Bill & Monica - Together Again At Last

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Sharing The Road: Spring Cycling Safety

Spring has arrived and the warmer sunny weather is finally upon us. This means that outdoor enthusiasts of all ages are enjoying their favourite activities. Cyclers are now shining up their bikes and will be using the city streets and area trails. It is important for cyclers and motorists alike to keep safety in mind when on their travels this summer. Here are a few things to remember:

Motorists:

- Motorists must allow cyclers a safe space to ride on the roadway, as a bicycle has the same rights and responsibilities when on the road. Keep in mind that a cyclist may have to use more of the road if the right portion of the roadway is very rough, has potholes or sewer drains.

- Do not honk your horn at a cyclist unless you are doing so for safety reasons. This could startle the person riding the bike which could cause them to lose control of their bicycle and crash.

- If you decide to pass a cyclist, ensure that you pass in a safe place that will allow you to overtake the rider without forcing them off the road. It is also wise to reduce your speed as you pass by to avoid startling the person riding their bike.

- Use a little extra caution and drive defensively when travelling through residential areas or near schools. Younger riders may dart out onto the street suddenly from the school yard or driveway. It is also a good idea to keep an eye out and reduce your speed where city trails intersect with the street—just in case.

- Intersections are a common location for collisions between vehicles and cyclists. Be aware of this when you approach a controlled intersection.

- When making a right turn, check your mirror to ensure that there are no cyclists in your blind spot or attempting to go by you on the right. Also, if you plan to make a right turn do not pass a cyclist and then turn right suddenly in front of them as they may not be able to stop and you may strike them.

Cyclists:

- Do regular inspections of your bicycle to make sure that it is improper working order. A properly maintained “ride” will get you where you need to go without a hassle and is much safer.

- Make sure that your bike is the correct size for you. A bike that is not the right size for you is difficult to control and generally not comfortable to ride anyways.

- Wear a helmet! Helmets are mandatory for all riders under 18 years old and are just common sense. Helmets must also be fitted and worn properly. The “2-4-1”

rule applies. It only takes one fall off your bike to cause an acquired brain injury. Do your part to avoid becoming a statistic.

- Obey all traffic laws. Cyclers must obey the same traffic laws as any other vehicle on the road. Be a responsible rider.

- Be aware of local bylaws regarding riding on the sidewalk as this may not be permitted in your community. Also get off your bike when using a crosswalk at a controlled intersection.

- When riding on the street, ride as close to the right side of the road as safely possible. Generally 1 metre is the rule of thumb. You should allow yourself enough room to move to the right without hitting the curb if a vehicle crowds you. When riding in slower traffic, do not pass a vehicle on the right. You are required to follow behind the vehicle in front of you. Passing on the right is an offence and is dangerous and a vehicle that is turning right may not see you.

- Scan the road ahead for potholes, sewer grates or other road hazards. This will allow you to safely take the space you need to stop or move around the hazard. Do not swerve suddenly as you may lose control of your bike or be struck by a passing vehicle.

- Signal your intentions. If you must move out into traffic, change lanes, stop, or turn; use the proper hand signals to let others know where you are going. This is required by law.

- Ride in single file on the roadway and allow enough space between you and the bike ahead of you.

- Do not take a passenger on your bike...period. This is extremely dangerous as you dramatically reduce your ability to manoeuvre your bike safely. It is also illegal unless the bike is designed for two persons.

- Wear bright clothing and be visible.

- If you plan to ride at night, you are required to have a working headlight and a tail light on your bike. This will help you to be visible and to see where you are going.

- Very young riders should be properly supervised. Children under 10 years of age do not have the decision-making skills to judge speed and distance that adults have. A parent should be riding with their children. It is also important to teach your children how to ride their bikes safely and make them aware of the rules.

Cycling is one of the most enjoyable ways for families to spend time together and enjoy the outdoors. Cycling safety is the responsibility of everyone who uses the streets, roads and highways. Let's all do our part to keep it safe and fun.

FLEEING ATV DRIVER INVOLVED IN COLLISION

On May 11, 2014, at 8:30 p.m. officers from the Espanola Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) were conducting patrols on Highway 17 in Webbwood when they observed an all-terrain vehicle (ATV) travelling at a high rate of speed. The ATV was seen to turn onto Highway 17 from Mary Street.

Officers attempted to stop the ATV as it continued to flee onto the side roads in Webbwood, but the driver failed to stop.

As officers were about to terminate the pursuit, the driver hit a bump, lost control, rolled over and was ejected.

The male driver was treated for minor injuries at the scene.

The driver, Trevor Charron, age 21, of Sables-Spanish Rivers Township was charged with offences contrary to the Off-Road Vehicle Act as follows:

- Fail to Apply for Permit on Becoming Owner
- Use Unauthorized Plate
- Fail to Stop - Flashing Red Light

Officers would like to remind riders to always operate their machine in a safe and responsible manner. Inexperienced riders operating a borrowed machine may drive beyond their capabilities with catastrophic results.

