### And That's Why I Love Small Town Living

Port Colborne, a lakefront city at the top you might find yourself standing next of the Welland Canal with a population of 18,500 people is really just a small town. It's so small the three bargain stores downtown are within shouting distance of each other. In fact Port Colborne is so small that 20 years ago when it experienced its very first hostage taking standoff, the gunman couldn't find a victim. So he took himself hostage.

This is good news for family, friends and neighbours of the hostage taker; bad news for your home-alone gunman. You see, and I believe the experts will back me up on this one, in a prolonged process of negotiation, a gunman without a hostage has severely limited bargaining power. For instance, when a gunman comes out to make his break, holds the gun to his own head and vells: "Cash and a car or I'm gonna pop this guy!" every emergency task force team in Canada is trained to stand down and let this problem pretty much take care of itself. For me, it just doesn't work. No, for me a hostage-taker without a hostage is like a drive-by shooter on an exercise bike. It's like a bank robber flashing a valid driver's license instead of a ransom note.

The incident in Port Colborne began when the ceiling of the gunman's apartment began leaking and he fired off several shots. I know what you're thinking – a lot of guys would've just called a plumber. Plus now you need six pails for the leaks instead of three.

Anyway, the police were summoned and the gunman settled in for the siege with a 30/30 rifle, a shotgun, a club, a hunting knife, a machete and a bow with arrows. Essentially he's as well-armed as any guy

to in a bar in Florida where if they can't ban weapons could they at least outlaw conversations about politics and religion. During the thirty-one-hour standoff that followed, the police who really did believe a person was being held at gun point, tried to call the gunman to negotiate an end to it

all. Unfortunately the guy did not have a phone. This was a real shock to residents out here in Wainfleet who already had call display. We're usually the last to get

everything.

At some point the police sent Freebee, their Remote Mobile Investigation Unit, into the apartment and the gunman shot the hell out of the robot. This was a big mistake. I'm no expert in this area, but couldn't Freebee have become the hostage he never had? Think about it – not only is that thing very expensive to replace, if it's as smart as the cops claim it is, the robot could have driven the gunman's getaway car.

Anyway, the good news is that Freebee was not killed. He was however listed in fair condition in the Intensive Care Unit at Atlas Steels in Welland.

The police noticed the blue light of a television set in the apartment so they cut off the TV cable for the whole building. Turns out he was watching a movie on a VCR. That's when they cut off the electricity ... to the whole city block.

At precisely 4:06 p.m. on the second day of the standoff, the Niagara Regional Police Emergency Task Force Unit said that 'enough is enough' and began what they called their "tear gas campaign." They lobbed over eighteen tear gas canisters at the window

of the gunman's apartment. Unfortunately every one of them missed the window and bounced off the side of the building. Eighteen misses in a row? That's not a "tear gas campaign." At that time in history eighteen turned out to be Kim Campbell's campaign! (She won two seats including her own.)

When the police finally did land one in the apartment, the gunman picked it up and threw it back out through the broken window. It's a wonder that all the residents of the building, who had been evacuated, didn't run back up the stairs and into the gunman's apartment because at this point, it's the only place in the neighbourhood with clean air.

After it was over I counted eighteen softball-sized pockmarks on the side of the building where the tear gas canisters bounced off. One such dent was two feet off the ground. The gunman's apartment was on the second floor. Either the police assumed he had a midget accomplice in a ground floor apartment or they just gotta straighten out the barrel of that gas gun.

Anyway, the gunman gave himself up. I don't know if it was the tear gas or the fear of losing his damage deposit. Personally, I think he just couldn't stand the brutal beating the vinyl siding was taking.

And that's why I love small town living. Because even in the throes of a real live hostagetaking standoff, neither the criminal nor the cops pose a threat to public safety. In nice little towns like Port Colborne, things have a way of working themselves out.

### **BEACH ADVISORY ISSUED: MASSEY**

(As of press time, the following advisory had been issued.) The Sudbury & District Health Unit has posted signs at the following beach advising against swimming at this time:

Sauble Mouth Park Beach, Massey

Going into the water puts bathers at risk for infections on the skin. and in the eyes and nose. Stomach disorders can also occur. Illness can occur if swimmers swallow beach water; if water gets into their ears, eyes, or nose; or if it comes in contact with open wounds.

Routine water samples taken by the Health Unit exceeded the acceptable bacteriological water quality standards for bathing beaches.

"We have enhanced monitoring and will continue taking water samples," said Cindy Peacock-Rocca, a manager in the Health Unit's Environmental Health Division.

