

McColeman Preliminary Hearing Scheduled

On Tuesday, April 7, Paul McColeman was scheduled to appear in Espanola court. In lieu of his appearance, his George Florentis attorney sent instructions requesting a preliminary hearing date on the multiple charges McColeman is facing in connection to alleged luring of adolescent boys via social media.

Judge Serre set a hearing date

of July 6, running for a week and then for four more days beginning July 13. The judge wished to begin court earlier in the day, but the Crown attorney resisted, at least for the first few days, citing his having to schedule multiple witnesses and the large task involved in organizing the scheduling of those witnesses. McColeman remains out of jail on bond.

Espanola Police Report

A 23 year old Espanola resident is facing a number of charges, after two incidents that occurred during the morning hours of March 14, in the Town of Espanola. At 12:48 a.m., the Espanola Police Service responded to a complaint regarding a male damaging a vehicle in the Parchment Street area. Upon arrival, police located the male in the driveway of the home arguing with his girlfriend. The male, who was intoxicated, had been locked out of the residence after becoming argumentative with friends he was visiting, and once he could not gain entry back inside, he allegedly kicked out the taillights, and broke the mirrors off a truck parked in the driveway, and then caused damage to the paint on another car. During the arrest of the male for Mischief, he resisted the officer's attempts to handcuff him, by stiffening his arms, and pushing his body into an officer, causing the officer to fall to the ground. Once under control, the male was taken to the Espanola Police Service, where he was lodged, and once sober, released on a Promise to Appear in court to face charges that included two counts of Mischief to Property, one count of Assaulting a Peace Officer, and one count of Assault with Intent to Resist. At 8:55 a.m., the Espanola Police Service received a 911 call from the same Parchment Street residence, alleging that the male, who was released from police custody less than an hour before, had just broken into the residence, and grabbed and pushed his girlfriend, and punched another male several times in the face, causing bruising, and a bloodied nose. The male left the residence following the 911 call to police, but stopped in the driveway to puncture the tire of the previously damaged truck. At 1:00 p.m., an Espanola Police Officer arrested the male for the second time in 12 hours, when he walked out of his residence. The male was held in custody for a bail hearing on March 16, to face additional charges of: Assault (2 counts);

Domestic Assault (4 counts); Breaking and Énter; Forcible Entry; and Mischief Under \$5000.00.

On February 20, a 17 year old female attended the Espanola Police Service to report being assaulted the night before, while sitting inside the Tim Hortons restaurant on Centre Street. The female alleged that while sitting at a table talking to friends, another female that she has had past issues with, approached her and punched her in the side of the face. The female suspect, who was identified as a 17 year old from Elliott Lake, left the restaurant after striking victim, and was not immediately located. On March 21, the Espanola Police Service received information from the victim that the female suspect was back at the Tim Hortons, sitting in a vehicle in the parking lot. Responding quickly, police located and arrested the suspect for assault. As a result of the incident, the 17 year old female from Elliott Lake was charged with one count of Assault. She will appear in Espanola Court on April 28, to answer to her charges.

News From The Park

Day after day, week after week, without a doubt the number one concern raised in our offices is the skyrocketing cost of hydro. Absolutely nothing has been done since this Liberal government was given a majority mandate to alleviate the crippling costs of hydro on hardworking families across this province. Ontarians are paying the highest electricity prices in Canada, more than twice what our neighbouring provinces pay. The Liberal government says that sky-high hydro bills

are just the cost of doing business - but they're not. They are the cost of how the Liberals do business.

At a time when most Ontarians are struggling to pay their current bills, residential hydro rates in the province are expected to increase by 42 per cent over the next five years.

Now the Premier is refusing to say how much Hydro One privatization will cost Ontario ratepayers.

Last week Ontario NDP Leader Andrea Horwath asked the Premier point blank, to "provide any guarantees that hydro rates will not go up as part of the Liberal plan to privatize Hydro One and local utilities." The Premier could not, or would not, provide any assurances.

The fact remains that every time Liberals and Conservatives privatize part of our hydro system, Ontarians end up paying more. Hydro rates in Ontario have more than tripled since Liberal and governments Conservative began to privatize Ontario's hydro system. According to the Ontario Energy Board, rates have gone from 4.3 cents/ kWh in 2002 to 14 cents/kWh



today. According to Manitoba Hydro's national comparison, Ontarians pay the highest hydro bills in the country.

Ontario's Energy Minister admitted that if the province privatizes even a small portion of Hydro One that decisions may no longer be in the hands of the public. This should be sounding the alarm bell across this province.

We in Northern Ontario have seen the devastating impact of privatization and downloading of services. The current state of winter road maintenance in northern Ontario is downright frightening. We see roads that haven't been salted or plowed after storms for hours and even days putting motorists and their families in grave danger. Much of the Ministry of Natural Resources and their programs have been cut. services like the Bear Wise


Program have been eliminated putting wildlife management in crisis and communities at risk. If it's not one thing. it's another. Ontarians are fed up with the scandals and mismanagement which are resulting high costs including hydro and lost services.

Recipe

A popover is made from a thin egg batter which rises to form a hollow roll when baked. It's very similar to Yorkshire pudding. The secret to a light and airy popover is a very light touch when mixing and a very



hot oven when baking. These are the perfect vessel for pouring in gravy with your roast beef dinner but also can be eaten at breakfast with butter and jam or for dessert with a sweet filling. I got the following recipe years ago from a friend and I enjoy them most served with roast beef and gravy.

Popovers

- 2 tbsp's butter, melted
- 2 cups milk
- 2 cups flour
- 1 tsp salt
- 4 eggs, lightly beaten

Preheat oven to 450 degrees. Butter and lightly flour 10-12 muffin cups or a popover pan. Set aside. Whisk together the butter, milk, flour and salt until smooth. Whisk in the beaten eggs a bit at a time until incorporated. Do not overbeat the batter. It should have the consistency of heavy cream. Fill prepared cups ¾ full. Bake 15 minutes. Without opening the oven, lower the heat to 350 degrees and bake 15-20 minutes longer. Serve hot.


