In The Loop

The Council meeting on November 12 was uneventful. The prior week's motions recommended by the Corporate Committee were unanimously approved. The Town of Espanola will purchase a new software system to replace the antiquated one which is now being used. The cost is higher than budgeted for but additional funds will be allocated to compensate for this in the 2014 budget.

The 2014 election method has been approved by Council. It will be a "vote by mail" process. One polling station will still remain open for those who wish to vote as they have in the past. Tabulating machines will be leased to speed up the election night results. The 2014 election cost is projected to be \$30,060... an increase from \$18,696 in 2010. Council will submit a letter to the Province supporting stricter enforcement and harsher penalties to aid in the abolition of contraband tobacco.

During the verbal session at the end of the meeting one councillor suggested more direction be given to departments on the budget process before they begin deliberations. No discussion followed.

Another councillor expressed concerns about the sharing of school resources and went on at length about the problems which are inherent in the sharing of facilities. It was suggested that he attend the next public meeting and explain his concerns to the Ministry of Education since this does not fall under Council's jurisdiction. In closing, there was no mention of the Service Delivery Review

In closing, there was no mention of the Service Delivery Review that was promised during the Town's Strategic Plan presentation last spring and as of November 13, Mr. Bill Foster had not yet received a response from Council to the request he made on October 6 to present his research on policing costs.

News from the Park

This week in the legislature the voices of many in Algoma-Manitoulin and across the north were heard. For over a year I have been receiving calls from constituents requesting that the Ministry of Transportation change the definition of an Off-Road Vehicle (ORV) under the Highway Traffic Act Regulation 316/03.

ORV enthusiast across Ontario have repeatedly asked that this regulation be changed to include the two-up off-road vehicles as well as the 2 and 4 seat side-byside off-road vehicles to allow them to be driven under the same conditions as other recreational offroad/all-terrain vehicles.

Many of you have been working hard to circulate petitions and send back thousands of signed copies. I have been presenting these petitions in the legislature on your behalf. This week all your efforts paid off and the motion to amend the Highway Traffic Act passed. It is good to see what we can achieve when we work together on issues that matter to us in the north.

In other news, as Northern Development and Mines Critic for the NDP I have been putting immense pressure on the Liberal Government to develop a framework for mining projects in the Ring of Fire and across the north. We have recently witnessed growing frustrations within mining companies, First Nations and northern communities who are unimpressed with the government's lack of action on this file. There has been no effort from the government to move things forward and quite frankly, investors are ready to move on and take those much needed jobs with them.

Feeling the heat from the NDP, the Wynne Liberals announced the creation of a development corporation to begin making decisions about the Ring of Fire project. What this would look like remains to be seen. I have requested a briefing from the Minister to understand how this development corporation for the Ring of Fire will actually advance this development beyond just a pipedream.

Ontario needs development in the Ring of Fire and it is troubling that it's taken five years for government to start thinking about an actual plan for Ring of Fire development. I am concerned that this is just another plan to make a plan which ends with no results.

Infrastructure to the Ring of Fire and the high price of electricity remain the major issues facing Ring of Fire development and the provincial government needs to play its part. The government also needs to play a role in proper consultation with First Nations and develop revenue sharing tools so that the benefits from the Ring of Fire stay with communities in the North. The government needs to look at training opportunities and the creation of value added processing jobs that will result from the Ring of Fire. I will continue to push the government on this issue and others which are important for constituents in Algoma-Manitoulin and all northerners.

Recipe

It's that time of year again... Christmas cookie time! Nothing says Christmas season is here more than seeing the cartons of eggnog in the grocery stores. These festive, delicious, little morsels contain all the flavours of eggnog in a cookie form. They can be made ahead and frozen.



Eggnog Thumbprints (yield: 4 dozen)

- 2/3 cup butter, softened
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1-1/2 cups all-purpose flour • 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 eggs, separated
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/8 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1 cup finely chopped walnuts


FILLING:

- 1/4 cup butter, softened
- 1 cup confectioners' sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon rum extract
- 1 to 2 teaspoons 2% milk
- 1 to 2 drops yellow food coloring, optional

In a large bowl, cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in egg volks and vanilla. Gradually stir in the flour, salt and nutmeg and mix well. Cover and refrigerate for 1 hour or until firm. In a small bowl, whisk egg whites until foamy. Shape dough into 1-in. balls; dip in egg whites, then roll in walnuts. Place 2 in. apart on baking sheets coated with cooking spray. Using a wooden spoon handle or your thumb, make a 1/2-in. indentation in the center of each ball. Bake at 350° for 10-12 minutes or until center is set. Carefully remove from pans to wire racks to cool. For filling, combine the butter, confectioners' sugar, extract and enough milk to achieve a spreading consistency. Tint with food coloring if desired. Pipe about 1/2 teaspoon into each cookie.

