Ovarian Cancer Awareness Walk This Weekend



By Chloe Kneer - September is Gynecological Cancer Awareness Month and, more specifically, Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month. In 20% of cases, ovarian cancer is detected early and of those diagnosed early, 94% go on to live longer than five years.

Precise risk factors for ovarian cancer are not known, however, what is clear is that pregnancy, taking birth control pills, hysterectomy, and tubal ligation all lower the risk. The prominent symptoms of ovarian cancer include: bloating, pelvic or abdominal pain, trouble eating or feeling full quickly, and feeling an urgent and frequent sense of having to urinate. If you experience these symptoms, your first course of action would be to see your family doctor for a physical examination. From there, your doctor will refer you to a specialist for consultation. The specialist may order any number of tests, including ultrasound, CT scan, or positron emission tomography (PET) scan.

During the PET scan, radioactive glucose (sugar) is given to look for the cancer. Because cancers use glucose (sugar) at a higher rate than normal

Prorogation Marks Desperate Attempt To Change The Channel

If you watched Question Period during the last five weeks parliament sat in the spring, you didn't see much of the Prime Minister. When Stephen Harper was around over that stretch, it was anything but smooth sailing. Day after day he faced a tough line of questioning from Tom Mulcair about the Mike Duffy/Senate expense scandal and the attempted cover-up performed by the Prime Minister's chief of staff. His answers were weak and it was clear he was losing patience with the situation.

For a man with a reputation for controlling every situation it was easy to understand that he wouldn't want to be in Question Period. That doesn't mean that he should have avoided Parliament so much. Much the same, it is no excuse to avoid facing those same, tough, unanswered questions, but that is what the Prime Minister is doing by proroguing Parliament and delaying the start of the autumn sitting likely by as much a five weeks.

The problem with the growing cynicism over prorogation is of the Prime Minister's own making. This is the fourth time he has used the parliamentary tool and in each case it has been employed primarily to avoid scandal. The scandal he is avoiding this time is also of his own making. With the exception of Liberal Senator, Mac Harb, Stephen Harper appointed the Senators at the centre of the storm.

Throughout the summer the problem has only deepened.

While we do hear less about Mike Duffy and Nigel Wright, we are hearing more and more about Senator Pamela Wallin, who has now been ordered to repay \$138,970 due to misappropriation and is the subject of an ongoing RCMP investigation.

It looks as if the Prime Minister considered the appropriateness of his Senate appointments as a secondary concern when vetting candidates. The clear emphasis seems to have been on whether they were politically useful to the Conservative Party — especially with Senators Duffy and Wallin.

Now it is time to be accountable for those appointments and any attempts that members of the Prime Minister's inner circle have made to sweep these problems under the rug. Instead of returning to Parliament, answering the tough questions, and working our way through the government bills that remain at various stages of the parliamentary process, the Prime Minister is going to hide out for another month and start from scratch - again.

This buys a little time, but Canadians are clearly outraged by the entitled behavior of these patronage appointees and that anger won't dissipate as quickly as the Prime Minister hopes. What is being slowly ground down is any faith Canadians have in the effectiveness of our democratic institutions. It is beyond ironic that the Senate, which is inherently undemocratic, is at the heart of the problem. While the Prime Minister makes vague statements about reforming the Senate, public opinion is growing in support of the long held New Democrat position that we should just abolish it altogether.

As far as answering for the actions of his patronage appointees and senior members of his inner circle, the Prime Minister will eventually have to deal with the fact that no amount of hiding can wash away the bitter taste of deceit that Canadians are experiencing. Although it is clear he is going to give that another try.

Espanola Police Report

Break and Enter - On August 1, 2013, the Espanola Police Service was called to investigate a Break and Enter to a detached garage on Jacklin Road, Espanola. Upon arrival, police learned that unknown person(s) entered the garage sometime during the previous month, and removed a 2011 Stihl Model # 391 chainsaw from its carrying case, taking the saw, but leaving the case behind. The black, white and orange colored chainsaw, valued at \$700.00, was the only item missing from the garage.

At this time, police have no leads, and are asking that if anyone has information regarding this break and enter, or the whereabouts of the chainsaw, to call the Espanola Police Service at (705) 869-3251 or report anonymously through Crime Stoppers at 1-800-461-4899.

Fail to Attend Court - On August 6, 2013, 32-year old Jennifer Yurko of Espanola was to attend the Espanola Court to answer to fraud charges stemming from an incident in 2012; however, she failed to attend court as directed to do so, and the presiding Justice issued a Bench Warrant for her arrest.

