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FIRE PREVENTION WEEK October 4-10, 2015





History of Fire Prevention Week

Fire Prevention Week was established to commemorate the devastating Chicago fire on October 9, 1871 in which more than 250 people died, 100,000

were left homeless, destroyed more than 17,400 structures and burned more than 2,000 acres. The fire changed the way that firefighters and public officials in North America think about fire prevention and fire safety. The Fire Marshals Association of North America (today known as the International Fire Marshals Association), decided that the anniversary of the Chicago fire should be observed in a way to educate the public about the importance of fire prevention.

Fire Prevention Week was proclaimed in Canada in 1919 to commemorate the Chicago blaze, as well as a major fire that destroyed the Centre Block of the Parliament buildings in Ottawa on February 3, 1916.

•Smoking while in bed, tired or under the influence of alcohol or medication is the most common cause of fires that kill.

•Most chimney fires occur with wood-burning fireplaces. Ensure chimneys are cleaned and professionally inspected regularly. Burn only small quantities of wood at a time.

• Keep a pan lid or cookie sheet handy in case grease or oil catches fire. The lid or cookie sheet should be slid over the top of the pan to smother the fire.

•Place candles in sturdy, burnresistant containers that won't tip over and are big enough to collect dripping wax.

•Don't use candles in high traffic areas where children or pets could knock them over.

•Never remove the third prong on a three-prong plug or bend it back to use a two-prong outlet. The third prong is a necessary ground for the appliance or heater.

•When bathing children, always turn cold water on first before the hot. Test the water temperature before allowing your child to get into the bathtub or shower.

Fire Safety Tips & Facts

Consider adjusting your hot water heater to a maximum temperature of 49 C or 120 F.

•Turn pot handles towards the centre of the stove.

•Battery-operated smoke alarms will warn you when batteries need replacing. Despite this, make it a habit to change the batteries yearly.

•Install at least one smoke alarm outside each sleeping area. For improved safety, install a smoke alarm in every bedroom.

•Have a thorough yearly maintenance check of the furnace carried out by a professional. •Lack of maintenance is the

number one cause of dryer fires.



Maintain your smoke alarms

That is why it is critical to clean the lint filter before and after each use, and wipe away any lint that has accumulated around the drum. Perform periodic checks to ensure that the air exhaust vent pipe is unobstructed (lint accumulation) and the outdoor vent flap opens readily.

•Extension cords must never be run inside walls or under rugs or furniture. They can be damaged by traffic or heavy furniture and start arcing, which can lead to a fire.

•It is important to install a carbon monoxide detector in your home. However, carbon monoxide



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detectors do not replace the need for prevention through yearly maintenance and inspection of heating systems and appliances. •Do not overload electrical outlets or use extension cords in the place of additional outlets. •Use a screen in front of the

fireplace opening to protect children and to prevent embers from escaping and igniting carpets, etc.

•Educate your children about the dangers of fire and make sure they know that all fires, even small ones, can spread very quickly.



•In case of fire, get out and stay out! Use a neighbour's phone to call the emergency response number in your area.

•Be wary of buying novelty candles. Avoid candles flammable surrounded by paint, paper, dried flowers, or breakable/meltable containers.

•Equipment that uses natural gas should show a clear blue flame—a yellow or orange flame may indicate a problem. If a problem appears, call a qualified technician.

•Ensure a source of fresh air is available, for an example an open window or flue, when operating a wood-burning fireplace.

Fire Escape Plan

Statistics reveal that 78 percent of deaths from fire occur in the home, with most of the fatalities taking place between 2 am and 4 am, while occupants are asleep. That is why it is critical to develop an escape plan, because one needs to react quickly with a fire:

• practice your plan at night, getting down on your hands and knees with a flashlight while crawling to safety. Heavy smoke impairs breathing, which is why staying close to the floor increases chances of escape.

• In order to be able to react quickly to fire, draw a floor plan of your home showing all possible exits from each room. Where possible, plan two exits: a main route and an alternate route from each room.

• If you live in an apartment building, develop your escape plan taking into account fire escape procedures provided by building management.

SMOKE ALARMS

LOCATING/INSTALLING ALARMS:

Read and follow the manufacturer's instructions carefully.

• For best performance, an alarm should be mounted on the ceiling in or near the centre of the room, hall or stairway, and at the head of each stairway leading to an occupied area.

· Optimum location for wall mounts is at least 15 cm (6 inches) from the ceiling but not more than 30 cm (19 inches) from it.

· Avoid installing where the temperature is less than 5oC (41oF) or exceeds 48oC (119oF).

· Keep alarms away from doors and windows. • Never locate an alarm in front of an air

register, fans or vents. • Keep alarms at least 60 cm (2 feet) from any

corner. · Do not recess smoke alarms in walls or

ceilings! Smoke alarms in rooms with ceiling slopes greater than 30 cm (one foot) rise per 2.4 m

(eight feet) horizontally should be located on the high side of the room.

