The Mead Street Cat Project: An Update

Bv Chloe Kneer - It's been quite a ride for Dr. PJ Rocheleau and his staff and volunteers since the Mead Street Cat Project began in December. our original story, we reported that Dr. Rocheleau estimated that there were fifty or so cats running wild, plaguing the Espanola neighborhood near the ball fields. Once the barn was up and running, however, reality set in that this is a much bigger problem than anticipated. "We convinced a few shelters to help us with these cats and each shelter committed to taking a total of four or five cats. Well, since we started, we've been capturing four or five cats a week," says Dr. Rocheleau. Two of those cats gave



Muslims celebrating the collapse of New York City's twin towers. While enjoying all the macabre merrymaking surrounding her death, one partygoer said: "It's about time Thatcher did something to raise community spirit!"

The depth of hostility still felt by certain sectors of Great Britain was matched only by the depravity of the jokes posted after her death. "When I realized Margaret Thatcher was dead, I did a fist pump and shouted: "------ brilliant! Everyone around me was disgusted, and looking back, I suppose I was out of order. Especially as I was the first paramedic at the scene."

Posted another: "I was very upset to hear about Mrs. Thatcher's death. She died peacefully."

Thatcher's death gave former Prime Minister Brian Mulroney a few more minutes of media attention. contemporaries, staunch right wingers and fervent free marketers, they differed in that the Iron Lady's career was never dogged by scandal or shame. Although Thatcher was only too pleased to watch corporations rule her country's economy, she never asked for her cut.

To say Margaret Thatcher never suffered fools gladly is wrong. If it didn't seem such an abuse of power, she'd have had them put in jail. "The Iron Lady" could never be accused of being magnanimous – if she wanted your opinion she'd write it down for you.

Glaring out at fellow conservatives who wanted her to ease up on her ruthless economic policies, from the podium she told them that when she retired she was going to start a business and it would be called "Rent-A-Spine."

Which is why my fondest memory of Margaret Thatcher will always be the one provided by the cruel but hilarious television show Spitting Images.

The comedy troupe used exaggerated, ghoulish-looking puppets of British politicians in their sketches and Thatcher was the best and most frequent target.

The scene is in a restaurant with Thatcher sitting around a dining table with her mostly male cabinet.

Waitress: "What'll it be Lady Thatcher?"

Thatcher: "I'll have a steak." Waitress: "How would you like it?"

Thatcher: "Raw."

Waitress: "And the vegetables?"

Thatcher, after looking around the table says: "Oh, they'll have what I'm having."

Espanola, Ontario (April 2013) - Picture thousands of people - friends, families, co-workers and cancer survivors - united together for one night for one common cause. Cambrian Constructs Personal Support Worker Simulation Lab



Cambrian College Personal Support Worker (PSW) students will soon be learning in a state-of-the-art simulation lab thanks to \$107,000 in funding support from the SIM-one Ontario Simulation Network, a not-for-profit organization that helps to advance simulated clinical learning and improve the quality of patient care in the province. The new lab space will be completed for the September 2013 intake of PSW students.

"Personal support workers are a growing and vital component of the health care system in Ontario," commented Cambrian Sylvia College President, Barnard. "Our students are already recognized for their ability to move quickly and effectively from the classroom to the workforce upon graduation. With the construction of a new simulation lab, graduates will be even better positioned to provide quality care and services."

The new lab will replicate the home and apartment environments and conditions that PSWs encounter as they provide care and assist patients with activities of daily living. Students will be able to practice many skills associated with home care, in a safe learning environment that physically mirrors the workplace.

"In addition to developing the working infrastructure and furnishings of a typical home, funding will also support the purchase of heath care equipment and aids that PSWs use on a daily basis," said Dan Draper, Dean of Health Sciences and Emergency Services. "Learning through simulation is a recognized best practice in education, and the new simulation lab and equipment takes Cambrian's PSW learning experience to a new level."

Applications to Cambrian's PSW program are up nearly 55 percent compared to this time last year. This increase in applications is timely, as 40 to 45 percent of nurses and PSWs are expected to retire in the next 10 years. One of the fastest growing jobs in the province, PSWs can expect to find employment opportunities in hospitals, long-term care facilities, community health agencies and private homes. Graduates of the PSW program may also qualify for advanced standing into the second year of Cambrian's two-year Practical Nursing program.

his hospital and the shelters are now at capacity.