On August 7, 2013, Yurko turned herself into the Espanola Police Service, and was arrested on the weight of the warrant, and charged with Failing to Attend Court, contrary to Section 145 (2) (b) of the Criminal Code of Canada. She is to appear in Espanola Court on the September 24, 2013 to answer to her new charges, in addition to her previous charges.

Theft Under - On July 27, 2013, the Espanola Police Service received a shoplifting complaint from the Remedy's RX Pharmacy in the Espanola Mall. Upon arrival, police were advised that an employee of the Pharmacy observed a female in the cosmetics aisle acting in a suspicious manner. The employee watched the female, and saw a number of new cosmetic items inside a tote bag the female was carrying. The store employee followed the female as she exited the store making no attempt to pay for the items, and when confronted in the mall parking lot, the female agreed to return to the store, where she turned over the tote. The tote was found to contain \$130.26 in cosmetic items belonging to the pharmacy, and another \$9.50 in items taken from the Dollarama Store. Prior to police arrival, the suspect exited the store, where she entered a vehicle in the parking lot and left southbound on Highway 6. With the assistance of the O.P.P., the vehicle was stopped near Whitefish Falls, and the female suspect was arrested and returned to Espanola.

As a result of the incident, 22-year old Nikki Trudeau of Wikwemikong was charged with one count of Theft Under \$5000.00 contrary to Section 334 (b) of the Criminal Code of Canada, and one count of Possession of Property Obtained by Crime, contrary to Section 355 (b) of the Criminal Code of Canada. She is to appear in Espanola Court on the 24Sep13, to answer to her charges.

In The Loop

This week's article will deal with three topics.

To begin, we would like to extend an invitation to all residents to attend our Fall Town Hall on September 18th at 7:00 pm at the K of C hall. The main topic will be a presentation on policing comparison costs for Espanola. This has been a five month research study and we are confident that you will find the results very informative! Those in attendance will receive a copy of the study.
The second topic is the Care

Van operation. Espanola's Clerk Treasurer/Administrator informed Council that funding had been reduced and that there is a shortfall of \$10,000 to operate this service. In terms of percentages this would mean a further reduction in services of 41.67% if other monies cannot be found within the present budget. The Care Van is the lifeline to our community for many of our seniors. We urge Council to come up with a solution and keep it operating as it presently does.

Finally on to the External Service Review. This was budgeted for in the 2013 budget. Monies were set in place to pay for it. It is an important step forward in finding ways to become more efficient. Four+ months have passed and to the best of our knowledge a date to begin this process has not been set by Council. This was a promise made to residents by Council during their Strategic Plan Presentation and should be on the "high priority list" considering the critical financial situation Espanola is faced with.

In closing, it has been a little over one (1) year since Council was given the draft of the Code of Conduct for Councillors. Council asked to review the document before voting on it. To date it has not resurfaced for either discussion or a vote.

tissues, the radioactivity will Northern Cancer Foundation's tend to concentrate in the cancer. A scanner can spot the radioactive deposits. This test can be helpful in spotting small collections of cancer cells. In some instances this test has proved useful in finding ovarian cancer that has spread. It is even more valuable when combined with a CT scan (PET/CT scan).

Summer Is Winding Down

With summer winding down and a new school year getting underway, the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) is reminding drivers to get reacquainted with sharing the road safely with school buses and the more than 800.000 Ontario school kids who will be crossing roads, getting on and off school buses and walking and biking to and from school.

All too often, drivers let their guard down in school zones during the summer months and with kids heading back to school, and it is important that drivers maintain an acute sense of awareness and expect the unexpected when driving near schools and in neighbourhoods where school buses and school kids are present.


Motorists also need to be mindful that more and more youths are texting and talking on cell phones as they travel to and from school and as such, they are likely to be more inattentive and unaware of their surroundings. Using cell

phones while driving is against the law and particularly dangerous in and around school zones where kids are walking and may also be distracted with their cell phones.

The following are a few key safety tips to get drivers and school kids off to a safe start as the school year begins:

- Always stop and never pass a school bus when its upper alternating red lights flashing, regardless of whether you are behind the bus or approaching it from the front.
- Reduce your speed and always keep a safe distance behind school buses as they make frequent stops.
- Always stop for pedestrians at crosswalks and school crossings and obey crossing guards at all times.

