Winter will be here soon enough and Espanola's Boogie Mountain will be ready to go when the snow begins to fly. Boogie Mountain is a volunteer-based club that works hard to make skiing and snowboarding a fun and viable winter activity for families of all abilities.

Did you know that Boogie Mountain offers two nights of skiing every Tuesday and Thursday from 6:30 - 9:30 p.m. as well as daily weekend skiing from 10:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m., weather permitting? Well worth the drive from Elliot Lake, Sudbury and Manitoulin Island, and ski memberships are the most economical way for you and your family to enjoy the hill.

Boogie Mountain has two different ski areas and two types of ski lifts. The small hill is rated as an easy run but also has a terrain park and has a J-bar rope tow. The big hill has over ten runs for various abilities from easiest to difficult and has a T-bar tow. The chalet offers a dining area and canteen upstairs and a rental shop, lockers and washrooms downstairs. All the snow is natural and groomed by a Bombardier Snow Cat which

Crazy-Ass Jack, The Kennedy Horse

I always hope it rains on November 22. I look forward to a lousy, gray day that keeps me indoors and makes me think about what might have been. The sun should not shine on the day President John F. Kennedy was shot, the day the kids of the 60's lost their innocence, the day that our carefree, wide-eyed behaviour was halted with a caution sign.

For the naive teenagers of the 60's, Kennedy really was Camelot - the perfect leader in an idyllic time when beauty and peace flourished and a poem had more power than a gun. Then the bullets and the chaotic carnage on a street in Dallas, Texas changed all that. The world would never be the same, would never be as safe or simple as it was before November 22, 1963.

As well as I remember where I was that day, I can easily recall the godawful scenes replayed on a black and white TV screen, a book depository, a theatre, Walter Cronkite crying. I clearly remember the funeral procession three days later during which the carparisoned horse decided he would play the role of jester to the slain King of

Last year I watched the coverage of the fiftieth anniversary of the assassination and I spotted him again. With a large head and dark coat, the well-built riderless horse in JFK's procession was named Black Jack. Black Jack had become a funeral horse almost by mistake. "He was not suitable for riding, he wouldn't pull anything, he threw all his riders and he refused to go on parade." That from the man who recruited him into the U.S. army. (Not exactly a ringing endorsement of young American

men who have also joined the military.) Sixteen years old at the time of JFK's funeral, Black Jack was not qualified for anything except strutting proudly down the street as the caparisoned horse in military funeral processions. And he was a beautiful beast.

Despite his ornery attitude, Black Jack was much admired for his spirit and great physique when he joined the army at Fort Myer, Virginia, on November 22, 1952, to be all that he could be. He served in the Third U.S. Infantry Regiment, known as the Old Guard, performing the duties of the riderless horse in more than one thousand Armed Forces full-honors funerals.

America's grief on that cold and somber Monday in late November 1963 was mirrored in the sight of Black Jack clomping down the eerily quiet streets of Washington, D.C. The silence, wet and woeful was shattered by the echo of his thudding hooves. All along the parade route, mourners wept amid the muffled rumble of military drums. Carrying a saber and an ebony English riding saddle with black boots reversed in the stirrups. Black Jack was led by nineteen-year-old Pfc. Arthur Carlson, who must have done horrible things in this previous life to draw this particular assignment. The riderless walk began with the horse stomping on Carlson's foot and ripping his boot off.

"I thought he broke a couple toes on my right foot, but he didn't," said Carlson later. On what was supposed to be a stately walk along Pennsylvania Avenue from the Capitol to the White House and on to St. Matthew's Cathedral, Black Jack kept



throwing his head back and dancing around his handler. He pounded the pavement loudly when he was supposed to be standing still, frequently fidgeting whenever procession slowed or stopped. At one point the video shows him high-stepping down the street with his head and tail bobbing like he's auditioning for the Royal Canadian Mounted Police's Musical Ride or opening the Iowa State Fair. By protocol, poor Carlson was forbidden to scold his steed or even speak to him as Black Jack dragged him sideways and then forward, finally pushing away the man's hand with his nose. At the White House, instead of standing at attention, he kept resisting his handler, as if he had a more important assignment somewhere else. Maybe a date in the breeding barn.