Getting volunteers to commit to the project has been relatively easy. The list has between twenty and thirty names on it. The volunteers have helped with the feeding stations at the designated barn to attract the cats into live traps and kennels. The project, however, has had its share of setbacks, including a recent break-in during which solar power equipment and heated bowls were stolen. "We lost about \$400 worth of equipment that we never got to use," says Dr. Rocheleau. In order to prevent further vandalism, motion sensor

lights and cameras are being installed, and Dr. Rocheleau makes visits to the site at all hours of the day and night.

Despite the difficulties of the project, Dr. Rocheleau is committed to helping solve the problem. To that end, he continues to ask the public to observe the town's by-law that states a pet must be kept on the owner's property. "In the near future, animal control and I will be working to make sure that the pet owners who don't observe the by-law are fined. Leaving your cat outside to roam is only contributing to the problem we have and this problem isn't only in the area of the ball fields. I get calls from all over town."

In order to keep the Mead Street Cat Project moving forward, Dr. Rocheleau says, "It's become apparent that we need temporary shelter for about thirty cats. The town has

been looking into structures that might work, or we are hoping that someone will volunteer a space for us. If we end up having to rent, we will do some fund-raising in order to have at least \$10,000 in the bank to get us through the first six months. We will consider anything with heat, hydro, and water, so if someone has a spot, we would be grateful. Otherwise, we may have to go after a store front of some kind."

Although Rocheleau Dr. doesn't want to be in the shelter business, he sees little alternative if the project is to be a success. Follow the Mead Street Cat Project on the Espanola Animal Hospital's Facebook page. You will find photos of some of the cats who have been captured and details on upcoming events or projects. Reminder For Use of Quads on Roadways

The OPP is reminding the public that the use of quads on roadways has restrictions. First, you should check with your town to see if any local roads are not to be driven on with quads. Then, keep the following rules in mind as you head out for a ride:

- Quads can be operated on the shoulder of the roadway and move to travelled portion if shoulder is impassable or unsafe;
- Driver must operate in the same direction of traffic;
- -Driver must be 16 and hold minimum class G2/M2 drivers licence:
- -Driver must wear a helmet, have valid insurance, and registration;
- No passengers are allowed, even if the quad has an approved passenger seat;
- If speed limit is 50 km/hr, a driver cannot exceed 20 km/
- If speed limit exceeds 50 km/hr, driver cannot exceed 50 km/hr.

Recipe

This is a twist on the traditional Greek salad. It almost tastes better the day after it is made, so it is perfect if you are looking for something you can make ahead during this upcoming busy season.



Greek Salad with Broccoli and Cauliflower

- 1 head broccoli, chopped into bite-sized pieces
- 1 small head cauliflower, chopped into bite-sized pieces
- 10 oz. grape tomatoes
- 6 oz. black or Kalamata olives, pitted
- 8 oz. white mushrooms, sliced
- 1/2 cup Greek or Italian dressing
- Freshly ground black pepper, to taste
- 8 oz. feta cheese, crumbled

Combine broccoli, cauliflower, grape tomatoes, olives and mushrooms in a large bowl. Pour dressing over vegetables and season with freshly ground black pepper. Stir thoroughly to combine, making sure all veggies are coated with the dressing. Place salad in the refrigerator, covered, for at least 2 hours before serving, so that flavors have a chance to meld together. Just before serving, sprinkle feta cheese over the top. This salad can be made a day ahead. Simply store the salad in the refrigerator overnight, in a sealed container.

Celery Stamped Roses

- A bunch of celery
- Paper to paint on
- Poster paint
- Rubber bands
- Paint brushes
- A flat surface to hold paint i.e. a plastic plate, plastic lid



To start, wrap some rubber bands tightly around the top of the celery. Wrap a few more about half way down the bunch. Trim the top off the celery so that the ends are flush. Then, cut the celery straight across just below the middle rubber bands (this will give you three stamps to work with). When you pick up the two bunches of celery, you'll see that their cross sections look a bit like roses. Place some paint on the plate or plastic lid and spread it around a bit. Dip the "rose" end of the celery into the paint and stamp onto the paper. Paint as many "flowers" onto the paper as you like. You can dip the different ends of the celery bunches in different colour paint giving you 3 different sizes and colour of roses. When you've finished adding flowers to your paper, add stems. Let your painting dry and then hang it up where you can enjoy it.
