fatally injured.

Once students had gathered around, a 9-1-1 call was placed and Espanola Police arrived. After that, members of the Espanola Volunteer Fire Department were dispatched to begin assessing damage and preparing the "jaws of life" to rescue two victims who were not able to be removed from one of the cars otherwise. EMS rounded out the complement of first responders and treated the mock up as if it were a real life accident. For more than

an hour, emergency personnel assisted victims, conducted an investigation of how the accident happened, interacted with distraught parents and even arrested the perpetrator, a drunk driver. At the end. Bourcier Funeral Home's hearse pulled up to retrieve the body of the fatally injured young girl and then Dan's Towing removed the totalled vehicles. Just like in real life. The mock tragedy didn't overlook a detail, including the parents' emotional reaction

to seeing their daughter lying dead on the pavement, thanks to the preparation and collaboration of the many organizations who took part. It was evident from students' reactions that the scene had hit a nerve. Overseeing the project was Deputy Chief of EMS Glen Clifford. After the exercise concluded, students attended a presentation in the gymnasium that further conveyed to them the dangers of distracted or impaired driving.



In The Loop

This week's article is an update on the results of the Freedom of Information request for the Cheque Registry and Credit Card activity which we filed over a year ago. The Town denied the request saying it was "frivolous and vexatious". We appealed to the Privacy Commissioner's Office. This began a long and difficult process. The Town presented the adjudicator with numerous reasons why they would not provide the information. We disputed these accusations and had to justify our request for the information. On May 16th the Privacy Commissioner notified the Town that "the adjudicator does not uphold the Town's decisions and orders it to issue access decisions with respect to the responsive records".

The adjudicator also stated:

- "Overall, I find that there are not reasonable grounds to conclude that the appellant's requests are part of a pattern of conduct that amounts to an abuse of the right of access."
- "Accordingly, I determine that there are not reasonable grounds to conclude that the requests were made in bad faith.'
- "I find that the town has not provided sufficient evidence to support a finding that the appellant's requests were made for a purpose other than to obtain access."
- "I also find that the appellant and her group genuinely seek access to the records in this appeal."
- "Overall, I find that appellant's requests at issue in this appeal are *not frivolous and vexatious...*Accordingly, I will order the town to provide the appellant with a decision letter in response to her request."

The above statements were not published in the Town's media release on their website.

After 30+ days we still had not received the Town's decision letter regarding access to our requests and will be notifying the Privacy Commissioner's office.

Next week we will publish suggestions made by the adjudicator for **both** the Espanola Citizen Group and the Town.

In closing, the Community Services Committee Meeting of June 17th was cancelled again. They are supposed to meet on a monthly basis. They have not had one meeting in 2014.

Fireworks Safety To Ensure a Bang Up Time on Canada Day

- 1. Only Use Fireworks Outdoors
- 2. Choose a Clear, Open Area
- 3. Check For Wind: Check wind direction and wind speed; fireworks should be lit with the prevailing wind blowing away from spectators and closest dwelling. Don't set off aerial fireworks in strong winds.
- 4. Have Water Nearby: Keep a hose or bucket ready.
- **5.** Read All Instructions Carefully
- Use Ground-Based Fireworks on a Hard Surface
- 7. Bury Aerial Fireworks: For aerial fireworks (Roman candles), bury (do not pile) the device to half its length in the ground or in a large pail or box filled with earth or sand.
- Keep Spectators Safe: Keep all spectators at least 20 m away from location where articles are functioned.
- Use Proper Eye Protection and Wear Proper Clothing: Wear safety goggles and non-flammable clothing.
 Keep Children Away From Fireworks
- 11. Use Care When Handling Fireworks: Prevent dropping them and don't carry fireworks in your pockets. Never smoke while handling fireworks.
- 12. Use Care When Firing Fireworks: Don't throw them at others or bend over them while lighting.

 13. Duds or Misfires: Never attempt to re-light fireworks that
- have misfired (duds). Wait 30 minutes and then place them in a bucket of water.
- 14. Clean-Up After the Show: Wait 30 minutes after the display has finished. Check the firing area for duds, clean up al debris, and check it again the next morning.

Espanola Police Report

A second Youth "Rave" Party hosted in Espanola in the month of May has left the Espanola Police Service investigating several serious criminal acts in the Town.

On Saturday May 3, 2014, a "Rave" party was held in Espanola, which saw an influx of youth from several outlying areas, including a number of attendees being bused in from the City of Sudbury. The following morning, the Espanola Police Service dealt with an increased number of thefts from vehicles, and suspicious person complaints involving young people around the vicinity of the hall hosting the party; many of the 14 reported thefts from vehicle complaints remain unsolved.

On Saturday May 31, 2014, a second "Rave" party was hosted in Espanola, again drawing youth from several outlying areas, including the City of Sudbury.

During the early morning hours on June 1, 2014, the Espanola Police Service responded to two complaints of Mischief, one involving a fence to a vard on Second Avenue, damaged by young people in the area, and one Mischief complaint involving a broken window at the Elk's Club. Further, the police received complaints of large groups of youth causing disturbances in the Second Avenue area; another four complaints of theft from vehicles and area yards; and more serious offences involving 2 night-time break and enters to area homes, where the home owners were home sleeping; a break and enter to a travel trailer parked on a residential property; and an Arson complaint where the interior of a truck parked on Mead Street was lit on fire, and had to be extinguished by the Espanola Fire Department. Currently, the Espanola Police Service are investigating these criminal acts, and are asking that if anyone has any information as to who is responsible for these offences, to call the Espanola Police Service or Crime Stoppers.

Upon arrival, Espanola Fire Services quickly extinguished the fire, before it could spread to nearby foliage, or threaten area homes.

While investigating the cause of the fire, a citizen provided information to police that he'd seen a local youth running from the area just prior to the fire. As a result of the information received, police interviewed the 14 year old, and were able to identify another 5 young males ranging in age between 13 and 18 years old, as also being in the area when the fire started.

Based on the information received from speaking to the youth, police could not determine that the fire was deliberately set, and may have been caused by one youth carelessly discarding a cigarette; however, it was determined that all 6 youth were trespassing on private property, and as a result, they were all charged under the Trespass to Property Act, and will receive summonses to appear in Provincial Offences Court to answer to their charges.