After witnessing him taking Carlson for a wild walk from a position directly behind the horse-drawn caisson carrying the coffin of the slain president, a writer from the New York Times kindly described him as "spirited and difficult to handle."

Normally serene and dignified, caparisoned horse is

supposed to be the sacred symbol of a fallen soldier who is never to ride again. At no time, however, did Black Jack bring the expected pomp and circumstance to the event being watched by a TV audience of 175 million. Given his behaviour on that day, the horse's head could have easily been adorned with a lampshade.

I have had strange and unexplained things happen whenever a loved one, be it a person or pet has passed away so whenever I watch footage of the irrepressible Black Jack livening up a state funeral, I can't help but wonder if President Kennedy, a man of mischief and adventure was himself encouraging 'Crazyass Jack' to make the most of the moment.

Surprisingly, the Kennedys were not at all upset, believing that Black Jack had personified the spirit and individualism of the other Jack. Their beloved Jack.

Espanola Town Council Report

will be no increase in pay for Espanola Town Council in the coming year, as it was voted down 5-1 at the November 10 regular meeting. In a recorded vote, only Councillor Stewart Meikleham voted in favour of the 1.5% pay increase with Councillors Dufour, Ron Duplessis, Ken Duplessis, Bob Yocom and Mayor Ron Piche saying no to the raise. Councillor Bill Foster was absent from the meeting.

The other topic of lengthy discussion was the adoption of a Code of Conduct for the council. Currently, Espanola has no Code of Conduct in place like many other municipalities. Councillors Dufour and Ron Duplessis were opposed to the measure altogether, while Councillor Ken Duplessis took issue with wording about punishment, specifically a phrase reading that council could issue a "reprimand or a suspension of up to 90 days" for any councillor who is deemed to

By Chloe Kneer - There have contravened the Code. It was suggested that the wording was taken directly from the Municipal Act, but that couldn't be clarified immediately. Ultimately, the vote on the matter was split, so it will have to be reintroduced if it is to be passed.

> Two letters were drafted and sent from Espanola Town Council recently. One was addressed to former Espanola Hospital CEO Ray Hunt, who left earlier this month to take a position with the Northern Ontario School of Medicine. Council thanked Hunt for his many years of service and dedication in improvements to the hospital complex. The other went to the Manitoulin-Sudbury District Services Board expressing dissatisfaction and deep concern over the MSDSB's recent decision to raise rent rates on public housing. The increase would see the rent for a one bedroom apartment increase to \$940. Council wanted to show solidarity in opposition to the decision.



Recipe

I made this square last weekend and I couldn't stop eating it. I love pecan pie and I love shortbread, and this square is a combination of both of these things. Don't overbake these; they are supposed to come out soft and chewy with a melt in your mouth crust. I can't wait to make these again to add to my Christmas cookie trays. Who am I kidding? I just want more.

Pecan Pie Bars

For crust:

- 1 cup unsalted butter, softened
- 2/3 cup packed brown sugar
- 2 2/3 cups all-purpose flour
- ½ teaspoon salt

For topping:

- ½ cup unsalted butter
- 1 cup packed light brown sugar
- 1/3 cup honey
- 2 tablespoons heavy cream (I used half and half without a problem)
- 2 cups chopped pecans

Preheat the oven to 350°F and line a 9x13-inch pan with foil, leaving enough for a 2-inch overhang on all sides. Spray with nonstick spray to be safe. First make the crust by creaming together the butter and brown sugar until fluffy in a stand mixer fitted with the paddle attachment or using a hand mixer. Add in the flour and salt and mix on low, until crumbly. Press the crust into the foillined pan and bake for 20 minutes until golden brown. While the crust bakes, prepare the filling by combining the butter, brown sugar, honey and heavy cream in a saucepan and stirring it over medium heat. Simmer the mixture for 1 minute, and then stir in the chopped pecans. (Don't simmer over 1 minute or caramel will get hard). Remove the crust from the oven and immediately pour the pecan filling over the hot crust spreading it to cover the entire surface. Return the pan to the oven and bake an additional 15-20 minutes (until the caramel looks set). Remove the pan and allow the bars to fully cool in the pan. Use the foil overhang to lift out the bars and transfer them to a cutting board. Peel off the foil, slice into bars and serve.
