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Espanola Police Report

On September 13, 2014, the Espanola Police Service's 911 Dispatch Centre received a call that there was a male in the Deerhound Lake area, possibly attempting to commit suicide. The 911 dispatcher routed the call through to the OPP, as Deerhound Lake was in their jurisdiction, but also dispatched members of the Espanola Police Service, as logistically, it was believed their arrival time would be quicker.

Upon arrival at Deerhound Lake, the Espanola officer was unable to locate the male's vehicle, but in checking the area, he noted fresh vehicle tracks traveling down an OFSC trail. The officer attempted to negotiate the trail in his police vehicle, but due to muddy and wet conditions, was unable to. The officer returned to the main road, and flagged down two males in a truck, who offered to drive the trail to search for the suicidal male. The two good samaritans located the male's truck on the trail with the motor running, and exhaust being directed into the passenger compartment. The good samaritans acted quickly in turning off the vehicle, and airing out the passenger compartment.

The semi-conscious male was removed from the vehicle, and transported to the main road by OPP officers in their 4x4 vehicle, to an awaiting ambulance. The male was hospitalized, and is recovering from carbon monoxide poisoning.

The Espanola Police Service would like to publically acknowledge the efforts of Paul Mokohonuk and Bruce Stewart, both of Espanola. If not for their assistance, and quick actions, the outcome may have been different.

During the weekend of September 19 to the 21, 2014, the Espanola Police Service received four complaints of damage being done to private property, and are asking for the public's assistance in identifying the person(s) responsible.

On September 19 at 6:10 am, a resident of a home on Hayward Street, Espanola, reported that an unknown person(s) threw a rock through a front picture window at her home, causing approximately \$500.00 damage.

On September 20, 2014 at 8:50 a.m., a resident of a home on Annette Street, Espanola, reported that during the night, unknown person(s) had damaged his truck by throwing red paint on the hood, grill and front bumper, causing approximately \$1000.00 in damage. The person(s) responsible left behind the plastic one gallon ice cream container that was used to carry the paint.

On September 20, 2014 at 9:20 p.m., a resident of a home on Avery Drive reported hearing several loud bangs outside of his home, and upon investigating the origin of the noise, he noticed that some unknown person(s) had caused approximately \$100.00 damage to his fence. Later at 10:29 p.m., the same homeowner called police again, because the person(s) had returned, and damaged another section of the fence, resulting in an additional \$250.00 in damage.

On September 20, 2014 at 11:20 a.m., a resident of a home on Haig Street, Espanola, reported that 5 youths wearing hoodies had kicked in her neighbour's fence. Police received four additional calls about the group of youths from residents on Elizabeth Street, Wood Street, Kathleen Street, and St. Joseph Street about the same group of youth causing noise, and tearing out election signs and trying to pull Municipal stop signs out of the ground. Despite an extensive search of the area by police, the group of vandals could not be located.

At this time, there are no suspects in these matters.

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Magic Mike, The "Mix Master"

By Grant Lewis - Talk about a recipe that works. The ingredients are as follows: pour five tons of fish guts into an almost ancient concrete truck tumbler. Stir until the mixture has the consistency of brown porridge. Carefully stir in five tons of cedar sawdust and continue stirring till completely mixed. Pour mixture into winrows carefully located over pipes. Turn on blower and force air through the 2 inch pipes.

air through the 3 inch pipes into the piles of 'stuff' but not at peak hours of hydro consumption. Heat till 65 degrees centigrade for two to three months or until the microbes start doing their Allow leachate to escape from the bottom and collect in a lagoon to be used as a fish compost tea. Once the mixture has a moisture content between 20% and 30%, bag and truck off to Home Hardware in Espanola. Et voila.....Meeker's Miracle Mix is complete.

Sound simple? Mike Meeker has succeeded, where Betty Crocker might have had a problem! Mike is able to produce tons of his mix daily and has no problem finding someone to buy it. Golf clubs, Vale, Costco, Home

Hardware stores, and many other businesses can't get enough of it. And it works! Ask your local gardeners.

The Espanola Horticultural Society had a rare opportunity to view the process close up this past weekend. Huge piles were scattered around the property in various stages of composting: piles of sawdust, piles fresh from the mixer, piles one month old, piles ready for sifting, and piles ready for bagging.

Did I mention the compost tea? The entire operation is located on an immense flat surface of limestone which allows the leachate to slowly run down into a lagoon where it is collected and stored to be used as a liquid fertilizer. Nothing goes to waste. Mike is passionate about what he does. His product has done well but he remains a humble person searching for other ways to avoid waste and help the planet. His generosity is overwhelming. He has kindly donated 1,000 litres of the tea and one ton of his fish compost to help the Horticultural Society at their Community Garden program on Algoma Street.

