Habitat For Humanity Construction Underway

It was a chilly morning to start a big construction project, but the crowd that gathered at the corner of Oscar and Adelaide Streets on Saturday, November 28 was undeterred. The bulldozer broke through the earth, thereby starting the long-delayed construction of a new duplex at the site. The homes are being built by Habitat for Humanity and are the first projects the local chapter has done in three years. Habitat for Humanity has built a few other single family residents in Greater Sudbury, but never one in the Espanola area.

The former owner of the lot donated it to the organization and planning began, first with public meetings to inform locals of the benefits of home ownership through Habitat for Humanity. Then, volunteers were sought to help with fundraising, marketing and construction. The first phase

of construction must be done by professionals, but once the foundation and basic structure are in place, volunteers will be seen on site completing the project. The chosen homeowners will contribute 500 hours of "sweat equity" to their new digs.

The Best And Brightest Blue Jay Gone; **Canada Takes The Loss**

The original Blue Jay has left the nest, to my question: "How the hell did you never to return. Signed as the very first employee of Canada's first Major League Baseball franchise in 1977, Paul Beeston has just retired. With little more than the experience of an equipment manager of the Welland High Tigers and later a chartered accountant in London, Ontario, Beeston spotted a small window into professional sports and he dove through it head first, landing on his feet at Exhibition Stadium 38 years ago.

As a rising star at the staid accounting firm of Coopers & Lybrand in London, Ontario, Paul knew a guy named Don McDougall, the president of Labatt Brewery and they needed a financial guy who knew baseball. The Toronto Blue Jays were being created on the fly and ... thrown into unchartered waters, Paul Beeston performed brilliantly right from the start.

Six years later I was sitting in his office at the rickety old stadium taking notes on a clipboard for a magazine cover "Talent!' He feature when he yells: has his feet up on the desk, no socks of course, his hands behind his head, and a hand-rolled Cuban cigar bobbing up and down in his mouth. This is the same happy kid I delivered drugs with all over Welland, Ontario by bicycle for Frame's Pharmacy. "Talent," he yells in answer

get this job anyway?"

"They wanted a financial guy with talent, a guy with a C.A., somebody with a little bit of personality and ... you know, when they couldn't find anybody, they asked me if I was interested."

A funny man with a booming laugh, it was not hard to find President Beeston in the Blue Jays clubhouse 16 years later when I was writing the baseball movie Chasing The Dream. I'd just follow the laughter. The players loved him. The staff adored him.

I was in the Blue Jays boardroom the morning after Dave Winfield killed that seagull at Exhibition Stadium as a telephone meeting of leagues and league officials tried to work out a deal that would see the charges dropped. Paul was tired. He'd been up all night and at one point had rifled all the desk drawers and coin cans in the staff offices to raise Winfield's bail. Every time they'd come close to some sort of an agreement, somebody would make a seagull/blue jay joke and negotiations would collapse in four separate cities.

"But if Winfield could never hit the cutoff man, how in the hell did he hit the seagull? That's our defense."

Sitting silent for hours I finally couldn't

take it any longer. "You know," I said, "you guys should send the bird's body to the veterinary college at Guelph University. Maybe the autopsy would show the bird died of shock before the ball even hit him!"

Pat Gillick, wheeled around with: "Who's he?!?"

"He's a friend from Welland," said Paul, "ignore him."

After bringing Canada back-to-back World Series titles in 1992 and 1993, he went to work at Major League Baseball headquarters in New York City in 1997. Paul's rocket-like rise to the second most powerful position in professional baseball may have surprised the sports world, but not a single person who knew him. There's an awful lot of quiet power in a man who exudes charm, humour and class.

I firmly believed he was being groomed for Commissioner of Baseball until they discovered his fatal flaw – Paul loved the game too much. The owners wanted a head waiter to deliver cocktails of immense cash to the private boxes and kiss their World Series rings. And they found him – in Bud "Lite" Selig, a former used car salesman.