 Avoid locating an alarm at the peak of an "A" frame type ceiling.

• Never paint a smoke alarm.

• Keep alarms 60 to 90 cm (two to three feet) away from light fixtures.

- · Use a qualified electrical contractor.
- · Never install the alarm in the electrical circuit

· Check the alarm when installation is complete.

MARK YOUR CALENDAR: TESTING AND CLEANING:

• Test your smoke alarm monthly and clean it every 6 months. Mark it on your calendar so that you don't forget. Things to remember when testing your smoke alarm:

• Ensure that power is being transmitted to the alarm and that it will activate in the presence of smoke.

· Test your smoke alarm by pressing the test button.

• Even alarms with a pilot light that indicate power is being transmitted, should be tested regularly.

· Battery-operated smoke alarms will warn you when batteries need replacing. Despite this, make it a habit to change the batteries vearly

• When you've been away from home for a few days, check your alarm on your return to ensure it is working properly.

• Remember, your smoke alarm can't protect you if the batteries have been removed or a plug has been disconnected.

• The lifespan of a typical smoke alarm is about 10 years, but some models last as little as 5 years.

• To clean the alarm, open the cover and gently vacuum the interior of it. Frequently, the alarm will sound while the unit is being cleaned.

Espanola Police Report

In March, 2015, the Espanola Police Service were contacted in writing by a local business owner in Espanola, about a former employee suspected of defrauding a large sum of money. The business owner had ordered an audit into the books, and would contact the Espanola Police Service once the audit was completed.

In July, 2015, the Espanola Police Service received the auditor's report, which showed a total loss to the business of \$160,950.43. The losses included the theft of \$35,491.90 in cash payments, \$4568.14 in unauthorized write offs, \$20,167.18 in missing payments, and \$100,723.21 in accounts deemed stale or uncollectable. The audit showed that the employee was falsifying payment records, to hide illicit activity. On September 3, the 43 year old female from Espanola was arrested and charged with: Fraud Over \$ 5000.00; Criminal Breach of Trust; Theft Over \$ 5000.00; and Falsification of Books and Documents with Fraudulent Intent. She will appear in Espanola Court on November 3, to answer to her charges.

On September 11 at 11:30 p.m., the Espanola Police Service received a call that a male appeared to have been hit by a car while walking along Centre Street in Espanola; however, upon arrival, police were unable to locate the male or the vehicle involved. Several minutes after the initial call, a local licenced establishment contacted police advising that they'd just removed a male due to his behaviour, and that they were concerned about his well-being. While checking the area, a member of

the Espanola Police Service located the male walking on James Street at Centre Street, and discovered that the male was intoxicated, and said he was homeless. The officer, concerned for the male's safety, due to his level of intoxication and having no place to go, arrested him for Being Intoxicated in a Public Place, and initially transported him to the Espanola Police Service, but then later released him to the care of his mother. The 22 year old Espanola resident received a \$65.00 ticket under the Liquor Licence Act, for Being Intoxicated in a Public Place. The male had no recollection of being hit by a car.

On September 16 at 10:30 p.m., a 16 year old unlicenced driver was stopped on Mead Blvd in Espanola, while he was out joy riding in his parents' vehicle, without their consent. In speaking to the young driver, the officer detected the smell of an alcohol on his breath, and administered a roadside screening device, which produced a reading within the "warn" range. As a result of the incident, the 16 year old was charged with Drive Motor Vehicle with No Licence, under the Highway Traffic Act, and Being Under 19 years Consuming Liquor under the Liquor Licence Act. His parents declined to press criminal charges for taking the motor vehicle without consent.

OPP Seat Belt Campaign On Now



The Ontario Provincial Police Fall Seat Belt Campaign runs through Friday, October 9. Members of the Sudbury and Espanola OPP Detachments are participating in this important road safety initiative. Officers will be focusing on seat belt enforcement and educating road users in an effort to change driving behaviour and save lives. Motorists can expect to see the familiar OPP roadside spot checks as officers look for proper seat belt use.

Drivers are legally responsible for ensuring that passengers under the age of 16 are properly buckled up – in a seat belt, an appropriate child car seat or booster seat. A properly installed child safety seat can reduce the risk of serious injury or death by as much as 75%. The number of occupants in a vehicle is limited to the number of seat belts - one person, one seat belt – it's the law.

The penalty for a seat belt offence is \$240

of which \$40 is applied to the victim surcharge fund and two demerit points. Traffic collisions remain the leading cause of injury-related deaths in Ontario, estimated to exact a social cost of \$9 billion every year. The human toll, loss of life and suffering is immeasurable.

