While each case f is different, the average life the expectancy for someone p diagnosed with cystic fibrosis d is 31.

Sufferers must endure a litany of physiotherapy, drugs and inhalers, along with rigorous exercise to loosen the mucus in the lungs. Often, patients feel drained and exhausted. Immune systems of sufferers are also compromised due to the heavy use of antibiotics to keep infections at bay.

The good news is, with determination and discipline, CF patients are living longer.

Webbwood resident Alana Laderoute Grant is а shining example. Not expected to make it through her teens, Grant decided to live her life to the fullest and is usually seen snowshoeing, bike riding, or on

long walks with her dog, Atlas. She has remained extremely active, and as a result, will be celebrating a huge milestone next month: her 40th birthday. #### **Espanola Police Reports**

On December 1, a 23-year old female was to attend Espanola Court to answer to drug possession charges, stemming from an incident in August 2015. The female attended her first appearance in November, but failed to re-attend on the December court date, and a Bench Warrant was issued for her arrest.

On December 10, an Espanola Police Officer on duty in Provincial Offences Court, noted that the female was in attendance for a traffic matter, and upon confirming the warrant, the female was arrested and charged with Failing to Appear in Court. She was held for a Bail Hearing in Sudbury Court on December 11.

On December 5, at 12:20 p.m., a member of the Espanola Police Service was conducting routine patrol northbound on Centre Street, when he observed a vehicle in front of him that appeared to be travelling at a higher rate of speed than the posted 40 km/h zone. The officer activated the police vehicle's radar unit, which confirmed that the vehicle was travelling at 62 km/h.

After stopping the vehicle for the speeding infraction, the officer noted the overwhelming smell of freshly burnt Marihuana coming from inside the vehicle, and when the driver was questioned about the odour, the driver said that he'd smoked a joint at 6:00 a.m.; however, the officer could see a partial Cannabis cigarette in the center console. As a result of his observation, the officer arrested the driver and passenger, and during a search incident to arrest, the officer located a total of 61 grams of Cannabis-Marihuana, and a partially consumed can of beer.

The driver, a 28-year old Sudbury resident, was charged with:

1. Possession of a Controlled Substance sec. 4(1) CDSA;

2. Speeding sec.128 HTA;

3. Drive Motor Vehicle No Currently Validated Permit sec. 7(1)(a) HTA; 4. Fail to Surrender Licence sec. 33(1) HTA; and

5. Drive Motor Vehicle with Open Container of Liquor sec. 32(1) LLA He will appear in Espanola Court on March 16, 2016 to answer to his charges.

Day before serving grease a 9 x 13 dish. Sprinkle bread,

ham and cheese evenly over the bottom. Beat eggs, milk, thyme, and mustard. Pour over. Cover and refrigerate overnight. Remove from refrigerator in the morning while you preheat the oven to 325 degrees. Bake uncovered, 1 hour or until edges are slightly brown and a knife comes out clean when tested.

## Sausage-Hash Brown Breakfast Casserole

- \* 1 pound mild ground pork sausage
- 1 lb frozen hash browns  $\dot{\mathbf{v}}$
- \* 1 onion, diced small
- \* 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, divided
- \* 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- \* 1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese
- \* 6 large eggs
- \* 2 cups milk

Cook sausage in a large skillet over medium-high heat, stirring until sausage crumbles and is no longer pink. Drain well. Prepare hash browns according to package

directions, adding onion and 1/2teaspoon salt and pepper. Stir together hash browns, sausage, and cheese. Pour into a lightly greased 13- x 9-inch baking dish. Whisk together eggs, milk, and remaining 1 teaspoon salt. Pour evenly over potato mixture. Bake at 350° for 35 to 40 minutes.
