# Families Wanted: Habitat For Humanity Ready To Break Ground


By Chloe Kneer - Free houses, low income housing, hand out....All of these are misnomers as it pertains to Habitat for Humanity. What is true about the organization and the houses that they build is that the option of owning a home is more attainable for families. Let's break it down. Going to the bank for a mortgage can be daunting. Most charter banks want 5% or more as a down payment. On a \$100,000 home, that amount is \$5,000. there are closing costs and land transfer taxes, which tack on another \$1,500 -\$2,000. Don't forget the home inspection (\$400) and title insurance (\$250-\$350). And with only 5% down, there will be mortgage insurance to pay. All told, a new homeowner will be out-of-pocket nearly \$10,000 by the time their dream to own a

home comes to fruition.

The fact is that most families live paycheque-to-paycheque, especially when they are renting. Just paying the rent, utilities, food and other expenses eats up the entire wage. This makes it impossible to afford the up-front costs of purchasing a home. That's where Habitat for Humanity comes in.

In order to buy a Habitat for Humanity home (yes, buy – homes are not given away), you must be working. You must not be in a bankruptcy. You must be able to afford a mortgage and the related expenses of owning a home, including property taxes, utilities, insurance and maintenance / upkeep. The way that Habitat for Humanity makes home ownership affordable is that they are the bank. Habitat for Humanity holds the mortgage, so they set the terms. In other words, they don't require a down payment. Their amortizations (how long you have to pay off the mortgage) are flexible. Your mortgage payment with Habitat for Humanity won't exceed 25% of your income.

There are many perks to dealing with Habitat for Humanity as your mortgagee. Yet, if you are chosen to be a purchaser, you also have responsibilities. For example, if your income increases, so does your mortgage payment (a home owner's situation is assessed yearly). You are required to invest at least 500 hours of "sweat equity" into the building of your home, whether it be on site, fundraising or otherwise. You are required to learn about home ownership and the steps you need to take to maintain your investment, including routine things such as changing a furnace filter or yard upkeep.

So, if you think you won't qualify for a Habitat for Humanity home because you have a decentpaying job and someone else might need a hand up more than you, well, you should consider applying! If you have an unsafe or unhealthy environment, can meet your financial obligations, but cannot manage to save enough to improve your situation, you should consider applying! If your children or you have special needs and would benefit from a custombuilt home with accommodations, you should consider applying!

#### Himilayan Bike Packing Trek Reveals Nepal **In Crisis As Winter Nears**

By Trudy Murphy - The earthquakes were the worst Nepal had seen since 1934, and they took place only a week after Miranda Murphy from Whitefish Falls and three friends had booked their flights, ready to embark on a twenty day, 477 km mountain biking trek through the Himalayan peaks. While there were concerns about the country's ability to recover from the quakes in time for the tourist season, the group continued planning and arrived in the country in late September of this year. Accompanied by an incredible local guide, Om, the group spent three weeks pedalling their bikes for about eight hours a day carrying all of the clothes, sleeping bags, and repair kits needed for three weeks in the mountains. Similar to hiking, mountain bike packing involves loading up a trail centred bicycle with the gear needed for a multi-day trip.

The group biked from one remote village to another through the rugged, mountainous terrain. Even though the portion of the country they were travelling was less affected by the earthquakes, there was still visible evidence of damage to many of the buildings in the villages. The people, incredibly were however, resilient and their ties to their culture and religion remained solid in spite of the physical impact to their communities. As the monsoon season hit, however, reconstruction and international aid funding disbursements were both halted.

A border blockade was imposed days before Miranda's group landed in Nepal. They witnessed the issues it caused and began to feel the effects of the fuel and food shortage. Upon returning home, the group realized they had an opportunity to help raise awareness and support for Nepal. Members of the group had taken photographs and put together a slide show of their trip. You are invited to come out and support the Nepal Fundraiser Slideshow at the Red Dog Grill in Whitefish Falls on Sunday, December 6 at 1:30 p.m. Admission is by donation.

All proceeds will be sent directly to their guide who is an active organizer of efforts to rebuild areas of Nepal most affected by the earthquake.

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## Mother May I Cookbooks

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#### Recipe

This recipe has been floating around on the internet for a while and I've wanted to try it, but hadn't got around to making it. My friend made it this week and gave me a sample to try. Oh my goodness, it is to die for! It's very simple to make, has creamy layers and a chocolate ganache type topping. What's there not to love? You have to plan ahead because it needs to be refrigerated overnight. You can't go wrong with this dessert. Everyone will love it.

