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Espanola Town Council Report

By Chloe Kneer – Water and sewer rates are going up for the commercial and industrial classes and a costing will be done to explore the eventuation of water meters for those rate paying classes in Espanola. The rates will increase by approximately 30%. Along with the rate hike, council voted to increase the fixture rate.

Council spent the bulk of the regular meeting debating the request from the Public Works Department to hire full-time employees two to replace retirements and one temporary to cover for an employee on short term disability. Councillor Ray Dufour initially suggested to PW Manager Joel Yusko that he "do things differently with the crew you have." Dufour explained, "We have to work a lot harder to make ends meet in Espanola." He went on to say that we may need to organize our people better. Councillor Ron Duplessis opened the discussion of hiring seasonal workers, either on an asneeded basis, or for a certain number of months, when the work load is heavier. Yusko and assistant manager of PW Dave Parker explained that the department really doesn't see any down time throughout

the year, as there is always preventative and regular maintenance to be done. Parker said that the department is down approximately 120 hours of work per week with the current staff. Councillor Bob Yocom expressed his concerns about regular and preventative maintenance saying that delaying those things in order to save money is "false economy." However, Yocom also asserted that if council didn't wish to approve the hiring, that they should direct the department as to which services are going to be cancelled in favour of completing regular and preventative maintenance. Yocom also brought up the recommendation from the regarding KPMG report shared services. "If we don't have the people, we won't be able to share services," he said.

The motion was amended and Council approved the hiring of one full-time, one seasonal, and one temporary replacement. A motion to reconsider the zoning change on the lot at the corner of Adelaide and Oscar Streets to allow Habitat for Humanity to build a duplex was also carried. Council will take the matter up again on October 13.

Espanola Police Report

On August 28, 2015 at 12:30 a.m., members of the Espanola Police Service were conducting a R.I.D.E. spot-check at Highway 6 and Old Webbwood Road, when a pickup truck being driving by a 21-year old male came through the spot-check.

While conversing with the driver, the officer observed a clear plastic bag containing a green leafy substance, suspected to be Marihuana, sticking out of the driver's pant pocket. The driver initially denied that substance was Marihuana and attempted to push it further into his pocket, but upon handing it over to the officer, the bag was determined to contain 6 grams of Marihuana, with an estimated street value of \$60.00.

The 21-year old from Espanola was subsequently arrested and charged with one count of Possession of a Controlled Substance, contrary to the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act. He will appear in Espanola court on November 3, 2015, to answer to his charge.

On August 28, 2015 at 11:30 p.m., a member of the Espanola Police Service was conducting routine patrol on Avery Drive, when the

officer observed a motor vehicle travelling in front of him with the plate light out. The officer stopped the vehicle to alert the driver of the infraction, and upon doing so, found that the female driver was a suspended driver. During a search of the vehicle incident to arrest, the officer located a small quantity of Marihuana, and a Percocet pill in the vehicle.

As a result of the traffic stop, a 22-year old female from Webbwood was charged with one count of Driving Under Suspension, contrary to the Highway Traffic Act, and two counts of Possession of a Controlled Substance, contrary to Controlled Drugs and Substances Act. She will appear in Espanola court on November 3, 2015, to answer to her charge.

It's Just Like Riding A Bike

By Chloe Kneer – The saying goes "It's never too soon to start and never too late to start over." Truer words were never spoken in the case of Espanola resident Ronnie Masciangelo, who at age 69 has just re-entered the arena of horse competition. Most associate Masciangelo with his many years of service at McQuarrie Motors. Little do they know that he is an aficionado of a different kind of horsepower other than what's found under the hoods of the vehicles he sells. Masciangelo says he has always been a horse lover and grew up around them in Sudbury. When he was a boy, it wasn't as odd as it would be today to have a horse right in the city. His family mostly kept them for pleasure and it wasn't until 1968 that Masciangelo began showing them at barrel racing (pole bending is another term used to describe it) competitions. In the early 1970's he took up reining, a sport that has horse and rider working in sync, with the rider giving subtle clues while the

horse responds, by either turning, galloping, or spinning in a circle. At its best, reining is almost akin to a ballet, with its smooth transitions from move to move.