These can be used as ornaments, gift toppers, and even small gifts. They take hardly any time at all and are very inexpensive to make.



- Green felt
- Glue {craft glue, or hot glue}
- Yellow foam
- · Beads and/or other assorted "ornaments"





Roughly measure out a piece of green felt to see how tall you want your tree to be. You want the candy cane trunk to show. Fold the felt and cut out a Christmas tree shape. Cut slits for the candy cane to slide through. You want them just big enough for the candy cane. Now it's time to decorate. Cut a small star out of the yellow foam for the top of the tree. Pull out the candy cane and glue on the star and some ornaments. Allow time for the glue to dry before inserting the candy cane again.

Mr. Espanola, King of Lions, Leaves Big Shoes To Fill: A Memorial Tribute to Paul Zahorec

When Paul Zahorec's name is mentioned, many thoughts come to mind: leadership, dedication, vision, cooking, Lionism ... All of these are related to, and combine, to form one concept: service. Espanola lost a pillar of the community on October 31 with the passing of Mr. Zahorec, an Espanola Lions Club member for twenty-one years, and a five-time Lions Club

Interestingly, Mr. Zahorec's first visit to the Lions was in 1992. He wasn't there to join. Rather, he was looking for money. He ended up staying for the business meeting, however, and the rest, as they say, is history. He had found a group with a heart of service that matched his own. Mr. Zahorec was all about community and children. He was the face of bingo in



town for fifteen-plus years as well as the driving force behind the Espanola Lions Club Children's Toy Drive. To his Lions brothers and sisters, he was known as the King of Lions.

Lion Rock Taylor remembers, "Paul was a natural leader. His passion for anything that would enhance his community was contagious." Taylor eulogized Mr. Zahorec, fondly recalling hours-long meetings to help the hospital and extended-care facilities. He had a tremendous hand in securing thirty-two long-term care beds for the hospital.

Mr. Zahorec's touch was felt far and wide. The Espanola Helping Hand Food Bank always appreciated his support, "We will always be ever so grateful to Paul and his beloved Lions Club for his consideration and assistance in aiding the food bank to stay viable for the past eight years. He would drop in to chat, to see how we were doing, offer suggestions and let us know when the Lions were going to hold their next community food drive."

Mr. Zahorec was, in many ways, the "go-to" guy. His wife Hester says, "People would always phone Paul with questions because they just assumed he knew what to do in every situation. Paul was also the type of guy who did what he said he would do. People knew they could count

on him." Truth be told, Mr. Zahorec was able to accomplish what he did because of the support of his wife. She says, "I never worked so hard until after Paul retired." Together they ran bake sales, charity breakfasts, and made over 55,000 perogies. Mrs. Zahorec says, "And I never even ate a one." At his funeral, there were shoes placed around the Espanola United Church, where he was a member of the Church Board and loved singing in the choir. The shoes symbolize the "big shoes" that would needed to be filled as a result of his passing. Mrs. Zahorec recalls with a laugh, "I always told Paul that if he didn't have such big feet, he'd be a lot taller."

Son Christopher says of his father, "He served because of the love and compassion that he knew you deserved to make Espanola not just another dot on the map, but a place worth living. A place to be proud of. A place to always call home." Mr. Zahorec is survived by his wife Hester, two sons Jeffrey and Christopher and four grandchildren.

"I would like to say a few words about Paul Zahorec and what he meant to me. Paul was one of the very first to believe in what I was doing with the paper very early on and his encouragement over the years, especially when my parents were passing, meant so much to me. He often stopped by for visits and we would chat about everything that was going on in the community and with that he taught me so much more about paying it forward. The Espanola community has suffered a huge loss as Paul's volunteerism was more than exceptional. He was very passionate about giving his time and, of course, with Hester at his side meant they were a force to reckon with. No one could say "no" to this fun-loving wonderful individual who always fought hard for all of his worthy causes. He was a mentor to many people. We can only hope his great example inspires others to serve the way he did."
