By Chloe Kneer - According to Statistics Canada, heart disease is the number two killer of Canadians, behind cancer. Rates of heart disease in males and females are closely matched with around 23,000 deaths per year. Common symptoms of heart, or coronary artery, disease are chest pain, shortness of breath, palpitations (or a "flip-flop" feeling in your chest), faster heartbeat, weakness or dizziness, nausea, and sweating.

Having a heart attack will feel like discomfort, pressure, or heaviness in the chest, arm, or below the breastbone. You may also have discomfort radiating to the back, jaw, throat, or arm. Indigestion, heartburn, or feeling like you are choking are also common symptoms. In others, a heart attack may be "silent," without any symptoms. This occurs most often in diabetics. A heart attack typically lasts 30 minutes or longer and is not relieved by rest or medications. If you experience any of these symptoms, it is imperative to call 9-1-1 to get help right away.

Roofs caved in, many people were trapped in their cars, 4.000 houses lost power and every man, woman and child in that city was absolutely outraged that that the game between the Bills and the New York Jets might be cancelled.

Trying desperately to save the game, the Bills offered anybody who owned a shovel \$10 an hour - (I'm not making this up) - to come to Ralph Wilson Stadium and remove the 220,000 tons of snow - enough to fill their practice field house eight times over. When nine guys wearing Jim Kelly jerseys passed out from exhaustion, the game was cancelled and moved to Detroit.

A storm that most certainly deserved a name? January 12, 1888 started out as an unusually warm winter's day in the Midwest with melting snow and dripping ice. Then an Arctic blast sped in from Alberta clashing with a warm front from the Gulf of Mexico causing a cataclysmic,

atmospheric train wreck. The temperature dropped ... you need to sit down for this one ... 18° Fahrenheit in just three minutes. Striking Montana, Nebraska, Wisconsin and Minnesota like iced lightening - the Midwest was frozen in temperature and time. Heavy snow, high winds. blinding white-outs and 40° below zero in both Fahrenheit and Celsius saw hundreds of people frozen to death, mostly children trying to get home from school. The official death toll was 235 but they believe almost 500 people died.

Now that's a storm, a historic storm worthy of a name. Two names actually. According to Wikipedia it was called the Schoolhouse Blizzard. According to a terrific book by American author David Laskin, it is known by his title "The Children's Blizzard."

And while we're putting name tags on everything - are we not "The Most Spoiled Generation Ever?" Just askin'.

Espanola Town Council Report

By Chloe Kneer - Espanola Town Council reviewed committee and board meeting minutes at the January 27 regular meeting of council. At their most recent meeting. the Community Services Committee directed staff to eliminate the hanging baskets usually seen around Espanola in the late spring and summer This direction led months. to heated debated between councillors. Councillor Ron Duplessis defended the move, saying that although the baskets themselves only cost the town \$1,000, it is the continuous watering and upkeep costs that precipitated the decision. Councillor Stewart Meikleham suggested looking more closely at the actual costs of keeping the flower baskets, saying they are a fundamental part of the town's beautification and he would not like to see them eliminated. Various flower beds and boxes will be kept, however, the hanging baskets will not.

Several other items were approved, including increasing the town's liability insurance at the complex from \$2 million to \$5 million, hosting Household Hazardous Waste Day on May 2 along with the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers,

moving forward with the tendering process for the external service review. Several councillors had attended a presentation by KPMG which they found informative and helpful in understanding the process of going through a review. All departments except the Police Services Board will be looked at, with the deadline for tenders being February 20. A final report and presentation is anticipated for June. As for the Police Services Board, the impending OPP service proposal, not expected until fall, will cover that department. In their closing remarks, both Bill Foster and Bob Yocom reiterated that the proposal must encompass the same, or increased, level of service as Espanola Police Service currently provides. "I've had many residents express concern on this issue, and I want to make it clear that we will not cut police service for the town," said Foster.

Budget deliberations are beginning this week and Stewart Meikleham cited the need for "creating a strong financial buffer for the community." The first departments to present will be Recreation, Cultural Activities, and Economic Development on February 3.

Correction: In the January 20, 2015 issue, we wrote that the community of Meaford, Ontario "have recently decided to switch to OPP." Meaford was already under contract with the OPP and the costs we quoted for the municipality reflect changes since the OPP introduced its new costing model.

By Chloe Kneer - The three teams remaining in the CIHL, including the Espanola Rivermen, the Batchewana Attack, and the Kalkaska Rhinos, are all committed to finishing out the current hockey season.

Rivermen owner Tim Clayden has taken his share of lumps since exiting the NOJHL to start the fledging CIHL league. Despite this, Clayden remains upbeat, saying, "We remain committed to providing strong development and promotion for each of our student athlete players. There is no question that many players involved this season have had an opportunity to develop and grow as both a player and a person, where many will play at a higher level of play next season because of their development here in CIHL hockey this past season."