Recreational ATVing is meant to be enjoyable but these machines should never be considered toys. Safety equipment, proper clothing and footwear are recommended and an approved motorcycle helmet is required by law.

In The Loop

Casting a vote in Canada is a democratic right. Espanola's municipal election will be held in October 2014. On January 28 2014 Council unanimously voted to discontinue the traditional method of voting and to adopt a new "Vote by Mail" system.

We fully respect this decision.

In February of this year, the Espanola Citizen group filed a Freedom of information request for the following:

- How and when will residents be educated on the new procedure? A detailed timeline is requested.
- How will Administration ensure that all eligible residents have received the required voting material? This includes residents not on 2010 voter list, residents new to this municipality, residents who have changed location within the municipality, and residents turning 18 on or before October 25, 2014.
- How will Administration ensure that former residents have not been mailed voting packages?
- Where will the poll be for those who wish to vote using the traditional method?
- How will these traditional votes be tabulated?

Our reason for requesting this information was simple...to see the process that is in place to ensure that all eligible residents will understand this new approach and be assured they would receive Vote by Mail packages. Unfortunately, we were unable to get any information until May 13th. This is when Administration finally made public how the new procedure will work.

Vote by Mail is a very different process than the one residents have been using for decades. There will be no traditional polling station and the responsibility falls on YOU to make sure that you are on the voter list and meet the mail-in voting deadlines. The guarantee that all eligible voters in Espanola understand exactly what must be done to have their vote count and that they receive correct, complete and up-to-date Voter Packages is Council's responsibility. It should not be the other way around. Espanola residents expect no less.

"The Community Improvement Plan affirms Council's commitment to revitalization and development," says Mayor Lehoux. "Espanola is business ready, we have no development fees and now with the addition of our Community Improvement Plan we can squarely say that we are committed to retaining, improving and growing our business base." Applications will be reviewed on a first come first serve basis and accepted until the budget for the year is exhausted and then reactivated again the next budget year.

Get Ready To Boogie: Gold Medal Curler Brad Jacobs Carrying Special Olympics Torch Through Espanola

“Let’s Get Ready to Boogie!”

The first annual Boogie Rush Mud Run to benefit Special Olympics is less than two weeks away. The fun run/obstacle course takes place Saturday, May 31 at Espanola’s Boogie Mountain Ski Hill. With nearly 400 participants registered and \$8700 currently raised, the event is taking shape to be a huge success.

Must you be in world-class shape to complete the mud run? No, but every bit of training you’ve done up to now helps... unless of course you are just attending for the after party, which will likely be every bit as wild as the run itself.

Boogie Rush is a 5 km mud run fund-raiser for the Ontario Law Enforcement Torch Run which supports Special Olympics. It is similar to some other, established runs such as Miner’s Mayhem, Tough Mudder, and Warrior Dash, but for now is a smaller course. Event organizers Renee Lalonde and Ed Stortz say this will be perfect as a warm up for those bigger events.

There will be a free shuttle bus provided to and from designated parking areas as well as from the ski hill to the starting line. The schedule is as follows: kids run 9:00 – 10:00 a.m. (arrive an hour early to register for the day and receive their bibs); Special Olympians run 10:00 – 11:00 a.m.; adult waves start at 11:00 a.m. (arrive at least an hour early for registration and transport to the start location). Afterwards, there is a licensed beer garden. The band NUIT will be playing, along with a couple of DJ’s. Transportation will be available until 2:00 a.m.

Organizers strongly suggest bringing your own chair for the day. Registration costs are as follows: adults are \$55; ages 14-17 are \$40; ages 6-13 are \$10 (mini course).

Grandma's Marshmallow Salad

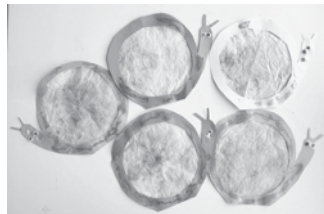
- 1 cup sour cream

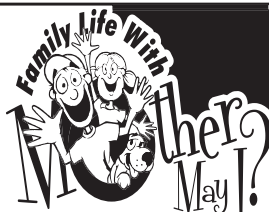
Coffee Filter Snail Suncatchers

- construction paper
- coffee filters
- markers
- glue or double stick tape
- scissors
- googly eyes
- water
- eye dropper or small cups
- glitter glue (optional)



Start by colouring the coffee filters with the markers. Add water using an eye dropper or a small cup with a small amount of water in it if your child would rather pour it on. Let the filters dry. If you need to speed up drying time use a hair dryer on low. Cut out snail frames from the construction paper. Use a coffee filter as a guide for the center circle. Make sure the snail is smaller than the coffee filter so you can tape the filter on. Using double stick tape or glue attach the coffee filter onto the back of the frame. Glue on eyes. Add glitter to your snail if you wish. Cut out antennas from scrap paper and tape them on. Tape your snail to a window to allow the colours to shine.