#### No-Bake Chocolate Eclair Dessert

#### Filling:

- ❖ 2 (3.5 oz.) boxes vanilla instant pudding
- ❖ 3 c milk
- ❖ 1 (8 oz.) container Cool Whip (3 cups)
- Graham crackers

#### **Topping:**

- ❖ 1/3 c. unsweetened cocoa powder
- ❖ 1 c. sugar
- **❖** 1/4 c. milk
- ❖ ½ cup butter (or margarine)
- ❖ 1 tsp. vanilla

#### For the filling:

- 1. Combine pudding mix and milk; beat. Stir in Cool Whip.
- 2. Place a layer of graham crackers in the bottom of a 9x13" dish. Spread 1/2 of the pudding mixture over the graham crackers. Repeat with another layer of graham crackers and pudding; then top with a final layer of graham crackers.

#### For the topping:

- 3. Bring cocoa, milk, and sugar to a full rolling boil; boil about 1 minute, stirring very frequently.
  - Remove from heat and cool one minute. Add butter and vanilla; stir until butter is melted.
- 4. Pour chocolate topping over the top layer of graham crackers.
- 5. Refrigerate overnight.

## No free houses? The truth about



**Ontario Gateway North** 

"How do I win the lottery and get one of those homes?" Qualifying for a Habitat for Humanity Ontario Gateway North home has nothing to do with "winning the lottery" and everything to do with our vision: a world where everyone has a safe and decent place to live. Habitat for Humanity Ontario Gateway North uses a multi-faceted process, much like conventional homeownership, to partner with families.

#### MYTH: Habitat for Humanity gives houses away to lucky people.

**TRUTH:** Habitat for Humanity is not a give-away program — there are no free houses. We provide a hand up, not a hand out! In addition to mortgage payments, each homeowner contributes 500 hours of unpaid labour into the building of their home as a down payment. (At today's rate of \$11.25 per hour minimum wage, this equates to \$5,500.) This is called 'Sweat Equity', which increases pride of ownership. Habitat houses are sold at fair market value to families, not given to them free of charge. All mortgage revenue is placed in a Fund for Humanity, which is used to support building of more homes. By building homes at low cost, and through interest-free mortgages, Habitat for Humanity provides families, who would not otherwise qualify for a mortgage, the opportunity to buy a home.

#### MYTH: If there's no free house, how is Habitat helping people in need?

**TRUTH:** A 2013 CMHC survey of over 350 Habitat families showed tangible benefits such as an improvement in their financial situation, improved health, improvement in children's development and wellbeing and improved overall family life. The CMHC survey also reported many examples of children within Habitat families becoming healthier, completing a post-secondary education and establishing successful careers. As the poverty cycle is broken, and a family's financial situation improves, their dependence on local social services is decreased. In addition, pride of ownership leads to a renewed sense of confidence, and along with their stable, long-term housing arrangement, they become long-term contributors to the community and the local economy.

#### MYTH: Habitat for Humanity Ontario Gateway North is JUST a Builder.

**TRUTH:** Habitat for Humanity is a Builder, Banker and Retailer. Through volunteer labour, efficient management and donations of money and materials, Habitat homes are built and sold to partner families at no profit. As a banker, no interest mortgages are held by Habitat and geared to the families' income. Habitat for Humanity Ontario Gateway

North also operates five retail outlets called ReStores. These ReStores in Bracebridge, Huntsville, Orillia, Midland and Sudbury sell new and gently used goods to the general public. The net revenue from these very successful social enterprises cover the organization's operating costs so 100% of every dollar donated goes to the Habitat build program.

#### MYTH: Habitat homes hurt communities because they take property off the tax rolls.

**TRUTH:** Habitat for Humanity is a non-profit builder, but it sells the houses to homeowners, who then become ratepayers. Since the homes were vacant lots before the Habitat project took place, the result is an increase in the local tax base which benefits all communities where Habitat homes are built. Habitat build projects also offer an opportunity for community members, of all walks of life, to come together and work side by side in a meaningful way.

#### MYTH: The outside of that house is messy. They don't deserve it!

**TRUTH:** Habitat homeowners are required to complete courses on the many aspects of homeownership, such as being a good neighbour. Once a Habitat home is sold, Habitat for Humanity becomes the banker, not a municipal by-law officer. As is the case with a conventional mortgage, it is up to the homeowner to perform required maintenance and repairs to the property. Becoming a homeowner involves learning new skills managing priorities.

#### MYTH: Habitat families should give their home back if they make too much money and become successful.

**TRUTH:** Homes are sold to partner families, who are then registered on title, just like anyone who purchases a home using traditional financing through banks or institutions. Habitat for Humanity works to break the cycle of poverty. This is not an issue which can be remedied with band-aids. As partner families go on to be successful, they don't give the houses back. Being successful is a sign the sustainable model for homeownership is working, and owning a home is part of that process. It is not in our mandate to take back a home, unless there is a mortgage default. Habitat for Humanity Ontario Gateway North wants partner families to succeed!
