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Espanola Councillor Running A Long-Distance Campaign

By Chloe Kneer - "When it comes down to it, people are people and we all just need to remember that. We have the same dreams, same hopes, and same fears," says Stewart Meikleham just hours before he is expected to depart for northern India, his second deployment as part of the Global Medic rapidresponse team. Meikleham will put his engineering background to good use once again as he and his team converge on Kashmir province, a disputed area between Pakistan and India, which has been hit by extreme weather that has led to mass flooding and devastation.

With a population of just under a million, the area is in dire need of fresh, potable water. This is where the GlobalMedic team comes in. They set up water purification systems and distribution centres where people can come get fresh water for drinking and cooking. The systems, which bring contaminated water up to Canadian drinking standards, can purify 5,000 litres of water per day. Contaminated water isn't the only looming threat in the area, as Meikleham explains. "The population is 90% Muslim, so we will definitely stand out as westerners. There is a heavy military presence in this developing nation. And, another big concern is bug infestation." While in the Philippines last Christmas, Meikleham slept on floors and cots. "We bring mosquito nets and sleeping bags because we never really know what our accommodations will be like until we get there," he says. "I have a silk liner for my sleeping bag to help keep bed bugs from setting in."

Meikleham has been Espanola councillor for the past four years and is running for re-election this time around. He realizes that running a campaign will be difficult, but not impossible, considering how far away he will be the next three weeks, a crucial time as Election Day is October 27. "My hope is that people understand that I feel it's important to serve my community, but also the global community," he says. "Sometimes I can do both without a conflict, but in this case, I hope people will support me and understand as I take on this global endeavour."

As for how he plans to continue on the campaign trail, he says, "I'm going to try to run by social media." To that end, and also to keep in touch with his family, Meikleham has purchased a satellite texting device. He will also carry an emergency beacon with an "S.O.S." button should he encounter trouble in the field. His devices will allow him to send out a pre-written email along with GPS coordinates.

Once this deployment ends, Meikleham hopes someday to deploy to Palestine. He feels an incredible amount of compassion for the refugees in that area of the world. For more information, or to donate to GlobalMedic, visit their Facebook page or website at: www.globalmedic.ca.

stay safe in a crash. While in a booster, the lap belt needs to be low on the top of their thighs, the shoulder belt between their neck and shoulder and they need to be properly seated for the entire trip. This includes no slouching or leaning over. To transition to using a seat belt only, children need to be 8 years old, or 4'9" tall or 80 pounds. However, there are other factors to consider including if the child's knees bend at edge of seat and their back is against the vehicle's seat. Again, the lap belt should be low on the top of

their thighs, the shoulder belt between the neck and shoulder, and the child must be properly seated for the trip. Always follow the instructions for your car seat and vehicle. Rainbow Board is piloting a mobile application called Up, Speak Out in the 2014-2015 school year. This free service allows students and parents/guardians to provide their school with anonymous information on student safety and bullying through a text message, phone call or webchat.

Participating schools include local elementary school A.B. Ellis Public School.

"This pilot project is part of our ongoing efforts to maintain safe learning and teaching environments for all students and staff in Rainbow Schools," said Director of Education Norm Blaseg. "It encourages students to stand up and speak out in order to make a difference in their school community."

District School guardians of participating schools are being invited to download the application, which is available for iPhones through iTunes and for Android devices through Google Play. Search "RS Stand Up Speak Out".

Recipe


It's pumpkin season! It's time for pumpkin pie and jacko-lanterns and... pumpkin muffins if you don't want to wait for pie. These are moist, seasonally flavoured delicious on a cool autumn day with a steamy cup of coffee or tea.



Pumpkin Pie Muffins

- ½ cup of butter softened
- ½ cup molasses
- 1 cup of canned pumpkin
- 1 tsp baking soda
- ³/₄ cup packed brown sugar
- ½ cup raisins or chopped pecans (or both)
- 1 egg, beaten well
- 1 ³/₄ cup flour
- ½ tsp salt
- ½ tsp cinnamon
- ½ tsp ginger
- ½ tsp allspice

Grease or line 2 muffin tins. (Batter makes approximately 18 muffins) Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Cream butter, brown sugar and molasses together until well blended. Blend in egg and pumpkin. In a separate bowl stir together flour, baking soda, salt, cinnamon, ginger and allspice. Stir flour mixture into wet ingredients until just blended and moistened. Fold in raisins and/or pecans. Fill muffin cups. Bake 15-20 minutes until a toothpick inserted comes out clean.

