The Facts And Fines of Distracted Driving



We are all aware of the dangers of distracted driving. Yet, the offence is still the leading cause of accidents in Ontario. On September 1, the province initiated higher fines and stiffer penalties for those caught driving while distracted by handheld devices.

Here are the facts, straight from the MTO:

In Ontario, it's against the law to: operate hand-held communication and electronic entertainment devices while you're driving or view display screens unrelated to your driving. Examples of hand-held devices include: iPods; GPS and MP3 players; cell phones; smart phones; laptops; DVD players.

A hands-free device is any device that you do not touch, hold or manipulate while driving, other than to activate or deactivate it. For example, actions such as dialing or scrolling through contacts, or manually programming a GPS

device are not allowed.

As of September 1, the fines and penalties for distracted driving increased. If convicted of distracted driving, a fully licenced driver (holder of Class A, B, C, D, E, F, G) or a hybrid driver (holder of a full-class licence and a novice licence such as Class G and M1) will receive: a fine of \$400, plus a victim surcharge and court fee, for a total of \$490 if settled out of court; a fine of up to \$1,000 if you receive a summons or fight your ticket; three demerit points applied to your driver's record. If convicted of distracted driving, a novice driver (subject to the Graduated Licensing program) will be subject to escalating sanctions: first occurrence will result in a 30-day licence suspension; second occurrence will result in 90-day licence suspension; licence cancellation and removal from the Graduated Licensing System for a third

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Recipe

When I used to bake, I'd make these chocolate chip cookies all the time. I stopped baking regularly because of my lack of willpower. With the kids away at school, I will eat the entire batch by myself. The only way to avoid this is to



not have them tempting me, and luring me into the kitchen with their deliciousness. This recipe makes a big batch of yummy, chewy, buttery, flat, and not fluffy, chocolate chip cookies that I find hard to resist.

Brown Sugar Chocolate Chip Cookies

(makes approximately 50 cookies)

- 1 pound of unsalted butter
- * 3 cups brown sugar
- * 1 cup granulated sugar
- * 4 eggs
- * 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- * 3 ½ cups flour
- * 1 ½ teaspoons salt
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 1 ½ cups chocolate chips

Heat oven to 375 degrees. Cream butter until smooth; add sugars. Beat in eggs and vanilla. Sift together dry ingredients, and slowly beat into wet mixture. Fold in chocolate chips. Drop 2-3 tbsps of batter per cookie onto a well-greased cookie sheet or sheet lined with parchment paper. Space apart 2 inches for spreading. Bake 8 - 10 minutes, until golden. Remove from baking sheet and allow to cool on racks.

Pumped Pumpkins

By Grant Lewis - I can remember as a child, the magical transformation of the giant pumpkin into a beautiful glass carriage. How about this, though: the transformation of a 750 pound pumpkin into 10,000 bottles of pumpkin wine! Gives new meaning to the "putting away of childish things." Yet it will happen, this year, in northern Ontario at Boreal Winery, the only winery in northeastern Ontario. It all started with a small seed, on a three acre farm in Val Therese. And the magician's name is Stephen Smith.

He grew up on a farm in Micksburg, near Pembroke, ON. After attending Nippissing University in the Arts and Science program and meeting his wife while in school, Stephen moved to Sudbury to begin his life. He worked for the city of Sudbury and later for The Conservation Authority. He has veered little from his passion for nature, science and agriculture. In 1998, he started at Science North, working in a new lab called Watching the World. For the next 11 years he moved from lab to lab; worked in the very popular Nature Exchange Program, and then Discovery Theatre, a live theatre space, teaching people fascinating things about science. A true renaissance man! Late in his career, technology and robotics was an interest he pursued. For many years he was an integral part of the robotics program combining his love of technology and science. Espanola Police Report

On August 29 at 10:15 p.m., a member of the Espanola Police Service was on general patrol on Second Avenue, when she was waved over by a citizen, who wanted to report that two ATV's were being driven at high speeds in the area. While the concerned citizen was speaking to the officer, the two ATV's drove towards their location, but in seeing the marked patrol vehicle, they quickly turned around and sped off in the opposite direction. The officer followed the two ATV's, and activated her emergency lights to motion them to stop, but they both accelerated off at speeds between 85 to 90 km/h down several residential streets, before entering a bush area off Mead Boulevard. The officer disengaged, and attended a residence in the area where one of the quads was seen by the officer previously. In speaking to the homeowner at that location, he confirmed that his 15-year old son was out on the ATV, and would call the officer when he returned. Later that evening, the officer was contacted by the parent, and returned to the residence, where a 15-year old was arrested and charged with criminal code offences that included: Flight while Pursued by Peace Officer; and Dangerous Operation of a Motor Vehicle. Further, the male was charged with offenses under the Off Road Vehicle Act, which included: Drive Off Road Vehicle – No Licence; Drive Off Road Vehicle – No Number Plates; and Drive Off Road Vehicle – No Insurance. He will appear in Espanola Court on November 17, 2015, to answer to his charges. Currently, police are still looking to identify the driver of the second ATV, described as a green colored ATV, with a two-up seat. At the time of the offence, the ATV was carrying a passenger. An Espanola resident has been issued fines totaling \$400.00 under the Town of Espanola's Municipal Noise By-Law, and Animal Control By-Law, for two separate violations within a week of one another. On August 25 at 6:30 a.m., the Espanola Police Service responded to a complaint of a dog barking at a residence in Espanola, and upon arrival, the officer heard persistent barking coming from the rear of the residence. The homeowner was not present at the time, but the officer returned later and issued the dog's owner a Municipal By-Law ticket for \$150.00, for allowing his dog to cause noise from persistent barking. On September 1 at 5:00 p.m., the Espanola Police Service received a complaint of a white shepherd mix running in the area of the town offices and police station. The dog, which did not have any dog tags affixed to its collar, was located by police, and brought to the police station where it was picked up by an Animal Control Officer and taken to their shelter in Azilda. The owner of the dog was identified, and subsequently issued with two Municipal By-Law tickets for \$125.00 each, for fail to prohibit dog from running at large, and failure to affix dog tags, contrary to the Town of Espanola By-law 2485/12, which deals with the licensing and regulating of dogs and cats.
