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Espanola 2016 Budget Overview

By Chloe Kneer – Espanola Town Council read through the first draft of the 2016 budget at a special meeting on January 19. CAO Cynthia Townsend gave an overview, citing some of the challenges going forward, amongst them being the continued tax burden shift from the industrial and commercial classes to the residential ratepayer. Townsend presented a list of over \$2.5 million of "at risk" tax revenues, which is due to pending industrial and commercial reassessments that are now before the Assessment Review Board (ARB). An ARB decision to reduce Domtar's assessment a few years ago resulted in the town having to repay over \$4 million in taxes to the paper manufacturer.

The other challenge that isn't unique to Espanola is the decline in provincial grants. For example, the Ontario Municipal Partnership Fund (OMPF) grant was decreased by nearly \$71,000, and the power dam grant of \$797,000 is in jeopardy in coming years. Increasing apportionment costs for the Manitoulin-Sudbury District Services Board and the Sudbury and District Health Unit (both of which are dictated, not controlled by the town) are also budgetary concerns.

In 2009-2010, Espanola was deemed "high risk" for not being able to meet its financial obligations. Because of this, Townsend explained that the municipality has instituted a reserve policy, whereby funds are allocated for expenses such as election expenses (every 4 years) and winter maintenance costs, which can vary greatly from year to year. With the mild winter we've had this year. Townsend says any unused funds in the 2015 budget will be moved forward to the coming year. The town currently has \$4.5 million in reserves, but that money won't stay in the coffers for long, as \$2.1 million will be used for capital projects including the water and sewer line project at Algoma and Annette Streets. The town's water tower needs to be relined and there is money being transferred to the fire department fund for a possible upcoming capital project at the fire hall.

Also at the meeting, Clerk/ Manager of Planning Services Paula Roque explained to council that the municipal building at 100 Tudhope Street is in need of repairs totalling \$105,000. The offices need new windows, attic insulation and brick sill plates. Council will have to decide whether or not to include the items in the budget.

As it stands, the municipal levy will increase by 3.4%. Department heads will present to council at future budget meetings and that figure may change. Check the Around&About website (www.aroundandabout.ca) or the Around&About Facebook page for more details.

Budi's Bastille & Brunch - Now That's A Freakin' Jail

Indonesia is a country with a serious drug incinerated while the six suspected problem and a simple justice system. They put drug traffickers to death by firing squad. At least they did until very recently when international pressure caused them to suspend the execution of death row drug dealers.

OPP And OFSC Say Snowmobile Safely



The Ontario Provincial Police the Ontario Federation and Snowmobile Clubs of (OFSC) promoted Provincial Snowmobile Safety Week last week with a message for snowmobilers to focus on their own personal safety and the well-being of others. Riding within the law and making smart choices is the only way to ensure an enjoyable ride that gets you home safely to your family at the end of the day.

The OPP and OFSC remind snowmobile enthusiasts to stay off the lakes and waterways for the time-being as conditions are generally poor in many parts of the province.

Stay on OFSC prescribed trails and don't ride impaired, speed or ride after dark. Last winter, the OPP investigated 15 snowmobile-related fatalities, a decrease from the previous two winters (21 in the 2013-14 season and 18 in the 2012-13 season). While the OPP and OFSC are relieved to see fewer lives lost, data clearly indicates that riding impaired, speeding and riding after dark continue to be major contributing factors in snowmobiling incidents:

• 58 per cent of snowmobilerelated fatalities involved alcohol or drugs;

• 57 per cent involved speeding Around&About January 26, 2016 Page 4

or riding too fast for conditions; • 58 per cent occurred at dusk or after dark.

In particular, the OPP and OFSC are looking to middle-aged males to ride with extra care and control this winter as 87 per cent of last season's snowmobilerelated fatalities involved male riders and 58 per cent were riders or passengers between the ages of 35 and 54. They also caution all snowmobilers about avoiding road running wherever possible. Where snowmobiling on the side of a public road is legal and necessary to access trails, you should always:

· adjust your speed to the conditions;

• watch out for parked vehicles and motor vehicles emerging from driveways;

• always give motor vehicles the right of way;

• be extra cautious when approaching intersections;

• observe and respect all traffic signs;

· slow down wherever snow banks obstruct your view.

motoring is The public being reminded to watch for snowmobiles along roads or those that cross roads at snowmobile trails. The OPP is committed to saving lives on Ontario's highways, trails and waterways through the reduction of preventable injury and death. Initiatives are developed and delivered through the Provincial Traffic Safety Program.

The OFSC is committed to proactive leadership in promoting safe, responsible riding, on and off Ontario snowmobile trails, by building safer snowmobiling knowledge, attitudes and behaviours through rider education, safety legislation

development and enforcement.

The film Highway of Tears will be shown and a light lunch served. Recipe

You can't go wrong with a chocolate and peanut butter combination dessert. Everybody loves this brownie. You can double the



recipe to make a 9 x 13 pan, and I suggest that you might want to do that because it will be gobbled up in no time. Delicious with a cold glass of milk.

Chocolate Peanut Butter Brownies

Brownie:

- 2 squares of unsweetened chocolate
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup butter or margarine
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup sugar
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of flour

Frosting:

- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup icing sugar
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup peanut butter
- $\frac{1}{4}$ cup butter
- 2 to 3 tbsp milk



- **Drizzle:**
- 1 square of semi-sweet chocolate
- 1 tbsp butter.

Grease and flour an 8 x 8 square pan. In a small saucepan over low heat, melt the 2 squares of unsweetened chocolate with the butter, and let cool. When cooled add the 2 eggs, 1 cup sugar and $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of flour and mix well. Pour into prepared pan and bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes. Take out of oven and cool. Meanwhile prepare the frosting by creaming together the icing sugar, peanut butter, butter and milk. Spread frosting on cooled brownie. Melt the 1 square of semi-sweet chocolate with the 1 tbsp of butter and L drizzle over top of the brownie. Once the drizzle has set, cut brownie into squares.