The event is also aimed at assisting younger students with high school course selections in order to guide them in choosing future university programs.

Students and their parents will have the chance to attend a fair-style session, held in the school's gymnasium, where they can visit each Ontario university representative individually.

Students who are interested in attending are encouraged to confirm the UIP schedule in their area with their guidance office.

The UIP is hosted exclusively by Ontario universities. Each university participates in joint visits to high schools across the province each fall. The event is organized by the Standing Committee on Secondary School Liaison and the Ontario University Registrars' Association.






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New Espanola School Plans Unveiled



By Chloe Kneer - The new joint Catholic schools in Espanola have moved on to stage two out of three (Design Development), as the dream of a brand new building to house Sacred Heart, St. Joseph, and Franco Ouest inches closer to reality. The third and final phase is Construction Documents, which is expected to be completed in December of this year.

Architects, board officials, and Sacred Heart School principal Syndy Withers were all onhand at a public information session which unveiled the agreed-upon plans. The structure will be a mirror-image, 2 storey building. Each school board will have half of the school and two floors. While there are dedicated classrooms. storage, and discovery rooms, or "learning pods" as they are called, there is also plenty of shared space including a huge gym, multipurpose chapel, and green space outside. As is typical with all newer schools, there is no lunchroom in the plan. The school is also fully accessible with an elevator and barrierfree washrooms. "Our original design called for Special

Education to be on the second floor, however, we felt it more beneficial to have that classroom on the main floor, so the change was made," notes Principal Withers. She adds, "We also wanted the school to be distinctly Catholic from the outside, so we made sure the exterior design reflected that." Sacred Heart will remain a JK-grade 8 school, while St. Joseph and Franco Ouest will encompass a JK-grade 12 combined school. If all goes according to plan, tenders will go out for construction in late August of 2015.

Recipe

This is a 7-ingredient, healthy, chocolaty, granola bar that tastes just like an Eatmore chocolate bar. No baking required besides toasting the nuts and oats which is an optional step but I think it adds a nice nutty flavour. I made a pan of these, cut



them into squares and kept them in the freezer for a quick, filling snack that tastes like you are eating something sinful but you are not. You will even forget it's made with dates. A simple, all naturally-sweetened, satisfying treat.

Healthy Chocolate Granola Bars

- 1 1/2 cups rolled oats
- 1 cup raw nuts, roughly chopped (I used 1/2 cup almonds, 1/2 cup pecans)
- 1 cup raw walnuts
- 2 cups pitted dates, soaked for 10 minutes in warm water, then drained
- 3/4 cup cocoa powder
- 1/4 cup natural peanut butter or almond butter
- 1/4 cup agave nectar, honey or maple syrup

Optional step: Toast your oats and pecans and almonds in a 350 degree oven for 10 -15 minutes or until slightly golden brown. Otherwise, leave them raw but I prefer the toasted flavour. Process walnuts in a food processor until a loose meal is reached. Remove from bowl and set aside. Add dates and process until small bits remain (about 1 minute). It should form a "dough" like consistency (Mine rolled into a ball). Add walnut meal and cocoa powder back in with the dates and process to combine. Transfer mixture to a large mixing bowl and add the (toasted) oats and nuts and stir to combine. You may have to use your hands to really incorporate the mixture well. Next, warm honey and peanut/almond butter in a small pot over medium heat for 2-3 minutes until combined and pourable. Pour over brownie mixture and then thoroughly mix using a wooden spoon or your hands (you can put plastic bags on your hands to save a mess). Once thoroughly mixed, transfer to a 9×13 dish (or smaller size pan) lined with plastic wrap or parchment paper so they lift out easily. If using a 9×13, ONLY USE 3/4 of the pan so they have the proper thickness. Otherwise they'll be too thin. Cover with parchment or plastic wrap and press down firmly to even out the top. Freeze for 15-20 minutes to harden. Lift bars from pan and chop into 12 even bars (or more if you prefer). Store in an airtight container in the freezer or fridge to keep them extra fresh. They will get a little sticky when left out at room

Not only are these antiques given a good home, but they are used to depict days gone by for our young people through school and heritage programs. Our research library holds information for many searching for community and family histories.

Fundraising monies and grants did not fully fund the building of the new museum, and we now have a 20 year mortgage with \$660.00 per month to repay. Our many fundraising events are CRITICAL to pay for the day to day operations of the museum.

The museum's expenses are over \$65,000 per year, and after expected income from fund-raising, grants and donations usually received there is still a significant yearly shortfall as follows:
