## Canadian Blood Services it's in you to give



Half of all Canadians will either need blood or know someone who will at some point in their lives. Yet only four percent of Canadians donate. Canadian Blood Services recruits and collects blood, plasma, and platelets at 36 permanent collection sites and more than 14,000 donor clinics every year. The next local blood donor clinic is in Espanola this Thursday, May 12 at the Knights of Columbus Hall; however you can book an appointment and donate anytime in Sudbury. The number to phone is 1-888-2-DONATE.

Donated blood helps patients in many different ways (that's why it is called the gift of life). Accident victims, those requiring transfusions during surgeries (particularly cardiac surgeries) and premature infants all benefit from donated blood. It is also separated into its components: red cells, plasma and platelets which can be used individually for patients with specific conditions.



#### "Birds I View"

By Bob Rigby - It's good to see the warmer weather has arrived with people getting out to do their yard work, as I did this past weekend. I cleaned out my bird house, which was home to a pair of house wrens last summer, where they reared two broods of chicks. I also had eastern bluebirds nest successfully last season in another bird house. While working in the yard recently, I had a few visitors: a song sparrow, chipping sparrow, and a yellow warbler that landed on my neighbour's budding lilac bush. He sang one verse of his song and was gone. I did manage to take a drive into the bush late Sunday afternoon, and I am glad I did. There, I saw a variety of waterfowl, mainly wood duck, ringed-neck duck, and a few common goldeneye. As I sat and watched the ducks, several tree swallows were skimming close to the water picking up insects. The woodlands close by was alive with sound from northern flickers, and as I walked towards the forest, a sharp shinned hawk flashed by in pursuit of a small bird. Speaking of birds of prey, a

pair of merlins (a small species of falcon) were present in the same area as last year, where they nested in an abandoned crow's nest.

Driving up Panache Lake Road, I stopped at Mud Lake looking towards the small rock island and noticed that a pair of herring gulls have nested, and on this day were constantly being tormented by a pair of Caspian terns. This altercation lasted

about 15 minutes with the herring gulls being the victors. At press time, it is bone dry in the bush and I am hoping for a good rain to get the foliage growing. Not even the ferns have broken through, and there are still a few patches of snow. As we await the impending insect hatches with the following invasion of song birds, I thought it a good idea to talk about information for new birders. Over the years, I have purchased a library of bird books for my own study of the hobby, but anyone thinking of taking up bird watching may find the 'Peterson Field Guide to Birds of Eastern and Central North America,' an easy-to-use book for identifying birds. It is compact and has a wealth of information. As for binoculars, well I would leave that to the reader. I have had expensive glasses, but have either left them in the bush or given them a bump while going through, damaging them. You can spend a fortune if you wish, but for everyday bird watching, I personally prefer an inexpensive 10 X 42. Polish up those field glasses and enjoy!

#### Flower Power

We all love to preserve our beautiful flowers for as long as we possibly can for the maximum enjoyment of our efforts in growing them. Hopefully these tips will prove useful for you this summer. Our thanks to Sharon Sproule for sharing this adaptation from Ruth Jefkins' article in an Espanola Horticultural Society booklet.

#### **Conditioning of cut flowers:**

Water your beds and borders the day before you start cutting.

Cutting in late afternoon is best. Alternatively, cut at dusk or early morning.

When collecting flowers, cut stems on a slant with a short sharp knife and plunge them immediately into a container of warm water.

Once in the house, stems should be recut under water to prevent formation of air bubbles. Tap water should stand for 10 minutes to allow air bubbles to escape before stems are placed in it. Handle

each stem separately, strip unnecessary foliage, remove thorns from roses, and check for insects and dirt.

Use clean containers, remove leaves below the water line, and use floral preservative, which can be purchased or made at home. Recipe #1 - 12 oz. carbonated beverage containing sugar and citric acid, 12 oz. water and 1/4 tsp household bleach. Recipe #2 - 1 qt. water. 1 heaping tsp. sugar, 2 tbsp. vinegar

When working with flowers, handle by stems and have heads extending over edge of table.

Never let water touch petals, as it may spot them, especially delicate fleshy petals.

Set containers in cool dark room for at least 8 hours, preferably overnight. Misting nearby air with cold water is helpful.

For conditioning of specific flowers, "Snippy Tips 1", produced by the Toronto Garden Club, is an excellent guide.

### Recipe

have made this salad for supper several times and the flavours blend together deliciously. Cranberries and oranges



were made to go together, and when you add in the creamy avocados, salty feta cheese and crunchy toasted almonds you have an incredibly tasty salad. The chicken makes this into a healthy meal, but it can also be made without the chicken as a side salad. I have also used different types of lettuce in this salad. A mix of baby greens and spinach is another great option. When time is short and I don't have time to make the dressing, I add in some chopped mandarin oranges to achieve the orange flavour, and then cheat a bit by using bottled balsamic fig dressing or poppy seed dressing. Any way you choose to make it; this is a great salad for the busy season ahead.

#### Cranberry Avocado Spinach Salad with Chicken and **Orange Poppy Seed Dressing**

#### **Dressing**

- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 1/4 cup canola oil
- 2 tsp orange zest
- 1/4 cup fresh orange juice
- 2 Tbsp fresh lemon juice
- 2 Tbsp honey
- 2 tsp dijon mustard
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1 Tbsp poppy seeds

#### Salad

- 1 lb chicken, grilled
- 9 oz baby spinach
- 2 medium avocados, cored and diced
- 1 cup crumbled feta
- 3/4 cup sliced almonds, toasted
- 3/4 cup dried cranberries

Add olive oil, canola oil, orange zest, orange juice, lemon juice, honey, dijon mustard and salt to a blender. Pulse until well emulsified. Pour into a jar and stir in poppy seeds. Refrigerate until ready to use.

Add all salad ingredients to a large bowl. Pour dressing over top and toss to evenly coat. Serve immediately.