Rare is the man who can achieve ultimate success and still remembers all his friends from the days when he was unknown outside of his own neighbourhood. I recall having a beer with Al Chernish after an awards banquet in Welland.

The Nashville North barman was recounting all the allstar games he and Danny Radobenko had been going to, compliments of The Blue Jays president.

"Wait a minute," I said. "You've been mooching free all-star tickets from Paul for the last ten years?!?"

"No, no," says Al. "It's gotta be eleven years now because we went to Cincinnati in '88." Late last season I watched the ceremony at Rogers Centre honoring the heroes of the 1992/1993 back-to-back World Series Championships. Out on the field receiving awards and standing ovations were Joe Carter, John Olerud, Duane Ward, Kelly Gruber, et al. And I thought, okay where's the architect and the builder? Where's Pat Gillick and Paul Beeston? No idea where Gillick was, but there was Paul, up in his booth enjoying the show like a wide-eyed kid. Too modest to take a bow, he was content to let the others bathe in the glory of Blue Jays history.

That kind of immense but immeasurable Canadianism is not coming back anytime soon. So long and thank you Paul Beeston, the small town kid who went on to create great memories for an entire country.

Santa To A Senior



The concept of giving trees, adorned with ornaments bearing either names or ages of children to buy for at Christmas, is a wellknown holiday tradition. But what about the elder generation, the seniors who find themselves in need of items and have little or no family or resources? There are vulnerable members of communities on both sides of the age spectrum. That's where Be A Santa To A Senior comes in.

"I wanted to keep it very simple," says Marcella Yusko of the campaign which has just kicked off. "Basically, names are provided by the VON, or other organizations who know of seniors who could use gifts at Christmas. The tags are placed on our trees and people are invited to grab a tag and buy for that senior. Every senior gets a gift, regardless." Locations with trees are the Espanola Canada Post, Donna's Hair Studio, Brokerlink and Caisse populaire.

Those taking a tag will be required to register the name of the senior with the customer service staff at each location. then it's happy shopping. Yusko has also partnered with the Espanola Express to host Warm Up A Senior Day at the Express hockey game on Sunday, December 20. Game time is 1:30 p.m. and those attending are asked to bring hats with flaps, scarves, lap blankets or socks for men or women with them to the game. Hydro Help

The Ontario Energy Board has introduced the Ontario Electricity Support Program (OESP) to help low income households with their hydro bills. The initiative starts on January 1, 2016, but applications are being taken now.

The program gives lower income households a credit on their monthly bills, starting at \$30/month for those with annual incomes lower than \$28,000. The OESP is funded by all ratepayers through an additional per kilowatt hour surcharge. This surcharge

is expected to cost about \$1/ month for residents and \$2 for businesses. Those with higher electricity bills due to electric heat or necessary medical devices may be eligible for an increased credit.

In the meantime, the Ontario Clean Energy Benefit, a 10% rebate that consumers have received since 2012, ends on December 31, 2015.


This time, she is raising funds for her new wheelchair.

Recipe

A buttery, sugary, crunchy and chewy Praline Toffee/Bark that is very addictive. You have been warned.

Praline Crack

- ❖ 8 graham cracker squares
- ❖ 1 cup butter
- ❖ 1 cup light brown sugar
- ❖ 1 tsp vanilla
- ❖ ½ tsp salt
- ❖ ¾ cup chopped pecans

Preheat oven to 350°. Line a large non-stick baking pan with sides (jelly roll pan) with graham crackers, breaking in half if necessary to line the pan. Melt butter and sugar in a small saucepan over medium heat until it comes to a boil. Allow it to boil for 2 minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and stir in salt and vanilla. Pour mixture over top of the graham crackers evenly, spreading to coat. Sprinkle pecans on top and bake in



oven for 10-12 minutes until bubbly all over. If you prefer it a little crunchier, bake for 2 more minutes, but no longer or it will burn. Remove from oven and allow to cool. Cut into squares.
