Summer Is A Great Time To Get Fit





Espanola Helping Hand Food Bank News

Our catchment area comprises 320 sq. km, including the town of Espanola which has a population of 5100. In 2012 we served 1841 individuals of which 420 were children. One pound of food is equal to \$2.50. The majority of our funding comes from the community in general and we partner with various organizations in raising these funds. 100% of money raised and donated goes directly towards food and sustainability of our location. We have a volunteer base of 42 dedicated individuals. We became incorporated in June 2012 and are now able to issue income tax receipts.

Fort Erie Racetrack - Come And Watch The Horses Swim?!?

I was just fifteen years old, living in a dot on the map called Dain City when I had a vague notion that there was a beautiful and exciting racetrack twenty minutes away from where horses raced on summer afternoons and people went to bet on them. Gambling being one of the few vices my father did not practise, I never got to the Fort Erie Racetrack as a kid. I made up for it after my first year at university when I found out the hard way that betting on the horses was not the same as a summer job in that the money was going the wrong way.

But in the late summer of '61 even people who cared little or knew nothing about Fort Erie - then and now one of the most stunning setting for horseracing in North America - had heard of Puss n Boots. He was the horse who became instantly famous for taking a swim in the middle of a thoroughbred race.

Puss n Boots trained by the great horseman Frank Merrill, was brought to Fort Erie from Gulfstream Park in Florida where he had earned the reputation of a promising sprinter but a bit of a nutter. During one outing a piece of paper flying around the Florida track had sent him into a tailspin and he almost jumped the rail to get away from it.

It was a hot September afternoon at Fort Erie, the beautiful racetrack set around shimmering infield lakes with well-trimmed shrubs and flowers in full bloom. Puss n Boots was actually leading by five lengths at the top of the stretch on the mile-and-one-sixteenth turf course when the jockey slapped his ass ... right-handed. Apparently the horse was fine with a

whack on his left cheek but never the right one. The jockey either hadn't been told or forgot about this particular peculiarity. Freaked and looking to flee the track, Puss n Boots spotted a narrow opening in the hedge that circled the turf course, used mainly by the groundskeepers to enter the infield where they watered the plants and trimmed the shrubs. At full speed and carrying a very startled Ronnie Behrens on his back, Puss n Boots shot the gap. The quick left turn sent the jockey airborne over the horse's head as his mount made a beeline for the nearest infield lake. Sprawled on the grass, the jockey looked like he was starring in a cartoon that carried the caption: "Riding - the art of keeping the horse between you and the ground." Did I mention it was also a very hot day? Nearing the water the horse hit the brakes as a silent and disbelieving crowd of over 14,000 people in the grandstand watched Puss n Boots slide slowly and inelegantly into the lake, ass-first.

Trust me, when a bettor puts a wad of money on a rising star like Puss n Boots, expecting him to win the race, the last thing he wants to hear from the horse is the sound of a really big splash.

Immediately, Ronnie Behrens jumped into the lake to save his horse until ... until he remembered he could not swim. Immediately trainer Frank Merrill went thrashing into the lake to save his jockey until ... until he remembered he too could not swim. With one horse and two men now flailing away in deep water, the entire starting gate crew first kicked off

their shoes, stripped down to their skivvies and then plunged into the lake like a team of very pale lifeguards. Although the gate guys hauled the jockey and trainer out of the drink, that horse just wanted to have fun. Leisurely he swam in circles in the middle of the lake like it was his private backyard pool. Horseracing is supposed to be a serious business, not a day at the beach.

A big horse, a small skiff, three guys mostly naked and nobody, nobody said: "You're gonna need a bigger boat?!?"

It took a man in a row boat and the starting crew almost an hour to get a hold of Puss n Boots and lead him to land at which time he got a standing ovation. Thousands of people showed up to watch a horse race and a swim meet broke out!

This amazing moment in horseracing history is commemorated annually with Fort Erie's \$30,000 Puss n Boots Circle The Course coming up on Sunday, August 31st after which the winners - jockey, trainer and owners but no, not the horse - jump into that same infield lake.

Although the horse is long gone, the track lives on and is experiencing a bit of a renaissance. Running eight races every Tuesday and Sunday people are starting to pack the place again.

On Twilight Tuesdays and a post time of 4:15 pm, the apron is crowded, the restaurant is full and hundreds stay to hear the band play into the summer night. There's no better way to remember summer than a long and languid afternoon at the track. Try it. I guarantee you'll like it. Just don't bet what I'm betting, okay?

Dispelling 3 Myths Can Lead To Better Care For Your Dog

You do need to be careful about using the right

products for your pet's skin, so always use a pet-friendly shampoo. Baby shampoo can dry out the coat and cause dandruff. Pets with allergies can actually benefit from frequent bathing when recommended by their veterinarian.

