Espanola Police Chief Warns Of Scams



The Espanola Police Service is warning citizens and businesses about new and often sophisticated scams that prey on vulnerable taxpayers, utility users, and consumers.

"Financial crimes and fraud are criminal activities that victimize individuals from all walks of life. During the past year, police across Ontario have become increasingly aware of very sophisticated, well-organized financial criminal activities that prey on people's lack of understanding about their rights when it comes to their financial matters," said Police Chief Steven Edwards. "If you feel uneasy about someone calling you or showing up at your door about your taxes or your utility bills, if you notice suspicious banking or on-line activities related to your financial assets, don't be fooled. Call for help."

Chief Edwards noted that individuals and businesses can call the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) at 1-800-959-8281 to confirm the authenticity of a CRA telephone number or they may report incidents of suspected fraud to the Canadian Anti-Fraud

Espanola Police Chief Warns Of Scams

The Espanola Police Service is partnering with the Ontario Association of Chiefs Police (OACP) to promote the OACP's 2016 Crime Prevention Campaign. The campaign theme is "Know Who You're Dealing With..." a new crime prevention booklet detailing the types of crimes Ontarians should be aware of and what they can do to protect themselves, their families, and their businesses, is now available online.

Know Who You're Dealing With...

Tax Scams

- The CRA has noted an increase in telephone scams where the caller claims to be from the CRA but is not. Beware these calls are fraudulent and could result in identity and financial theft
- The CRA takes these tax fraud schemes very seriously and actively warns Canadians about scams undertaken using the CRA's name, especially during the tax filing season, when such scams peak
- If you want to confirm the authenticity of a CRA telephone number, call the CRA at 1-800-959-8281
- For more information about the security of taxpayer information and other examples of fraudulent communications, go to www.cra. gc.ca/security

Electrical Utilities Scams

- Ontario's electricity customers are targets for phone scammers. These scammers tell people that they are from the local utility and use sophisticated software to show the utility's name on a caller display. Scammers threaten to disconnect customers if they don't immediately pay by prepaid credit card or wire transfer.
- Scammers target people when they are most vulnerable, especially during holidays or

peak business times. Local utilities NEVER ask customers to pay by pre-paid credit card or wire transfers over the phone. Local utilities NEVER threaten to disconnect you right away.

- When in doubt, call your utility company and ask about their policy. If someone calls and threatens to disconnect you if you don't make a payment right away by pre-paid credit card or wire transfer, SAY NO and HANG UP! Never give out your personal or financial information.
- Report the incident to your utility company and the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre at 1-888-495-8501. This agency collects information on fraud and works closely with police to solve these crimes.

Identity Theft

The theft of identity information such as "tombstone" data, employment information, banking particulars, and payment card data have become a highly saleable commodity that is easily trafficked via traditional means and through hundreds of websites on the "dark web."

Identity information is obtained via Server/Computer Hacks, ATM/POS tampering, Phishing, Social Engineering, Complicit Government/Corporate Employees, Theft of Mail, and a host of other means. Once "Pirate" obtained, websites available on the dark web provide nearly unlimited access to such data to all takers. Payment for the identity information is easily made via non-traditional, unregulated, online payment systems that offer participants the ability to traffic or purchase identity information for eventual exploitation. Typical offences include: Account takeovers, true-name fraudulent credit applications, TM/POS tampering, and trafficking in identity information.

Espanola Town Council Report

By Chloe Kneer – Council has been hearing presentations from department heads over the last few weeks in special meetings as they try to finalize the 2016 budget. The process should wrap up in the next couple of weeks with Espanola ratepayers seeing a hike of just under 3.5% in their property taxes.

At the regular meeting on February 9, the Code of Conduct for councillors made its way back to the table, after having been sent back to the Corporate Services Committee for re-wording. The lengthiest debate of the evening had those in favour saying "let's just take a vote on it already" and those opposed pushing for staff to implement their Code of Conduct at the same time as council to make all things fair at the town hall. Discussion ensued about whether or not a Code of Conduct is appropriate for a municipality the size of Espanola. It wasn't readily clear if most smaller municipalities have one, as some councillors thought ves and others said no. Staff couldn't provide any concrete numbers, only saying that it is not out of the ordinary. Councillor Bill Foster and

Mayor Ron Piche both stated that lawyers had given the document a read-through and called the wording "hare bones," however. Councillor Ken **Duplessis** thought the wording still too far-reaching especially as it pertains to punishment, if required. The measure was defeated in a stalemate vote of 3-3 (Councillor Stewart Meikleham was not present to vote).

Councillor Ron Duplessis brought forward a motion to determine a suitable donation from the municipality to go towards the Sam Bruno PET scanner fund at Health Sciences North. Duplessis stated that the piece of equipment is vital for the region and would serve all of those in the north, therefore he was on board with matching the Greater City of Sudbury's per capita donation of 62¢, or \$3,300 - \$3,400. Council chose the figure of \$3,500, and also decided that they would consider the donation each year at budget time. The motion was carried.

The next regular meeting of council is Tuesday, February 23 at 7:30 p.m. at the Espanola municipal offices.

Recipe

This recipe has been circulating on the internet for a while, and one of my coworkers decided to test it on her family. The conclusion; it passed the test. It's super easy to make and a delicious comfort dish for this cold weather season.



You can use as many or as little vegetables as you prefer.

Crockpot Chicken and Dumplings

- · 4 boneless, skinless chicken breast
- 1 can of chicken broth
- 2 cans cream of chicken soup
- · Carrots sliced into coins
- (amount is your personal preference)
- Diced celery (amount is your personal preference)
- 1/2 can peas or frozen peas
- 1/2 onion
- crumbled bacon (lightly fry and drain)
- parsley
- garlic powder, to taste
- salt and pepper
- 1 can of Pillsbury biscuits



Place chicken breasts in bottom of crockpot. Pour chicken broth and both cans of cream of chicken soup over it. Add in carrots, celery and onion. Add garlic powder, salt, pepper and parsley flakes. Cook on high for 3 hours. Remove chicken and shred into large chunks. Add the chicken back in with the crumbled bacon and the peas; stir together. Taste and adjust seasonings if needed. Cut the biscuits into thirds and place them on top of the stew. Put lid on, and cook on high for another hour or until biscuits are done.

Any unauthorized reproduction will be subject to recourse in law.
