The Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) is reminding off-road vehicle (ORV) operators to check with your municipality to ensure local by-laws have been amended to allow 2-up all-terrain vehicles (ATVs), Side-by-Side ORVs and Utility Terrain Vehicles (UTVs) on-road access in your respective areas.

As of July 1, 2015, the Province of Ontario implemented updates to The Highway Traffic Act Ontario Regulation 316/03 that extends on-road access for more types of off-road vehicles on Provincial Highways. It is however, up to each individual municipality to enact by-laws for the local roadways to coincide with the Provincial amendments.

"It is the operator's responsibility to consult the Highway Traffic Act and to contact the municipality to confirm certain off-road vehicles are permitted on area roadways," says North East

a number one concern for the OPP. "We often stop operators who are not wearing an approved and properly fastened helmet, or who are not 16 years of age," states Inspector Andrews. "When you don't wear a helmet, you are at a much higher risk of serious injury or death in the event of an ORV incident. Knowing the laws and operating your ORV in a safe manner are the first steps to making your ORV experience a positive one."

OPP officers will continue their enforcement and education efforts on local roadways and trails in an effort to save lives. For more information about what has changed, please visit: www.ontario.ca/atv.

Espanola Town Council Report

- Espanola Council was presented with an update of the Service Delivery and Operational Review in a special meeting on July 7. KPMG's Chas Anselmo identified areas of cost saving including the sharing of services as Espanola is a hub for the immediate area. Areas that could be shared include the fire chief, building control services, land use planning, administrative support, information technology and public works equipment. Anselmo said the "greatest barrier" is in information technology. The town has new software but it is not integrated and staff lacked training. "There are aspects of operations you don't know what the operating costs are," said Anselmo, citing the recreation complex as an example. He added that policy development is needed with regards to communications, budget, debt, capital financing and investment. "Your level of winter controls maintenance exceeds provincial minimum standards," said Anselmo but added that every community does to prevent litigation issues.

He said moving from salt to sand on the roads could save \$25,000 a year. Anselmo told council that they have the ability to draw up policies with regards to level of winter maintenance.

Other ways to save include removing fluoridation from the water and decreasing the number of playgrounds. He said the maintenance of sports fields exceeds normal levels.

He suggested implementing non-resident user fees at the complex and increasing the cost of ice rental fees from March to August. Crossing guards cost the municipality \$46,250 a year and are a discretionary service, he said. Anselmo said the municipality spends \$100,000 more for

landfill operations as opposed to other communities.

Anselmo will be meeting with council again, as public meetings were held the following night for residents. "Based on those conversations, there will be additional analysis and ability to refine." Council went in camera to discuss further findings. The final report will be presented on August 11.

In a second presentation, Don Hoekstra, Director for Project Development with the Ontario Clean Water Agency, provided council with the opportunity to take part in a trial with new SLG biosolids pretreatment technology.

"Our goal as operations partner is to explore possibilities to give you access to best available technology and give you options that will allow you to make a capital investment that gives you a return in five years or less," said Hoekstra, adding that this technology was not available when council was presented with the cost-prohibitive GEO tubes option.

Currently the biosolids being shipped to Sudbury for disposal is only 2.5 percent solid but Hoekstra said the preconditioning technology would turn the biosolids into 5.5 to 6 percent solid.

He said Orege, a France-based company is very interested in conducting a trial and would provide equipment at a no cost or low cost basis. "To go from 2 to 5 percent going through this one process, the dewatering process will be more cost effective and more quickly," said Hoekstra. If the solids continue to be hauled to Sudbury for disposal, the number of loads per year will be cut in half. The mobile unit could be installed in one day and be on site by the end of summer. He did not have an estimated cost of the unit for budget purposes but only that it cost the company \$250,000 for a trial basis. Council gave unanimous direction to OCWA to proceed with trial.

- ❖ 1/2 cup powdered sugar (for rolling)

Preheat oven to 350°. In a medium bowl, beat the egg. Add the Cool Whip and mix well. Mix in the cake mix. Dough will be thick and sticky. Drop by teaspoonfuls into a bowl of powdered sugar and roll to coat. Place on a cookie sheet lined with parchment paper or a silicon baking sheet. Bake for 10- 12 minutes or until slightly set and tops are cracked. Cool on pan for 5 minutes then transfer to wire racks to cool.

- Dough is a little easier to handle if you refrigerate about an hour before dropping in powdered sugar, but it's not required.
- You don't want to make these cookies too big, the key is to keep them small.
- Since the dough is sticky, try using a small cookie scoop to drop cookie dough into powdered sugar, for easier handling. This also keeps your cookies small and consistent.