In 1974, Masciangelo went to the American Quarter Horse World Championship Show, one of only two Canadians who qualified. "The other was from Alberta," he says. His last show was in 1989, after losing his horse and Masciangelo decided to hang up his reins for good in 1990 when the horse he was riding slipped on some rocks and fell on top of him. Masciangelo was seriously injured in the fall.

Fast forward to approximately a year ago and the horse bug began biting again. He started looking for a horse, an arduous task for an experienced rider. The old contacts from his competition days resurfaced and he connected with world-renowned trainer Dick Pieper from Texas. After a lot of searching, Pieper phoned Masciangelo, saying he had found him the perfect mare. In anticipation, Masciangelo prepped himself with a truck and trailer. The two made an agreement for winter boarding and come spring, Masciangelo was to pick up the mare. He took the long trip south, excited about the horse; however, disappointment and doubt set in when he rode her. Masciangelo wasn't sure if it was the horse, or him, but he knew they weren't a fit. He came home towing an empty trailer. Not long after, Pieper phoned again, this time offering his personal horse, named Doc, to Masciangelo. Another trip to Texas and this time, he had hit the jackpot. Masciangelo brought Doc back to Ontario and began riding him this summer. He was thoroughly enjoying himself when those around him began encouraging him to enter competition. He was unsure that they'd be ready, but

decided to go for it, after only a couple of months of regular riding. Masciangelo entered his first quarter horse competition in decades just a few weeks ago, where he won 2 firsts and 1 third in the reining classes, both pro and open. He also garnered second place in the ranch pleasure class and 2 thirds in the halter classes for confirmation and best colour for Doc, who is a paint guarter horse, so named after their distinct colour variations.

To be sure, the competition is very physically demanding. "I can feel it," chuckles Masciangelo. "I am using muscles I haven't used for years, or didn't even know I had." In addition to resuming his passion, Masciangelo has dropped over thirty pounds and says he feels great. He gives credit to the owners at Rainbow Valley Farm, where Doc is boarded, for helping him get into competition so quickly. "Sean and Monica were really hands on with Doc. We had to change and monitor his diet and they followed all of my instructions to a T. I could never have done this without them, that's for sure," he

Masciangelo is planning to go back to Ancaster next month for the final show of the year, and then he and Doc will be regulars on the circuit from May to October of next year.

Recipe

I haven't had breakfast yet today, and my mouth is watering as I'm typing up this recipe. I love potatoes! What's not to love about hot, crispy, cheesy, potato pancakes topped with sour cream? This is the perfect recipe for those left over



mashed potatoes from upcoming Thanksgiving dinner, or why not peel some extra potatoes the next time you're making mashed potatoes and make these for another meal? I'm sure everyone will love them.

Cheesy Leftover Mashed Potato Pancakes

- ❖ 3 cups chilled leftover mashed potatoes
- ❖ 2/3 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- 2 tablespoons chopped scallions or green onions, green and white parts
- ❖ I egg, lightly beaten
- ❖ 3 tablespoons, plus 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
- ❖ Vegetable oil, for pan-frying
- Sour cream, for serving



In a large bowl, stir together the mashed potatoes, cheese, scallions or onions, egg, and 3 tablespoons flour until combined. Using your hands, divide the mixture into 12 portions. Roll each portion into a compact ball then flatten it into a pancake about a 1/2-inch-thick. Place the remaining 1/2 cup of flour in a shallow dish and carefully dredge each pancake in the flour. Heat 3 to 4 tablespoons of vegetable oil in a large sauté pan over medium heat. (Add enough oil to thoroughly coat the bottom of the pan.) Fry the pancakes, in batches, until they're golden brown and crispy on both sides, 3 to 4 minutes. Add more oil to the pan as needed between batches. (Do not overcrowd the pan and do not flip the pancakes too soon or they won't develop a crisp crust.) Transfer the pancakes to a paper towel-lined plate and immediately sprinkle them with salt. Serve the potato pancakes topped with sour cream and garnished with additional chopped scallions or green onions.

All leftover mashed potatoes will vary in consistency depending on how much cream, milk or melted butter you added to the original batch. If the mashed potato pancake mixture looks too dry and isn't holding together, add one more egg. If it looks too wet, add more flour, I tablespoon at a time, until the mixture is cohesive.