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
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Franco-Ouest And Saint-Joseph Students Celebrate Provincial Franco-Ontarian Day

The first was hosted by the LaCloche Foothills Chamber of Commerce and was moderated by Queensway Pentecostal Church Pastor Blair Phibbs. Phibbs and his family relocated to Espanola a few years ago and he did a good job moving the discussion along while providing a fair platform Candidates for candidates. were given five minutes at the beginning to introduce themselves and discuss what they felt are relevant issues. After an hour of introductions. the floor was open to those in attendance to pose questions to either particular candidates, or the entire panel.

The second night was hosted by the Espanola Citizen Group at the Espanola Legion. Long-time resident Richard Foucault moderated with a similar format to the first, but with the addition of a "yes or no" question session. Candidates were asked several questions, to which they could only reply yes or no. This segment garnered the most interest from those in attendance. On the hot button issue of taxes, the panel unanimously agreed that taxes in Espanola are high. Another popular and well-discussed issue was the building of a new fire hall, as per the drawings that have already been commissioned. Jack McMillan, Jill Beer, Dawn Lalonde, and Tim Howard all said yes, they would proceed as per the drawings. Obtaining an OPP service proposal was probably the most heavily debated issue, and when asked if candidates would support an OPP service proposal, only Howard and McMillan said no, they would not. Both events were well-attended with lots of community involvement.

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FIRE PREVENTION WEEK October 5-11, 2014



History of Fire Prevention Week

Fire Prevention Week was established to commemorate the devastating Chicago fire on October 9, 1871 in which more than 250 people died, 100,000

were left homeless, destroyed more than 17,400 structures and burned more than 2,000 acres. The fire changed the way that firefighters and public officials in North America think about fire prevention and fire safety. The Fire Marshals Association of North America (today known as the International Fire Marshals Association), decided that the anniversary of the Chicago fire should be observed in a way to educate the public about the importance of fire prevention.

Fire Prevention Week was proclaimed in Canada in 1919 to commemorate the Chicago blaze, as well as a major fire that destroyed the Centre Block of the Parliament buildings in Ottawa on February 3, 1916.

Fire Safety Tips & Facts

- ·Smoking while in bed, tired or under the influence of alcohol or medication is the most common cause of fires that kill.
- Most chimney fires with wood-burning fireplaces. Ensure chimneys are cleaned and professionally inspected regularly. Burn only s quantities of wood at a time. small
- Keep a pan lid or cookie sheet handy in case grease or oil catches fire. The lid or cookie sheet should be slid over the top of the pan to smother the fire.
- •Place candles in sturdy, burnresistant containers that won't tip over and are big enough to collect dripping wax.
- •Don't use candles in high traffic areas where children or pets could knock them over.
- •Never remove the third prong on

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a three-prong plug or bend it back to use a two-prong outlet. The third prong is a necessary ground for the appliance or heater.

- •When bathing children, always turn cold water on first before the hot. Test the water temperature before allowing your child to get into the bathtub or shower. Consider adjusting your hot water heater to a maximum temperature of 49 C or 120 F.
- •Turn pot handles towards the centre of the stove.

Maintain your smoke alarms



- •Battery-operated smoke alarms will warn you when batteries need replacing. Despite this, make it a habit to change the batteries yearly.
- •Install at least one smoke alarm outside each sleeping area. For improved safety, install a smoke alarm in every bedroom.
- •Have a thorough maintenance check of the furnace carried out by a professional.
- ·Lack of maintenance is the number one cause of dryer fires. That is why it is critical to clean the lint filter before and after each use, and wipe away any lint that has accumulated around the drum. Perform periodic checks to ensure that the air exhaust vent pipe is unobstructed (lint accumulation) and the outdoor vent flap opens readily.
- •Extension cords must never be run inside walls or under rugs or furniture. They can be damaged by

traffic or heavy furniture and start arcing, which can lead to a fire.

