

Stop Trump! Stop The Wall! Stop Watching TV!

Man, the things you learn while watching TV! One Sunday, while watching ABC's special, extended coverage of the Pope's Visit To America which was interrupted by ads for Viagra, I learned something about 'product placement' and how that wasn't a very good one.

From CNN comes the mind-boggling statistic that according to their most recent Cable News Network/Opinion Research Corporation poll, 29 percent of Americans believe that President Obama is a Muslim. Yeah, one third of all Americans polled believe that Barack Obama hauls out a prayer rug five times a day and faces east toward Mecca which will come as a shock to Vice President Joe Biden who has always believed his boss was praying for the Cubs to win a World Series.

From that same poll comes the much higher statistic that 43 percent of Republicans believe President Obama is a Muslim which is perfectly understandable since 89 percent of them still believe Ronald Reagan is God.

who want to see a giant wall where once the longest, undefended border in the world stood!

Students in Jayson Stewart's Civics class were responsible for acting as clerks and election officials in the "federal election" that was held at Espanola High School last week. The school has hosted the mock election for many years, with all supplies, including ballots, privacy screens and ballot box provided by Elections Canada. It is as close to the real thing as it gets.

Students were encouraged to come by the polling place outside of room G10 in the high school over three consecutive days

during fourth period. There, their names were looked up on a master list of the high school (all grades were encouraged to vote) and they were given a ballot containing the names of the candidates in the Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing riding. Students were taught to fill out the ballot, fold it and place it into the ballot box. For their efforts, they got an "I Voted" pin to take with them. High schools across the nation take place in the initiative, but results were guarded closely until after the real election results were announced.

Espanola Town Council Report

By Chloe Kneer – Council revisited their prior decision not to allow a zoning change for the vacant lot at Oscar and Adelaide Streets in order for Habitat for Humanity to build a duplex instead of a single family residence in Espanola. The motion to reverse their decision was carried, thereby paving the way for Habitat for Humanity to break ground once the plans are approved and building permits issued. The new zoning will allow Habitat to help house two families in the area, a move that they say will be beneficial to the community which has limited access to affordable housing for lower income families. The idea of a duplex is also a strategic one in order to keep property taxes lower on the homes.

Also brought forward was discussion for the proposed Autism Acceptance Tree Park. Dennis Lendum submitted drawings and a conceptual plan for the park, which has changed since he last presented to council. It is because of these changes that council is being given updated information.

Estimates price the park at around \$500,000, plus yearly maintenance and upkeep costs. Several councillors took issue with the price tag, saying that taxpayers would likely support some of the funding, but not all. Lendum has promised to fundraise and seek grants to assist with the construction of the park. It was suggested by Councillor Ron Duplessis that perhaps having one centralized park rather than several scattered about town could be explored. Out of the discussion, the issue of a recreation master plan also arose. The master plan was recommended in the service delivery review. Councillor Meikleham expressed that he would like to see the tree park being pursued in parallel with a master plan, rather than bogged down in bureaucracy waiting for the plan to be finalized. Lendum will be invited back to council to make another presentation. After that, a public information session will be held to inform residents of the plan and open the idea to comments and suggestions.

after eight years. Hunt's successor will be Nicole Haley, who previously filled the role of Chief Nursing Officer/Director of Clinical Services at ERHHC. When it opened in 1988, the Espanola hospital emergency department served 7,000 patients per year. By 2010, that number had climbed to 15,000. In anticipation of continuing to service the greater use they saw year after year, Hunt and his team began applying to the ministries in 2008 for expansion. “We thought we had a good proposal, but there were many other towns who were in great need also,” said Hunt. After three attempts and a very compelling argument, the expansion was finally approved, and the five step process leading up to construction was implemented.

In 2013, ground was broken for the new emergency department. After completion of a new emergency entrance and the addition of several triage and treatment rooms,

the hospital started the daunting task of renovating the reception, lab and ultrasound/x-ray areas. Hunt says it was akin to “repairing the engine of a bus as it’s going down the highway.” The goal was to minimize patient disruption while adding 2,200 square feet of new space and renovating 6,800 square feet of existing space.