Remember the difference between the belted person's stopping distance and the unbelted person's is significant. It's often the difference between life and death. "As a driver do your part, buckle up and ensure all your passengers are properly secured, remember seat belts save lives." stated Sudbury **OPP** Detachment Commander Staff Sergeant Rick Riopelle.



Recipe

Thanksgiving is this upcoming weekend. The best part of the holiday for me is not the food, but that my kids come home to visit. I've become one of those moms who say, "when are you coming home?" "Why don't you ever text me?" "Don't you love me anymore?" I'm not sure when



I became that mom, but I do love having everyone under one roof, and when the house becomes congested, there's wet towels on the bathroom floor, and clutter across my kitchen counter, I hug them all goodbye and go back to enjoying my clean, peaceful house...for about two weeks, and then I miss them again. The following recipe is a festive, seasonal dessert that can be made a day ahead to serve alongside the traditional pumpkin pie at Thanksgiving dinner.

Caramel Apple Mini Cheesecakes with Streusel Topping (makes 18 muffin size)

Crust

- 1 1/3 cups of finely crushed graham crackers *
- ٠ 2 1/2 Tbsp granulated sugar
- * 1/4 tsp ground cinnamon
- * 6 Tbsp unsalted butter, melted

Streusel

- 1/2 cup all-purpose flour $\mathbf{\dot{v}}$
- 1/4 cup quick oats $\dot{\mathbf{v}}$
- * $1/4 \operatorname{cup} + 2 \operatorname{Tbsp}$ packed light-brown sugar
- ••• 1/4 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1/8 tsp ground nutmeg
- * 1/8 tsp salt
- * 1/4 cup unsalted butter, cold and diced into 1/2-inch cubes

Filling

- 2 (8 oz) pkgs cream cheese, softened *
- ÷ 2/3 cup granulated sugar
- $\dot{\cdot}$ 2 large eggs
- * 1/4 cup sour cream
- * 1 tsp vanilla extract
- ••• 3 granny smith apples, peeled, cored and finely chopped or minced
- 2 tsp lemon juice

Topping

Caramel sauce

For the crust: Preheat oven to 325 degrees. In a mixing bowl, whisk together graham cracker crumbs, sugar and cinnamon. Pour in butter and using a fork, stir until evenly moistened. Divide mixture among 18 paper lined muffin cups, adding a rounded tablespoon to each cup. Press into an even layer. Bake in preheated oven 5 minutes, then remove from oven and allow to cool.

For the streusel: In a mixing bowl, whisk together flour, quick oats, brown sugar, cinnamon, nutmeg and salt. Add cold butter and using fingertips, rub butter into dry mixture until it comes together it small crumbles and pieces of butter are no longer visible. Transfer to refrigerator while preparing apples and filling.

For the filling: In a bowl, toss chopped apples with lemon juice, set aside. In a mixing bowl, using an electric hand mixer set on mediumlow speed; cream together cream cheese with sugar just until smooth. Mix in eggs one at a time, then blend in sour cream and vanilla.

To assemble cheesecakes: Divide cheesecake batter evenly among 18 muffin cups pouring filling over crust (use a 1/4 cup and fill it about 3/4 full). Divide apples evenly over cheesecake layer, and then finish by sprinkling a heaping tablespoon of the streusel over tops. Bake in preheated oven 23 - 25 minutes. Cool at room temperature 30 minutes, then transfer to fridge and chill 3 hours. Serve with a drizzle of caramel sauce.

NOTICE OF THE PASSING OF ZONING BYLAW (Planning Act-Section 34(18))

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers passed Bylaw 2015-29 on the 23rd day of September, 2015.

The land to which the bylaw applies is described as Hallam, Plan M38 Part Lot 119, Parcel 28307 Plan 53R-10635 Part 1 and Parcel 14511. The purpose for the amendment is to rezone an existing residential property from General Commercial to General Residential and to allow for reduced side and rear yard setbacks on the commercial and residential abutting properties , pursuant to Consent Application File No. C-15-07. This application is subject of a consent application under the Planning Act.

The last date for filing a notice of appeal is **October 26, 2015**. A Notice of Appeal must be filed with the Clerk of the Corporation of the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers, setting out the reasons for the appeal. This must also be accompanied by the fee required by the Ontario Municipal Board.

Only individuals, corporations and public bodies may appeal a zoning bylaw to the Ontario Municipal Board. A Notice of Appeal may not be filed by an unincorporated association or group. However, a Notice of Appeal may be filed in the name of an individual who is a member of the association or the group on its behalf.

No persons or public body shall be added as a party to the hearing of the appeal unless, before the bylaw was passed, the person or public body made oral submissions at a public meeting or written submissions to the Council or, in the opinion of the Ontario Municipal Board, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.

This bylaw is available for inspection in the municipal office during regular office hours.