•It is important to install a carbon monoxide detector in your home. However, carbon monoxide detectors do not replace the need for prevention through yearly maintenance and inspection of heating systems and appliances.

•Do not overload electrical

outlets or use extension cords in the place of additional outlets.

•Use a screen in front of the fireplace opening to protect children and to prevent embers from escaping and igniting carpets, etc.

•Educate your children about the dangers of fire and make sure they know that all fires, even small ones, can spread very quickly.



- •In case of fire, get out and stay out! Use a neighbour's phone to call the emergency response number in your area.
- •Be wary of buying novelty candles. Avoid candles surrounded by flammable paint, paper, dried flowers, or breakable/ meltable containers.
- •Equipment that uses natural gas should show a clear blue flame—a yellow or orange flame may indicate a problem. If a problem appears, call a qualified technician.
- •Ensure a source of fresh air is available, for an example an open window or flue, when operating a wood-burning fireplace.

Fire Escape Plan

Statistics reveal that 78 percent of deaths from fire occur in the home, with most of the fatalities taking place between 2 am and 4 am, while occupants are asleep. That is why it is critical to develop an escape plan, because one needs to react quickly with a fire:


- practice your plan at night, getting down on your hands and knees with a flashlight while crawling to safety. Heavy smoke impairs breathing, which is why staying close to the floor increases chances of escape.
- In order to be able to react quickly to fire, draw a floor plan of your home showing all possible exits from each room. Where possible, plan two exits: a main route and an alternate route from each room.
- If you live in an apartment building, develop your escape plan taking into account fire escape procedures provided by building management.

SMOKE ALARMS

SMOKE

LOCATING/INSTALLING ALARMS:

• Read and follow the manufacturer's instructions carefully.

• For best performance, an alarm should be mounted on the ceiling in or near the centre of the room, hall or stairway, and at the head of each stairway leading to an occupied area.

• Optimum location for wall mounts is at least 15 cm (6 inches) from the ceiling but not more than 30 cm (19 inches) from it.

- Avoid installing where the temperature is less than 5oC (41oF) or exceeds 48oC (119oF).
- Keep alarms away from doors and windows.
- Never locate an alarm in front of an air register, fans or vents.
- Keep alarms at least 60 cm (2 feet) from any corner.
- Do not recess smoke alarms in walls or ceilings!
- Smoke alarms in rooms with ceiling slopes greater than 30 cm (one foot) rise per 2.4 m (eight feet) horizontally should be located on the high side of the room.
- Avoid locating an alarm at the peak of an "A" frame type ceiling.
- Never paint a smoke alarm.
- Keep alarms 60 to 90 cm (two to three feet) away from light fixtures.

WHEN HAVING AN ALARM CONNECTED INTO THE ELECTRICAL WIRING SYSTEM OF A HOUSE YOU SHOULD:

- Use a qualified electrical contractor.
- Never install the alarm in the electrical circuit

except at the main panel. Alarms must also never be installed in a circuit connected to an on/off switch.

• Check the alarm when installation is complete.

MARK YOUR CALENDAR: TESTING AND CLEANING:

- Test your smoke alarm monthly and clean it every 6 months. Mark it on your calendar so that you don't forget. Things to remember when testing your smoke alarm:
- Ensure that power is being transmitted to the alarm and that it will activate in the presence of smoke.
- Test your smoke alarm by pressing the test button.
- Even alarms with a pilot light that indicate power is being transmitted, should be tested regularly.
- Battery-operated smoke alarms will warn you when batteries need replacing. Despite this, make it a habit to change the batteries yearly.
- When you've been away from home for a few days, check your alarm on your return to ensure it is working properly.
- Remember, your smoke alarm can't protect you if the batteries have been removed or a plug has been disconnected.
- The lifespan of a typical smoke alarm is about 10 years, but some models last as little as 5 years.
- To clean the alarm, open the cover and gently vacuum the interior of it. Frequently, the alarm will sound while the unit is being cleaned.