Speakers including Espanola Deputy Mayor Bill Foster, Sudbury MPP Glenn Thibeault, and Cynthia Stables from the Northeast LHIN, touted the importance of the campus as being a hub for families and a provincial example in integrated health care in that the facility offers many different aspects of care all in one location.

CEO Ray Hunt has accepted the position of CAO for the Northern Ontario School of Medicine and will be working at the Laurentian campus in Sudbury beginning November 2. We thank Mr. Hunt for his service in Espanola and wish his family the best in his new endeavour.

Recipe

The season has changed and it's now time for comfort food. Nothing is more comforting on cold days than a hot bowl of soup. This is a nice change from the traditional chicken soup; it's creamy, and the wild rice adds a nice, chewy texture plus nutty flavour. The rice takes a while to cook so it should be precooked for 45 minutes until the grains split open, and then added to the soup. Serve with crusty bread for the perfect comfort meal.

Chicken Wild Rice Soup

- ❖ 1 cup (170g) wild rice
- ❖ ¼ cup (60ml) vegetable oil
- ❖ 1 onion, chopped
- ❖ 2 medium sized carrots, peeled and chopped
- ❖ 2 large stalks celery, chopped
- ❖ 1 tsp dried thyme
- ❖ ¾ cup (115g) allpurpose flour
- ❖ 8 cups (1.9 liters) chicken broth
- ❖ Salt and pepper
- ❖ 2 cups (300g) cooked chicken, cubed
- ❖ 8 oz (225g) mushrooms, stems removed and sliced
- ❖ 1 cup (240 ml) halfandhalf
- ❖ ½ cup (25g) chopped parsley

Cook wild rice in 4 cups (960ml) of water for 45 minutes or until it fluffs up. Drain any remaining liquid left in the pot. Set aside. In a large pot, add vegetable oil. Sauté onions, carrots, and celery until they soften, about 3 minutes. Add dried thyme and all-purpose flour. Cook and stir for another 2 to 3 minutes. Pour in chicken stock. Bring to a boil. Add cooked wild rice and pour in halfandhalf. Bring soup back up to a boil and allow it to heat through, about 5 minutes. Turn off heat. Stir in chopped parsley.



Volunteers Help Make Clear Lake Project Happen

The Clear Lake Stewardship Association (CLSA) is pleased to announce the completion of the rerouting of the creek at the east end of the lake. The project stems from a catastrophic flood in 2011 which caused the creek to cut a new course eating away at the public beach. Action had to be taken to stop the erosion and unhealthy runoff into the lake. The CLSA spearheaded the project with the guidance of the Ministry of Natural Resources and the Town of Espanola to reroute the stream back to its original course for the benefit of the entire community.

According to Liz Cairns-Bois, the Secretary and Chair of the CLSA, "it was a daunting task that required design work, permit application, excavations, loads of gravel and finally limestone to line the new creek bed." Cairns-Bois said the key to the success of the project was the cooperation of the town, "None of this would have been possible without the total and unfailing support of the Town of Espanola, specifically the Public Works Department", said Liz Cairns-Bois.

The association sought out and received a tremendous amount of support in the community for the project. The Lions Club of Espanola

got the ball rolling by pledging money. Belanger Construction dug the trench and graveled the new streambed.

The final piece of the puzzle was getting limestone to line the new streambed. According to Cairns-Bois the community really pulled together to make it happen. Don Eadie Construction donated the stone, all 16 pallets of it. Anne Benness at Fisher Wavy coordinated the transportation of the stone. Home Hardware sent out their forklift to off load the pallets and place them "nice and close to our work-site."

On October 3, volunteers from the CLSA and the Lions Club along with some equipment to speed up the process, showed up to lay the stone. A special thanks goes to Merle Canjar for donating and bringing coffee and for fetching the super good pizza lunch that was donated by Dynamic Family Restaurant

Cairns-Bois summed up her feelings on the completion of the project by saying, "The story is really about how the community and the town came together for the benefit of everyone."
