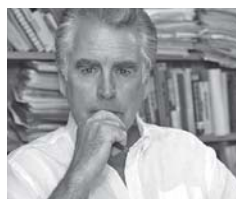

Staying Safe on the Roads this Summer

(SUDBURY/ESPANOLA)

The Ontario Provincial Police is reminding all drivers to practice safe driving habits. Members of the Sudbury and Espanola OPP detachments have responded to a many aggressive driving complaints throughout the Sudbury, Espanola, and Manitoulin Island corridors. Some of the complaints have involved vehicles travelling too fast, driving aggressively and following too closely on the roadway.

For cars and small trucks, the Highway Traffic Act states that the driver shall not follow closer than is reasonable or prudent given the road conditions, weather and speed of the motor vehicles. No matter what traffic situation you are driving in, ask yourself if you would have time to stop to avoid a collision if the vehicle in front of you suddenly applied their brakes. If the answer is no, then you need to create more space between your vehicles.

For tractor trailers the Highway Traffic Act states that the driver of a commercial motor vehicle, when driving on a highway at a speed exceeding 60 kilometers per hour, shall not follow within 60 metres of another vehicle except when preparing to or actually overtaking another motor vehicle.

Following too closely, speeding and aggressive driving is very dangerous and places everyone who travels on the highways at risk. It creates undue stress on the

drivers involved and dramatically increases the risk of a preventable collision. Those who drive aggressively may feel that they are "making time" by getting to their destination sooner, however studies have shown that the actual time saved is very minimal. The seconds saved do not justify the additional jeopardy that these drivers are placing on everyone travelling.

Members of the Sudbury/Espanola OPP detachments will be strictly enforcing speed limits and the rules of the road on all area highways to ensure that everyone drives responsibly and with courtesy to others using the roads.

Aggressive driving includes speeding, running red lights, tailgating, weaving in and out of traffic and failing to yield right of way among other behaviours. Collision statistics reveal that 27% of fatalities and 19% of serious injuries involve speeding. Fines for violations:

Speeding 20 km/hr over the limit - \$95 (3 demerit points)
Disobey stop sign - \$110 (3 demerit points)
Pass not in safety - \$110 (3 demerit points)
Follow to close - \$110 (3 demerit points)
Careless driving - \$325 (6 demerit points)
Failing to wear complete seatbelt assembly - \$110 (2 demerit points)
Failing to ensure infant, toddler or child properly secured - \$110 (2 demerit points)

Recipe

My daughter says that I must put this recipe in my column because she loves these potatoes. So, I do as I'm told! They are not hard to make; once you put them in the skillet and cover them with the parchment paper; you just stand back and let them simmer. You may want to stir them near the end of cooking so that they don't stick. They become slightly sweetened and are nice served with a steak or any type of meat for that matter. The recipe calls for fingerling potatoes which I couldn't find so I used a bag of mini potatoes and they turned out delicious. Cooking them this way, coaxes the starch out of the potatoes and creates a creamy, buttery pan sauce.



Braised Potato Coins

- 2 pounds fingerling potatoes or a bag of mini potatoes
- 2 cups water
- 1/4 cup + 2 Tbsp's of butter, cut into bits
- 3 tablespoons finely chopped flat-leaf parsley

Cut a round of parchment paper to fit just inside a 12-inch heavy skillet and butter one side. Slice potatoes 1/8 inch thick with slicer or with a knife (I don't bother getting out my slicer, it doesn't take long to cut them with a knife). Arrange in skillet. Add water, 3/4 teaspoon salt, and 1/2 teaspoon pepper. Dot the top of potatoes with butter. Cover potatoes with parchment, buttered side down, and briskly simmer until tender and most of liquid has evaporated, 30 to 35 minutes. Serve sprinkled with parsley.

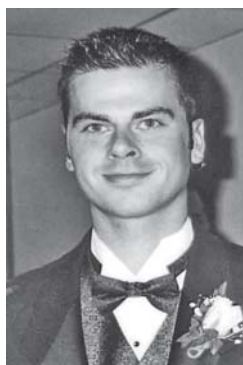

Espanola Police Report

Drug Offence - On May 3, 2013 at 12:12 am, the Espanola Police Service stopped a motor vehicle at Jacklin Road and Highway 6 in Espanola.

During the traffic stop, the officer detected the odor of burnt Marihuana coming from within the vehicle, and noted Marihuana flakes on the centre console, next to a Marihuana grinder. As a result of his observations, the officer arrested the 30-year old driver for Possession of a Controlled Substance, and following a search of the vehicle incident to arrest; the officer located a duffle bag in the vehicle containing a total of 4187 grams (9.2 pounds) of Cannabis Marihuana, having an estimated street value of \$62,808.00.

As a result of the traffic stop, 30-year old Christopher Schraeder of Espanola, was charged with one count of Possession for the Purpose of Trafficking, contrary to section 5(2) of the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act, and one count of Possession of Property Obtained by Crime, contrary to section 354 (1) of the Criminal Code of Canada. The accused was held for a Show Cause Hearing on the 3rd May 2013, in Sudbury.

The accused 2004 Nissan motor vehicle was seized as offence related property, and may be subject to forfeiture upon conviction.

Charges:

- Production of a Controlled Substance, Sec. 7(1) CDSA
- Possession for the Purpose of Trafficking, Sec. 5(2) CDSA (2 counts)
- Possession of a Controlled Substance, Sec. 4(1) CDSA (2 counts)
- Possession of Property Obtained by Crime, Sec. 354(1) Criminal Code

On April 23, 2013, the Espanola Police Service assisted the Children's Aid Society in checking on the well being of a minor child at a home located on Secord Street, Espanola. The Children's Aid Society received information that the child may be at risk, as the two adults residing at the residence were growing Marihuana.

Upon attendance, police located 10 Marihuana plants growing inside the residence, including 7 of the plants growing in the child's own bedroom. Also, police located 64 Prescription Codeine pills, 19 grams of Cannabis Marihuana, a small quantity of Psilocybin (Magic Mushrooms), a small quantity of Cannabis-Hashish, \$190 in Canadian Currency, and indicia that suggested the trafficking of Controlled Substances. The street value of the drugs seized is estimated to be \$800.

As a result of the investigation, a 34-year old male, and 38-year old female were charged with a number of drug related offences under the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act. The accused parties are to appear in court on June 4, 2013 to answer to their charges.
