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News From The Park

Last week at Queen's Park, New Democrats demonstrated that they will do what it takes to stand up and fight to protect public ownership of Hydro One after Premier Kathleen Wynne announced her plan to sell off 60% of Hydro One.

Ontario's public hydro system supports healthcare, education, and social services. Kathleen Wynne's plan to privatize Hydro One will put all of that at risk and leave Ontarians paying higher hydro bills.

The liberals didn't run on this plan, it wasn't in her platform, and the Premier kept it secret for the last 10 months. Kathleen Wynne is shoving privatization down the throats of Ontarians without ever consulting with them. This is being done with no transparency, no consultation, and no mandate from the people of Ontario. Ontarians might get more access to beer, but they won't be able to afford to keep it cold because of rising hydro rates.

NDP Leader Andrea Horwath noted in a press conference yesterday that privatization of hydro have led to the tripling of hydro bills. Since 2002 privatization has driven the cost of energy from 4.3 cents per kilowatt-hour to 14 cents per kilowatt-hour.

New Democrats stood up in the legislature and protested because the Premier was trying to undermine the legislature, and keep opposition members from asking questions until Monday. Most of our caucus was removed from the legislature because we felt strongly that the government was not listening to Ontarians, constituents and therefore we needed to make our combined voices heard.

At the same time we were successful on another front. My colleague and Welland MPP Cindy Forster had her Bill calling for priority access to long-term term care for veterans passed with unanimous consent. New Democrats believe that we have a duty of care to ensure that all veterans who have sacrificed on our behalf are given the care they need and rightfully deserve, regardless of when or where they served. The rules need to change to give priority to veterans regardless of service. According to the Veteran Ombudsman's 2013-2014 report, modern day veterans have the least access when it comes to long-term care

We're being misled into thinking that there's no longer a need because the number of veterans is declining. What people don't realize is that the definition of veteran that's being used in current legislation only refers to pre-1953 veterans, which is fundamentally wrong. Once the modern veteran population is factored in, the need for priority access to long-term care beds becomes dire.

Veterans, including modern day veterans have made the ultimate sacrifice for us. New Democrats believe their access to long-term health care and support is paramount. We will do everything possible to move this legislature through legislative process as swiftly as possible.

Lendrum showed me around the site, which he hopes will have the approval of council soon, as he hopes to capitalize on the construction that will be taking place this summer to replace the culvert in that area. "I'm thinking, they will have a lot of material to relocate, and it would be perfect to use some of that material as fill for our site, rather than have it go to the landfill," Lendrum said. He is hoping to re-route the existing snowmobile trail a little further in from the road, then clear out an area for trees to be planted and benches to be placed. His hope is not only that the park would be a peaceful place for those with autism to experience nature, but also that the park may eventually become a "safe place" for those on the autism spectrum when they feel the need to retreat. When autistic children feel overwhelmed, they may run away; Lendrum hopes the park will be the place they run to so that they can eventually be located safely.

Lendrum has worked with the Espanola Police Service to develop an autism registry. Although it is private how many names are on the registry, he says he feels it has already benefitted area children. "Essentially when a call is placed to EPS, and that child's name is given, he/ she should be flagged in their system and that information should be readily available to the dispatcher," he explains. Specific instructions can then be given to an officer attending a scene with the autistic child.

Also on Lendrum's agenda for the near future is partnering with a local service club in the handling of the money collected during Autism Acceptance events. Lendrum would like to see all of the money stay local, rather than handed over to the other agencies, which employ staff and have overhead. "Everytime I send money to Sudbury, there's wages," he says. "If we can keep it here, we don't have to give it away, then ask for it back, but only get a portion of it back." 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Recipe

I woke up this morning and made the following cookies. I wanted to be sure they were good before I shared the recipe with you. Needless to say I had cookies for breakfast. These



are a simple but vet delicious and flavourful sugar cookie very similar to a famous premade cookie dough that you buy from the grocery store. The dough is firm yet pliable and is easily rolled into little balls. I found using my stand up mixer was the easiest way to make the dough. They will come out of the oven puffed up but flatten as they cool. The edges of this cookie are crispy but the centers remain soft and chewy.

Cracked Sugar Cookies

- 1 1/4 cups white sugar
- 1 cup butter
- 3 egg volks
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar



Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Cream togetner sugar and butter. Beat in egg yolks and vanilla. Add flour, baking soda, and cream of tartar. Stir. Form dough into walnut size balls and place 2 inches apart on cookie sheet. Don't flatten. Bake 10 to 11 minutes, until tops are cracked and just turning colour.

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Making Home Ownership Attainable

The Habitat for Humanity Espanola build is slated ground break summer and applications are currently being taken from families who wish to purchase and live in the new home. Family Selection Committee Chair Kathy Yusko says she would like to urge residents to attend one of the three upcoming family selection information sessions and to apply for the home. "The biggest criteria we use in selecting a family is need," Yusko says. "And need comes in many forms. It could be financial, but it could also be physical, as in the case of a disability, or a health concern arising from current living conditions. Safety is another need we like to address; families need places that are free of mould, or other dangers." Yusko says she wants to

dispel the myth about Habitat homes being "lowincome housing." "What Habitat for Humanity does for people as an organization is help them with a hand up. not a hand out. One of the biggest barriers to home ownership is the inability to save for a down payment. A Habitat home doesn't require a down payment. **Applicants** are fully screened, must show proof of steady income, no current bankruptcy proceedings." She goes on to say that she realizes many of those who would qualify may not apply because of the perceived stigma that may come along with it. "What I want to emphasize to those who may feel uneasy about applying is that if you can't do it for yourself, do it for your children. In 2006 and 2013, CMHC conducted surveys with 165 families who have purchased through

Habitat. The findings were remarkable. Amongst the children, participation in extracurricular activities increased from 50% to 61% after moving into their **Participation** own homes. in music and the arts went up from 18% to 30% and volunteering jumped from 29% to 45%. Eighty-six percent of Habitat home owners reported feeling happier since moving into their homes and nearly 60% said they were better off financially."

Yusko cites the difference between living in a house versus a home. "A home is somewhere you call your own, where you are proud to invite your friends," she says. "Home owners benefit in many ways, including from comradery with neighbours and a feeling of belonging in the community."

Yusko says she would like to have a family selected before the project begins so that the home can be tailored to their needs. The first step is filling out the application package, which can be picked up at one of upcoming meetings. From there, an in-home visit is scheduled, where applicants are asked various questions, including what homeownership means to them and how they plan to display pride of ownership at their new home, if chosen by the committee. The Family Selection committee then makes its recommendations to the Board of Directors, who have final approval of the family.

A family is given as many tools as possible to be homeowners. successful For instance, the Family Partnering committee guides them through the

purchasing process assisting in finding lawyer. They are also helped with budgeting and are given home maintenance information. "Buying a home doesn't come with an instruction manual, but we provide that," Yusko says. Additionally, Habitat Humanity does vearly review of the home owners' circumstances and

determines how much their monthly mortgage payments will be for the upcoming Mortgages year. never exceed 25% of a family's income, property included.