3. Pet health care expenses are inevitable Much like you, animals are prone to all sorts of ailments, ranging from ear problems to arthritis and even cancer. With all of the advances in veterinary medicine, treating your pet for a condition like cancer can become a strain on the household budget if surgery or chemotherapy is involved. Pet parents have to make some very tough choices when choosing to spend thousands of dollars if needed. Did you know that pet insurance can alleviate much of this burden?

Fewer than two percent of Canadian pet owners have health insurance for them (according to NAPHIA, 2014), and 47 percent feel that it is too expensive. If You Build It, They Will Come

By Heather Wilson - That was the idea Dan and Arlene Glofcheskie of North Winds Farm had when they recognized Espanola's need for a Farmer's Market. So was born Espanola Eat Local Farmer's Market now located at the Queensway Pentecostal Church every Thursday from 4-8pm and Saturday 8am to 12pm. The Glofcheskies originally came from Southern Ontario where markets are a part of the culture. The pair recognized that the timing was right in Espanola because there is increased consumer interest in where our food comes from. Dan Glofcheskie says, "the informed consumer wants to minimize their environmental footprint" and this is possible when consumers and suppliers are literally brought face to face. Buying local has many benefits including, getting produce that is picked at the peak of freshness and delivered within hours of harvesting; the environmental benefit of less packaging and less fuel for transport; supporting the local economy by creating jobs and keeping money in the community; buying locally provides a fair price to producers for their goods.

DIVICION

Farmer's markets bring farmers, crafters, and artisans together to deliver locally grown and produced goods to the consumer. Espanola shoppers

now have the opportunity to buy goods directly from the producers as opposed to buying from larger markets where the goods travel a great distance from the source. When talking to the vendors at the market it is obvious that there is a pride in the goods that are being delivered. Jody Pilon, for example, representing the Fibre Arts Festival, is selling a variety of goods that includes Loonsong Garden organic fresh stone ground flour, fair trade coffee from St. Josephs Island and cookies made from locally sourced ingredients from Garden's Gate restaurant on Manitoulin Island, and brightly coloured and ingeniously crafted brooches, stuffed toys and yarns. Pilon has an enthusiasm for the goods that she sells that is intoxicating. Mary Bridget bakes double chocolate chunk bagels and makes her own colourful pasta that is to die for. (I used it to make a roasted vegetable pasta that was truly delicious. The sauce adhered to the pasta in a way that just does not seem possible with store bought pasta). The popularity of farmers market comes with the expansion of the so called cottage industry wherein the creation of goods, products and services is home-based, rather than factory-based. Products and services created by cottage industry are often

unique and distinctive given the fact that they are usually not mass-produced.

The Glofcheskies credit the early success of the project to Cheryl Kennelly, the Economic Development Officer with the Town of Espanola. Kennelly is recognized as a strong advocate for the Local Food movement developing in the Town. "Cheryl has worked tirelessly to help us get this project off the ground" says Dan Glofcheskie. Community Economic Development Officer Kennelly says "Truly, it is their tireless efforts that make it all happen. The leg work and persistence to get a market off the ground is significant. Dan and Arlene have worked through the process to engage growers, create policies, waivers, secure insurance & permits and set the organization up for a sustainable future; all this, besides planting, weeding, nurturing, harvesting and crating it all to market. The Town of Espanola is privileged to help facilitate the process and assist in promotion".

Sourcing your food from local producers not only saves on fuel and reduces your carbon footprint but also ensures freshness, keeps money and jobs close by, and fosters true food security, meaning that necessities are produced close to home. And anyone who has ever had fresh potatoes or beans from the garden will know that fresh food tastes good. A healthy lifestyle includes exercise and plenty of fruits and colourful vegetables so this is an option to include fresh food in your diet.

Although the strawberries from Emiry's Berry Patch are finished for the season there is still variety at the Espanola Eat Local Famer's Market which includes locally produced beef, pork and lamb, jams and jellies, seasonal vegetables like spinach, green onions, beans, beets and early potatoes. Original concoctions like parsley jelly and blueberry lime jam promise exciting pleasures to the palette.

The Farmers market has been running since the first of July and Arlene Glofcheskie is "pleasantly pleased with the participation so far." Admitting that more vendors would expand the variety of goods for consumers, the vendors are pleased with the number of people who have been coming out and all the vendors are committed to seeing the market get bigger and busier with time. Diversity is healthy in all markets and the arrival of Espanola Eat Local Farmer's Market gives citizens an option for healthy eating that also supports local merchants. They have built it, all you have to do is go.

Recipe

I know it's summer but it sure does feel like fall and I'm not very happy about it. But what's a girl to do but make a big pot of soup and take comfort in it and hope that next week we get some decent summer weather. It's really not a lot to ask after



6 months of snow this past winter. This soup is easy to make and everyone seems to like it. Buy a big loaf of crusty bread to go with it and you have a meal.