Addressing the problems that he's faced the last year, Clayden says, "It's not any one individual's fault. The guy in the mirror made the mistake of allowing too many inexperienced operators join in our vision and league operations this past season. Junior hockey is a great game, but it is big business now too, and it takes special people and a lot of them, willing to give up so much of their time each and every season to ensure the success of their community junior hockey programs year after year. It's not easy and it takes money and a ton of dedication and time to continue season after season. I made many

mistakes this past season and the easiest thing to do is quit. Quitting on our teams, our community, our players and their parents won't happen as we have too many good people involved that share the same vision and passion for this great game and our CIHL Hockey vision moving forward."

The Rivermen have released the remainder of their schedule, with home games Friday, February 13 during Espanola Winter Carnival weekend; Friday, February 20; and Friday, February 27. The roundrobin play-offs begin March 6, and the team is participating in two showcases, the first being this weekend in Michigan, and the second the first week of April.

Looking ahead to next year, Clayden says, "We plan to have six teams along the Highway 17 corridor leading into the state of Michigan, along with another four USA-based communities that wish to join CIHL hockey for the upcoming season. We believe playing in Michigan, including inter-locking games and college showcase tournaments will create better college exposure for our student athlete players. teams will be able to have games within same day/same night travel. This will ease the travel costs for all teams involved."

Next year, the Sudbury junior A team will be under a new ownership group, and the Rivermen have three years remaining on their contract with the Town of Espanola.

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Recipe

Years ago I became semifamous for my monkey buns. I'm talking about cinnamon bun pull-apart bread, so don't be thinking anything silly. They are made with Pillsbury biscuits and I have put the



recipe in my column many times now. They are still delicious and very easy to make BUT I have a "better" version that I make now and made twice over the Christmas holidays this year. I didn't want to wait until next Christmas to share the recipe. I assemble them at night before bed because they need time to thaw completely and rise and then you just pop them in the oven in the morning. The recipe calls for 2 loaves of frozen bread dough but you actually only need about 1 ¾ loaves, BUT I still use 2. You will wake up in the morning to find some buns have escaped the pan as they have risen. I tried baking these escapees separately on a pan but they turned out hard and not very edible so now I just discard them. I bought a bag of 4 frozen loaves at our local grocery store and was able to make this recipe twice. These are perfect for a brunch, to serve overnight guests or just to enjoy for breakfast.

New and Improved Monkey Buns

- 2 loaves of frozen bread dough (take out of freezer a couple hours ahead so that you are able to cut them into pieces)
- ½ cup chopped pecans
- ½ cup granulated sugar
- 2 heaping tablespoons of cinnamon
- ½ cup melted butter
- 1 cup brown sugar

Butter a bundt pan. Sprinkle pecans on the bottom of the pan. Combine the granulated sugar and cinnamon on a plate. Cut loaves into 24 small pieces. I cut each loaf into 12 sections and then cut each section in half. Roll each piece into the cinnamon sugar mixture and drop into bundt pan. Sprinkle whatever sugar/cinnamon mixture you have left over the buns. Melt butter in a pot and add the brown sugar. Mix well. Pour over the buns. Cover pan with parchment paper. I have found that parchment paper is the best thing to use because the buns don't stick to it as they rise. Let rise overnight. If you find it has risen way over the top of the pan in the morning, remove a bit of the excess. Bake at 350 degrees for 35-50 minutes depending on your oven. Check at 35 minutes. You don't want to overcook them. Remove from oven and immediately flip pan over onto a plate. You won't be disappointed. Enjoy!

NOTICE OF THE PASSING OF ZONING BYLAW

(Planning Act-Section 34(18))

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers passed Bylaw 2015-06 on the 28th day of January, 2015.

The land to which the bylaw applies is described as Harrow Township, Part Lot 10, Concession 3, Plan 53R-19756 Parts 1-9, 100 Buckmiller Road. The purpose for the amendment is to allow for a reduced lot area for the lot being created on Part 2 of Plan 53R-19756 of the above described property. This application is subject of a consent application under the Planning Act.

The last date for filing a notice of appeal is **February 23, 2015.** A Notice of Appeal must be filed with the Clerk of the Corporation of the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers, setting out the reasons for the appeal. This must also be accompanied by the fee required by the Ontario Municipal Board.

Only individuals, corporations and public bodies may appeal a zoning bylaw to the Ontario Municipal Board. A Notice of Appeal may not be filed by an unincorporated association or group. However, a Notice of Appeal may be filed in the name of an individual who is a member of the association or the group on its behalf.

No persons or public body shall be added as a party to the hearing of the appeal unless, before the bylaw was passed, the person or public body made oral submissions at a public meeting or written submissions to the Council or, in the opinion of the Ontario Municipal Board, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.
