Recipe

My rhubarb is up and ready to use, is yours? I have 4 large patches and these muffins are a great way to use some of those first tender stalks. I've been reading various baking



tips and tricks recently, and found a couple of them really improved the end result when making these muffins. First, sifting flour a couple of times before measuring it will result in a very light muffin. Second, and just as important, remove muffins from the pan immediately when they come out of the oven, and cool them on racks. If muffins cool in the pan, the steam cannot escape, and it causes the muffin to become more dense and hard. Cooling them on racks prevents this. It makes a huge difference and is totally worth a couple burnt fingers.

Rhubarb Sour Cream Muffins (Serves: 12)

- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- ³/₄ cup sugar
- 2-1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- ½ tsp. baking soda
- ½ tsp. salt
- 1 cup sour cream
- 8 Tbs. unsalted butter, melted and cooled slightly
- 2 large eggs
- 1 tsp. vanilla extract
- 1½ cups finely diced rhubarb



Heat the oven to 400°F. Line a 12-cup muffin tin with baking cups. In a large mixing bowl, combine the flour, sugar, baking powder, cinnamon, baking soda, and salt and whisk to blend. In a medium bowl, whisk together the sour cream, melted butter, eggs, and vanilla until smooth. Lightly stir the sour cream mixture into the dry ingredients with a spatula until the batter just comes together; do not overmix. Gently stir in the diced rhubarb. The batter will be thick. Divide the batter among the muffin cups. Bake the muffins until they're golden brown, spring back most of the way when gently pressed, and a pick inserted in the center comes out clean, approximately 18 to 22 minutes. Q

The Eat Local Farmers' Market Is Back

By Grant Lewis - How do you go from farming in the water to farming on the land? Simple... you sell your fish farm and buy 7 acres of fertile land on River Road. Voila! And, don't bother changing the name... North Winds!

That is exactly what Dan and Arlene Glofcheskie have done and have not looked back. Coming from a farm background, Dan is thrilled to be working the land literally from scratch. At the moment just over two acres are dedicated to the production of what he calls pure food. He admits that his produce is not certified organic because he does use some amendments such as leaves, sawdust and lime to battle the natural soil acidity in that area. chemicals or artificial fertilizers are used!

But what to do with the surplus produce. After all, two acres can produce a lot. Why not start a farmers' market. Another voila! Espanola is indeed fortunate to have its own local farmers' market every Saturday morning during the summer in the parking lot of the Queensway Pentecostal Church. Dan

emphasizes that this is not a market but a true farmers' market. Crafts and artisans can only make up a tiny part of the market, while local growers such as the Glofcheskies and Sandy Loam Produce take up most of the space.

There are others along the North Shore, including Elliot Lake, Blind River, and a large one in Desbarats. People welcome the chance to buy locally grown produce. Locally means normally within a 60 mile radius. Local markets reduce the carbon footprint on the environment, people can meet the producers personally, the food is more secure grown nearby, a market is a social event and can be a great way to meet like-minded people.

The whole Eat Local movement is worldwide and makes perfect sense. This year there will be a few more vendors to add more variety to your Saturday morning outing. The Glofcheskies will be the speakers at the next Espanola Horticultural Society's meeting on Monday, June 6. Join us at 7:00 p.m. at the Queensway Pentecostal Church. "Birds I View"

By Bob Rigby - Weather conditions can often impact on the arrival of our feathered friends returning home after wintering in a tropical climate, which would appear to be the case this year. This past week has been an exciting one with quite a few species of birds arriving. I've spotted an olive sided flycatcher, white and golden eastern crowned sparrows, bluebirds, a brewers blackbird, kildeer and a spotted sandpiper. In the birds of prey category, I saw marsh, broad winged and red shouldered hawks.

I must also tell you about the return of the house wren to my yard. He appeared last Sunday, spending a lot of time singing while popping in and out of the nest box I have provided. Did you know this little guy will go about building 2 or 3 nests, sometimes more, in preparation for his mate to select from? It is akin to bird house shopping.

I took my dog for a walk in the bush to see if I could add a few more to this week's sightings, and it was there that I came across a Hawthorne bush containing a blue jay's nest, with mother blue jay sitting tight. This is an early nest for these guys, and what was even more surprising was that there was not even a leaf on the bush.

This week's featured bird is the throated hummingbird. ruby This little feathered gladiator Ontario's only nesting hummingbird, and is a favourite with bird watchers, whose sightings indicate to most that summer has arrived. However, nothing could be further from the truth. These little guys have been spotted for several weeks now in the province; you can even go on line and follow the tracking and sightings as the ruby throats make their journey northward. It is still a marvel how a bird this size, weighing only a few grams, can make a journey of 2,000 miles or more, but still arrives to cheer up everyone's garden. It is equally popular at summer camps. I have often had people say to me that they have seen other species of hummers in the province, but they are often confused with hawk moths and sphinx moths that hover and feed on nectar just like the hummingbirds. It is hard to imagine that these insects are larger than a hummingbird. About the male hummingbird, he is the one with the bright red chin, hence the name. He is the partner who best enjoys the summer, leaving the drudgery of nest building, incubation and the feeding and rearing of the chicks to the female. I saw my first ruby throated hummingbird the Thursday before last while sitting in a parking lot near downtown Sudbury. There was a piece of orange ribbon caught up on the branch of a black cherry tree, and a male hummingbird approached, thinking it was a blossom of some sort.
