

Espanola Town Council Report

mostly housekeeping items on the agenda at the last regular meeting for 2015. Council measures passed dealing with insurance coverage and fuel supply. Councillor Bob Yocom informed everyone that cancellation of the power dam grant has been delayed and that Espanola will receive grant monies in 2016.

At issue for a short question and answer period was a by-law dealing with council remuneration. Councillor Ron Duplessis took issue with wording in the by-law which would monetarily penalize members of council missing committee meetings. Duplessis asked Clerk Cynthia Townsend if staff were also penalized if they missed committee meetings, saying, "I think it's important for all of us to be covered under the same guidelines." Duplessis cited the need for staff (particularly department

By Chloe Kneer - It was heads) to be in attendance so that they can answer questions from council on certain matters. Townsend said that she could relay the questions and get answers later. The bylaw is going to be brought back to council for this and other reasons, including an issue that council had discussed long ago, but never acted on: who will attend conferences and what sort of report must be presented after. Early in their term, council tossed around the idea of voting on who would be a delegate from council, rather than giving all councillors the option of attending conferences all (such as the Good Roads or FONOM gatherings.) Councillor Yocom reiterated the need for a presentation on what was learned at the conferences.

The first council meeting of 2016 will be on January 12 at 7:30 p.m. at the municipal offices.

Joan Mantle Trust Award Taking Nominations

Sylvia Carscadden, founder and director of the Kampana Bells, was the inaugural recipient of the award in 2014. She said music teachers don't always realize the tremendous impact they have on a person's life. "Music teachers provided experiences and opportunities

School that formed my appreciation of quality and the discipline excellence. But importantly, they made an extra effort to share what they loved. It has had a lasting impact on my life and I am truly honoured to receive this wonderful award." Long-time educator and musical performer Peter Schneider was selected as the (posthumous) recipient of the 2015 award. Carolyn Otto, a member of the Sudbury Secondary School Music Department, had the pleasure of working with Peter Schneider in various community bands for more than 25 years. She witnessed the positive impact he had on individual musicians and the cultural vitality of the City of Greater Sudbury. "Peter was the consummate music educator. He happily shared this knowledge with his fellow musicians and audiences alike.'

The Joan Mantle Music Trust was established in 2008 to pay tribute to a long-time educator who made an immense contribution to music education at the local, provincial and national levels. Joan Mantle passed away on June 9, 2009, after a courageous battle with cancer.

The Joan Mantle Music Trust allocates funds to school music programs in Rainbow District School Board on a rotating basis. The Trust also accepts the donation of new and used musical instruments and allocates them to schools in need. This ensures that there is an ongoing improvement in the condition of musical equipment throughout the Board, allowing for students to achieve more in their musical studies together.

Espanola Police Reports

Despite being well into the school year, the Espanola Police Service continues to respond to complaints of drivers putting children at risk, by failing to stop for school buses. On November 26, a 21 year old Espanola man was charged under the Highway Traffic Act for Fail to Stop for School Bus, after he was identified as the driver of a motor vehicle that drove through the stop arm of a stopped school bus on Barber Street near Shamess Crescent in Espanola on November 24. The male was issued a Provincial Offences Notice, which carries a fine of \$490.00 and 6 demerit points.

On November 27 at 9:50 a.m., the Espanola Police Service received a complaint about a dispute between a 14 year old male and his mother. Information provided to police was that the male had just assaulted his mother, and left the residence. While on route to the home, police located the male walking on the street, and while attempting to arrest him for assault, he struggled with officers and had to be restrained. During a search of the male, 6 grams of Marihuana was found on his person. In speaking to the mother following her son's arrest, police learned that a dispute occurred over her son's behaviour, and during the argument, he struck her in the chest and back, and put her in a headlock. While attempting to leave the residence, he punched a female friend of the mother's in the chest and jaw area, when she tried to keep him from leaving. As a result of the incident, the 14 year old was charged with two counts of Assault, and one count of Possession of a Controlled Substance. He appeared in Sudbury Bail Court on November 30 to answer to his charges.

On November 29, a 26 year old Espanola man residing on Mead Street, received two fines within an hour of one another, for violating the Town of Espanola's Municipal Noise By-Law. At 9:05 p.m., members of the Espanola Police Service attended the Mead Street home, after receiving a complaint of loud music. Upon arrival, loud music with explicit words could be heard coming from the home, and as a result, the occupant received a \$150.00 fine under the by-law. At 10:08 p.m., members of the Espanola Police Service returned to the same residence, as the occupant had turned the music back up. This time the occupant was playing loud dance music that did not contain explicit words; however, he had left a note taped to his door with explicit instructions about what the police could do. He was fined \$150.00 for a second time under the by-law. The Municipal Noise By-Law 1189/96, which deals with the Control of Noise, ensures that people have a right to and should be ensured an environment free from unusual, unnecessary, or excessive sound or vibration which may degrade the quality and tranquility of their life or cause a nuisance. Pursuant to the Provincial Offences Act, a person in violation of the By-Law could be subject to fines of up to \$2000.00 or 6 months in jail or both. Continuous violations, which demonstrates a willfulness to interrupt or interfere with another person's lawful enjoyment of property, can also result in Criminal Mischief charges.

CARAMEL APPLE CREAM CHEESE SPREAD

- ❖ 8 ounces cream cheese
- Caramel sauce (homemade or store-bought)
- **❖** Skor bits
- Sliced apples, pears or pretzels for serving

Place cream cheese on a serving dish. Pour as much caramel sauce as you want evenly over cream cheese. Sprinkle with a generous helping of Skor bits. Serve with sliced apples, pears, or pretzels.



NACHO CHEESE DIP

- ❖ 1 pkg. (16oz) Velveeta Cheese