Traffic safety is a shared responsibility and S/Sgt Riopelle is reminding parents that they can help keep their children safe by teaching them the rules about traffic safety.



Recipe

It's that time of year again when life starts to get busy and crockpot meals are a life saver. Prepare everything in the morning or the night before and after a couple quick steps when you get home, dinner is ready to be served.



Crockpot Beef and Broccoli

- 1 pound boneless beef roast, sliced into thin strips
- 1 cup beef consommé
- ½ cup soy sauce
- ½ cup brown sugar or honey
- 1 tablespoon sesame oil
- 3 garlic cloves, minced
- 2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 2 tablespoons cooled sauce from the crock pot after being cooked
- Fresh broccoli florets (as many as desired)
- · Hot cooked rice

Place beef in a crock pot. In a small bowl, combine consommé, soy sauce, brown sugar/honey, oil, and garlic. Pour over beef. Cook on low for 6-8 hours. In a cup, stir cornstarch and sauce from the crock pot until smooth. Add to crock pot. Stir well to combine. (If your sauce is not thickening, try bringing your sauce to a boil on the stovetop with the corn starch mixture. Boil until your desired consistency is reached). Add broccoli to the crock pot. Stir to combine. Cover and cook an additional 30 minutes on high (the sauce has to boil for it to thicken). Serve over hot cooked rice.

School's Back In Session

All three area school boards are welcoming students back to school this week. Huron-Superior Catholic District School Board began the 2013-2014 school year today, and The Conseil scolaire catholique du Nouvel-Ontario and Rainbow Schools both start tomorrow. Both CSCNO and Rainbow District wish to remind parents that unlike past years, there will be no early dismissal, and that students will depart from school at the regular time.

"We are always excited to see our new and returning students," said Mrs. Lyse-Anne Papineau, CSCNO Director of Education. "With the support of our staff, parents and partners, we are committed to offering a quality French language catholic education to all of our students." Parents of children who attend A.B. Ellis spent the summer

pondering the amalgamation of the elementary and high schools in Espanola into the current Espanola High School location. The potential merger of the two schools under one roof has financial benefits for the board, but parents are concerned for the younger students.

Director of Education Norm Blaseg is confident the new approach will work. He says, "A review of the secondary school site in Espanola has been completed, including the indoor facilities and the space in the surrounding schoolyard. The site could accommodate two distinct schools."

A public information session is slated for September 19 at 7:00 p.m. at Espanola High School. Parents are invited to gain more information and to ask questions about the proposal.

September 4 to 6: Register for Adult Education at Sudbury Secondary School

Rainbow District School Board offers FREE credit courses during the day to any adults 18 years of age and older who have been out of high school for at least one semester. Adults can earn two high school credits in approximately six weeks.

To register, visit the Adult Education Centre at Sudbury Secondary School's Davidson Street entrance weekdays from 9 am to 11:30 am and 1:30 pm to 3 pm from Wednesday, September 4, 2013 to Friday, September 6, 2013.

When registering, students should bring a copy of their transcript from the last high school attended as well as a birth certificate and health card. The Adult Education Centre offers adult day classes leading to completion of a high school diploma.

Block 1 of adult day classes will begin Monday, September 9, 2013 and continue until Tuesday, October 29, 2013. A total of five blocks of six-week long classes will be offered throughout the school year.

The public meeting will be held pursuant to the requirements of Section 34(13) of the Planning Act, RSO 1990, as amended. The public meeting will be held on Wednesday, October 9, 2013 at 7:30 p.m. in the Council Chambers, Township Office, 11 Birch Lake Road, Massey, Ontario.

PURPOSE AND EFFECT: Council proposes to amend the Township's Comprehensive Zoning Bylaw 2010-51 as follows:

1. Section 3.R – add a definition for "Renovate";

2. Replace the existing provisions of Section 4.22(d) – Non-Conforming and

Non-Complying Uses – Reconstruction of Existing Uses; Amend Section 5.6.1; Resource Recreation zone- by deleting "Recreational

Vehicle Park" as a permitted use;
4. Amend Section 5.18.1; Rural zone - by deleting "Campground" as a permitted use.
The effect of the proposed amendments would permit renovations to unsafe buildings that are in a non-conforming/con-complying situation, without triggering a site-specific zoning bylaw amendment and to simplify the bylaw and avoid using terms that are not defined.

If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers before the bylaw is passed, the person or public body is not entitled to appeal the decision of the Council of the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers to the Ontario Municipal Board.
