"Thank you for Mother's beautiful funeral service. She was a saint and a virgin if there ever was one."

"Thank you for conducting such a lovely service for my Father. The guy who did the flowers was a little too happy, if you know what I mean. But everything worked out okay." Said one woman to a funeral director: "Boy, I've been trying to settle this estate for nearly a year now. There are some days I wish Harry had never fallen off that ladder!" You might as well laugh. As Red Skelton has so often said, "Nobody's getting out of this one alive."

This week NDP Leader Andrea Horwath wrote a letter to the Premier laying out our priorities: these are the priorities we are hearing from people across the province.

It's time to focus on making life more affordable for families, not more expensive. New Democrats will not support new taxes or tolls that will make life more expensive for hardworking families. Families are feeling squeezed harder than ever, and they're working harder than ever just to stay still. The government is planning tax giveaways and loopholes for some, but asking families to pay new taxes and tolls. My colleagues and I will not support that.

The Liberals' plan asks families to pay more, while corporations pay less: the government's new HST loopholes will let corporations write off the HST on gasoline, but they're asking families to pay a new gas tax. The government doesn't have a problem finding billions to cancel gas plants or for corporate giveaways, but when it comes to transit, they believe that families need to pay hundreds of dollars more. In the north we have seen a continued erosion and cancellation of many transit We have lost the services. ONTC, we see the continued attacks on the Algoma Central Railway, we came close to the list goes on.

At the same time as the Liberals are asking families to pay more. they are planning to eliminate the NDP Fairness tax, create HST loopholes for corporations, continue moving forward with new no-strings attached corporate giveaways that will cost the treasury billions

In the 2011 campaign, the Liberals said they would not impose new taxes. When Dalton McGuinty was asked if they would raise taxes, he responded "We will not." Plans put forward by the Liberals will cost families hundreds of dollars a year.

We need to see the government keep the commitments made in the 2013 budgets like getting premiums Insurance Auto down, stopping waste with a Financial Accountability Office, getting home care wait times down, and getting young people working.

## 3rd Annual Fibre Arts Festival **Awarded Grant**

Espanola's 3rd Annual Fibre variety of fibre arts. Saturday Arts Festival has been awarded a Craft Projects Connections Grant of \$10,000 from the Ontario Arts Council. Volunteer organizer Jody Pilon self-funded the first two festivals with the ardent belief that the festival had the potential to become a sustainable, shoulder season attraction for the community. "The support of the OAC will open up possibilities for festival growth and development, education and mentorship" says Pilon. "This funding will be used to secure fibre masters to host workshops and give us some financial leverage to invest in more signage and marketing. We are hoping to see the festival span three days this year beginning on Friday with a day-long basket making workshop and evening lecture from a local fibre artist. Saturday will feature the vendors hall with displays, demonstrations and sales of a

and Sunday, we hope to include a few half-day workshops and three or four "make and take" type workshops that could include anything from basic felting techniques, spinning with drop spindle or Dorset button making."

Last year's attendance was more than double that of the previous years, and Pilon is hoping to see the same increase, expecting over 1200 visitors to Espanola for the weekend.

In the meantime, she is hard at work, organizing additional fund-raising initiatives, the first of which is the Stash sale at the Espanola complex on March

## Recipe

I'm sure everybody has a recipe for peanut butter cookies, but in case vou don't, I am kindly giving you one to try and add to your recipe box. Peanut Butter cookies are my favourite cookies; well they might be tied with a good chocolate chip cookie. My mouth is actually



watering as I type this and I would go to the kitchen as soon as I'm done writing this and make a batch, but I have no self-control and would eat them until I burst out of my jeans and then hate myself. So I'll opt for some peanut butter on toast for my breakfast and hope that maybe a few will appear on my kitchen counter in the near future. (Mom are you reading this?) If you want to make these extra special you can add chocolate or peanut butter chips and even some peanuts.

#### **Good Old Fashioned Peanut Butter Cookies**

- 1-1/4 cup all-purpose flour
- <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> tsp baking soda
- ½ tsp baking powder
- 1/4 tsp salt
- ½ cup butter, softened
- 1 cup peanut butter (creamy or crunchy, your preference)
- <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup sugar + more for rolling cookies
- 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 1 large egg
- 1 tbsp milk
- 1 tsp vanilla

Preheat oven to 350. Line two baking sheets with parchment paper. In a mixing bowl, stir together the flour, baking soda, baking powder, and salt. Set aside. In the bowl of a stand-mixer fitted with the paddle attachment or a hand held mixer, beat the butter and peanut butter together until smooth and fluffy. Add the sugars until combined, then incorporate the egg, followed by the milk and vanilla. Gradually add in the flour mixture and beat until thoroughly combined. In a small bowl, put a few tablespoons of sugar for rolling your cookies. Using a medium cookie scoop, portion out your dough OR scoop out a large tablespoon of dough and roll into a ball. Roll each ball into the sugar until coated on all sides. Place on baking sheet, allowing room for the cookies to spread out while baking. Bake for 10-12 minutes, being careful not to over bake. The cookies will look slightly underdone in the center, but they are not. They will set up as they cool.