Yummy Hamburger Soup

- 2 lbs ground beef
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon oregano
- 1/4 teaspoon basil
- 1/8 teaspoon seasoning salt
- 1 (2 ounce) package onion soup mix 1 cup elbow macaroni (for 3 or 4 servings)
- 6 cups boiling water

- 1 (8 ounce) can tomato sauce
- 1 tablespoon soy sauce
- 1 cup celery, sliced
- 1/4 cup celery leaves
- 1 cup sliced carrot
- 1/3 cup dried split peas
- grated parmesan cheese

In a large saucepan, brown meat, drain excess fat. Add salt, pepper, oregano, basil, seasoned salt, and onion soup mix. Stir in boiling water, tomato sauce, and soy sauce. Cover and simmer for about 15 minutes. Meanwhile, prepare celery, celery leaves, and carrots; then add to simmering mixture with split peas and continue to cook for 30 minutes. Add macaroni and simmer for 30 minutes longer. adding more water if necessary and stirring occasionally. Serve sprinkled with Parmesan cheese over individual servings.

Espanola Police Report

On July 16, 2014, a member of the Espanola Police Service was conducting radar enforcement on Highway 6 at Kei Will Drive, when a vehicle was spotted traveling at a very high rate of speed southbound in the 60 km/h Community Safety Zone. The officer activated the onboard Radar unit, and obtained a reading of 113 km/h in the posted 60-km/h zone. Upon stopping the vehicle, the 40-year old male driver from Alberta was charged with Stunt Driving "Race" Motor Vehicle," contrary to section 172 of the Highway Traffic Act. He is to appear in Espanola court on September 11, 2014, to answer to his charges. Pursuant to Statute, the male's vehicle was impounded, and his driver's license suspended for a period of 7-days, as a result of being charged with Stunt Driving.

Since July 9, 2014, the Espanola Police Service have taken 3 impaired drivers off our roadways, in a continued effort to make our Town streets safer.

On July 9, at $4:00\,$ p.m., an officer responded to a complaint of a possible impaired driver northbound on Highway 6 from Manitoulin Island. The vehicle was reported to be all over the road, and crossing into the oncoming lane. The responding officer spotted the vehicle as it entered the Town of Espanola, and stopped it at McCulloch Drive. The 38-year old driver from Ohsweken, Ontario, was found to be under the influence of alcohol, and a subsequent breath test showed that his blood alcohol content was 184 mgs, just over twice the legal limit. He was charged with Impaired Driving and Care or Control of a Motor Vehicle Over 80mgs, and will appear in Espanola Court on September 2, 2014 to answer to his charges.

On July 12, at 2:30 a.m., an officer on routine patrol stopped a pickup truck on John Street, and upon speaking to the male driver, formed reasonable suspicion to believe that he had consumed alcohol. A Roadside Screening Device was used, which resulted in a 'Warn" being registered. The 43-year old from Espanola was issued a 3-day licence suspension, and was also charged with Careless Driving under the Highway Traffic Act, for operating his vehicle without due care and

On July 19, at 2:40 a.m., an officer patrolling on Centre Street observed a vehicle leaving the area of Marshall's Bar & Grill, and travel westbound on Adelaide Street. The officer followed the vehicle and saw that it was traveling off the paved portion of the roadway on the shoulder. Once stopped, the officer noted the male driver had signs indicative of alcohol consumption, and a roadside screening device was administered, which resulted in a "Fail" reading. Following the driver's arrest, he provided breath samples that showed his blood alcohol content was 219 mgs, or more than two and a half times the legal limit. The 37-year old from Windsor Ontario was charged with Impaired Driving and Care or Control of a Motor Vehicle Over 80mgs. He will appear in Espanola Court on September 2, 2014 to answer to his charges.

If you suspect another person is driving under the influence of alcohol, police want you to call 911. We all have a part to play in getting impaired drivers off our roadways.

On July 18, 2014 between 1:00 to 1:30 p.m., a resident of Sudbury attended the Espanola Mall located at 800 Centre Street, with a friend to go shopping. The female had her 7 ½ year old mix breed dog with her, and while she attended inside the mall, she placed the dog in the bed of the pickup truck on a chain. When she returned to the truck, the dog was missing, and it appeared that someone had unlatched the chain and took the animal, as a search of the nearby area failed to locate the dog. Currently the Espanola Police are investigating this incident as a theft.

The dog, which answers by the name of "Buddy," is described as:

- Mixed breed that resembles a Labrador;
- All black except for its legs, which are dark brown;
- White fur around its mouth;
- Approximately 80 pounds; and,
- Last seen wearing a green collar.
