobacteria that can produce toxins. On Friday, February 22, public health inspectors from the Health Unit delivered written notices to Ella Lake residences with road access.

Blue-green algal blooms could also appear in other parts of the lake. Because blooms are not anchored, they can move from one location to another through wind action. New blooms can also form. All residents on the lake should look for blooms in their area.

Blue-green algal blooms have an unsightly pea soup appearance and foul smell, and can produce toxins. Residents should avoid using or drinking water from areas where blooms are visible.

The highest concentrations of toxins are usually found in blooms and scum on the shoreline. These dense accumulations pose the greatest potential risks to people and pets. The algae toxins can irritate a person's skin and, if ingested, cause diarrhea and vomiting. If a person ingests high levels of toxin, they could suffer liver and nervous system damage.

The Health Unit advises people using lakes and rivers to be on the lookout for algal blooms. If you see a bloom near your property or water intake line:

- Avoid using the water for drinking, bathing, or showering, and do not allow children, pets, or livestock to drink or swim in the bloom.
- Be aware that shallow drinking water intake pipes can pump in blue-green algae.
- Do not boil the water or treat it with a disinfectant, like bleach, because it breaks open the algae cells, which releases more toxins into the water.
- Avoid cooking with the water because food may absorb toxins from the water during cooking.
- Exercise caution with respect to eating fish caught in water where blue-green algal blooms occur. Residents should not eat the liver, kidneys, and other organs of fish caught in the water.
- Do not rely on water jug filtration systems as they may not protect against the toxins.

On lakes and rivers where blue-green algal blooms are confirmed, people who use the surface water for their private drinking water supply may wish to consider an alternate, protected source of water.

Recipe

This is a repeat recipe in case anyone is keeping track, but I just made it as requested by my son for his birthday and I had forgotten how good it is. It's too good; I couldn't stop myself from "just eating a small piece" every time I went into the kitchen. My jeans cutting off my circulation every time I sit down are a reminder of just how much I love this moist cake frosted in sinfully, delicious cream cheese frosting. The cooking method is a bit different than the norm; the stated oven temperature is correct and yes, you are to place the steaming hot cake into the freezer, but these two things result in a super moist cake.



Banana Cake with Cream Cheese Frosting

- ¾ cup butter
- 2 1/8 cups white sugar
- 3 eggs
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 3 cups of flour
- 1 ½ teaspoons baking soda
- ¼ teaspoons salt
- 1 ½ cups buttermilk
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice
- 1 ½ cups mashed bananas

Frosting

- ½ cup butter, softened
- 1 (8oz) package cream cheese
- 3 ½ cups icing sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Preheat oven to 275 degrees. Grease and flour a 9 x 13 inch pan. In a small bowl, mix mashed bananas with lemon juice, set aside. In a medium bowl, mix flour, baking soda and salt. Set aside. In a large bowl, cream ¾ cup butter and 2 1/8 cups sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in the eggs one at a time, and then stir in the 2 teaspoons of vanilla. Beat in the flour alternately with the buttermilk. Stir in banana mixture. Pour batter into prepared pan. Bake in preheated oven for 1 hour (it usually takes 1 ½ hours for me) or until a toothpick inserted into the center of the cake comes out clean. Remove from oven and place directly into the freezer for 45 minutes. This makes the cake moist. For the frosting, cream together the ½ cup of butter and cream cheese until smooth. Beat in vanilla. Add icing sugar and beat on low speed until combined and then on high until frosting is smooth. Spread on cooled cake.

Cut the twine or string to the desired length, and start threading, then tie it off when you're done. You can make several ahead and package individually in Ziploc bags.