### **Beware The Giant Hogweed Plant: Burns and Scarring Occur** From Contact With Sap

A huge, toxic plant that can burn skin and cause permanent blindness has been found for the first time in eastern Ontario, prompting calls for a federal response to contain the spread of the poisonous plant as fear grows no province is immune. A forestry official confirmed two

new findings of giant hogweed in Renfrew County, west of Ottawa. It has previously been spotted in Newfoundland, New Brunswick . Ouebec . southwestern Ontario , Alberta and British Columbia . Contact with the weed's

clear, watery sap can be very dangerous, Jeff Muzzi, Renfrew County's forestry manager and weed inspector.

"What it does to you is pretty ugly," said Mr. Muzzi, "It causes blisters. Large blisters and permanent scarring. What's left over looks like a scar from a chemical burn or fire."

If you come across Giant Hogweed, which generally grows in ditches alongside roads, do not attempt to touch or remove it. If you do come in contact with it, wash the area thoroughly with soap and water to minimize the impact. Topical steroid treatments can reduce the reaction as well.

### Espanola Junior 'A' Hockey Club **Completes 1st Annual Summer Sports Camp**

Thirty-three youth completed the week-long TnT Summer Sports Camp for kids led by the Espanola Rivermen Junior 'A' Hockey Club Head Coach and former NHL All-Star Tom McCarthy, accompanied by NOHA coaching instructor Bill Clarke, alongside twentytwo members of the newly named CJHL Rivermen.

### Recipe

This is a repeat recipe at the request of a reader looking for something to do with her garden tomatoes. It's my favourite salsa recipe and the spiciness can be adjusted to suit your taste by the amount of jalapeno peppers you add.



#### **Homemade Salsa**

- 14 -18 tomatoes, peeled
- 1 large Spanish onion
- 2 green peppers
- 5-7 jalapeno peppers
- ½ tbsp garlic powder
- 2 tbsp coarse salt
- ½ tbsp pepper

- ½ tbsp. crushed red pepper
- 1 tbsp sugar
- ½ tbsp. vegetable oil
- 1/4 cup vinegar
- ½ tbsp. cumin
- ½ tsp paprika
- ½ tsp chili powder

Hand chop tomatoes and let them sit a few minutes. Drain off excess juice to make salsa chunkier. Using a food processor (or by hand if you prefer) chop onion and peppers. Put all ingredients into a large pot and bring to a boil. Turn down heat and simmer to desired thickness (this takes an hour or more). Put into sterile jars and seal. Process jars if you prefer, but I have never done that step if jars have sealed well.

### **Kids Korner**

### **Paper Plate Seagull**

- Paper plate
- · Pencil or crayons
- Scissors
- Orange and yellow construction paper
- Glue
- Googly eyes (optional)
- Silver glitter (optional)



Take a plain white paper plate. Draw a head shape at the top of the plate with pencil or crayon. Next, cut around the head but leave it connected at the bottom. Then, fold down the wings to make it look like a seagull. The last step is to add detail. Cut out a beak from the orange construction paper and feet from the yellow construction paper. Glue on the beak and feet. You can draw on eyes or use googly eyes. If you have silver glitter, it looks great on the wings.

### **Self-Esteem Is Not Always Related To Good Grades**



school, it is not necessary

to get As, or even to pass,

in order for students to have

high self-esteem. For students of all ages, feeling good about

their abilities comes from

the confidence of knowing

that their minds are capable

of understanding, and from

learning and that they are worthy people, say experts in your child does and says. Is he or she a leader or follower or somewhere in between? Having a balance would reasonably suggest that healthy self-esteem is developing."

To evaluate this, ask the following questions:

- · Does your child have an independent mind?
- Is s/he willing to act on his/ her knowledge?
- Does all learning have to be highly structured or does s/he accept sudden change?
- Can your child willingly accept difficulty, or deal with failure?
- When confronted by failure, does s/he blame somebody else? Or does your child take responsibility for his or her own learning experiences and results?
- Is your child content just to get by with average achievement (so as not to stand out from his peer group) or does s/he try to excel?

Confidence is key to classroom success, says Dr. Whitehead, so keep tabs on your child's self-esteem, especially they enter pre-teen/teenage years and social pressures begin to mount. Evaluate your own communication and interaction as well. Do your part to help young students feel good about who they are and what they can achieve, both inside and outside the classroom.

this field. Indeed. a healthy selfdoesn't always esteem mean perfect grades the first time. According to Dr. Nick Whitehead, the CEO of Oxford Learning, some students with high selfesteem have only mediocre marks. That's because those students have learned a very important lesson: that trying is as important as success and that overcoming failure and learning from mistakes are essential to development.

Dr. Whitehead points out that parents can tell if children have healthy self-esteem by observing their actions.
