Fred Fox To Students: "Never Give Up On Your Dreams"

By Chloe Kneer – All told, the Terry Fox Run has raised \$800 million for cancer research since it began. Locally, A.B. Ellis Public School is responsible for \$400,000 of that total. Pretty impressive for a small northern Ontario elementary school. This year, students and staff hope to collect \$7,500, and in the lead up to the run on May 5, Terry Fox's brother Fred visited A.B. Ellis to encourage and inspire students.

It has been 36 years since Terry embarked on his Marathon of Hope, a run that was to take him across Canada in an effort to raise at least one dollar for

Seniors these days are being constantly holiday, thieves descended to the vault reminded by medical authorities to keep the body active, challenge the mind and a 50 centimetre wall using the best both will serve you well in slowing down the aging process. That last one, adding a new physical activity should not apply to a bunch of old guys in London, England whose idea of a new exercise routine involves spending a long weekend walking in and out of a safe deposit facility and removing \$365 million in jewels that did not belong to them!

Meet the Hatton Garden Overachievers Club. On the first weekend of April, 2015 nobody noticed anything untoward as eight graybeards worked tirelessly moving heavy equipment into the Hatton Garden Safe Deposit Company and coming out with what bystanders assumed were "wheelie bins" full of debris. (All that glitters is not necessarily debris!)

Four minutes after the doors automatically locked on Thursday, April 2nd, the beginning of the four-day Easter bank

from an elevator shaft and drilled through concrete drills money can buy. They took their time – seniors are also being told to reduce stress in their daily routine - and over the next three days they casually removed 200 million British pounds from 70 safety deposit boxes in an area of London where many people are in the jewelry and diamond business. Seniors being fussy about such things, they went home each night to sleep in their own beds. (Arrogance is not a pretty characteristic at any age!)

That's right, the largest burglary in English history was carried out by eight senior citizens. The average age of the Hatton Garden Gang is 63. Total of all eight ... 442 years. That's an awful lot of experience, even as bank robbers go. Upon their arrest by Scotland Yard, the robbers were described as "Analogue criminals operating in a digital world."

They got trapped by the new technology of number plate recognition and mobile phone evidence. Also, chattiness being a characteristic of old people, it did

not help that Brian Reader, age 76 bragged about the jewel job over pints at the Castle Pub in Islington, his animated confession filmed by undercover officers.

Names of the robbers who pulled off the nation's biggest B&E are John "Colonoscopy" Collins, Danny "Low Bone Density" Jones, William "Abe" Lincoln, Hugh "Depends" Doyle, Carl "Dead" Wood, John "I Can't Sleep At" Knight and Brian "I Need Cheaters To" Reader. (An eighth man, Jon Harbinson was found not guilty and released which is just as well because I didn't have a good nickname for him anyway.)

Police knew they were dealing with a different breed of robbers when the crime scene revealed empty packages Beta-blockers, Tylenol, of denture cream and stool softeners. It's the first trial ever that had to be delayed twice because of cataract surgeries. Prosecutors passed on the normal fingerprint evidence and instead presented the gang's denture records.

Hearing the drilling from across the street, some neighbours were initially suspicious, but after observing a bunch of bald guys with bifocals and pot bellies, they just thought it was Senior's Day at Marks & Spencer next door.

It wasn't long before police put out an all-points bulletin looking for criminals "more cranky than dangerous driving a white van with the left blinker probably on." A police spokesperson said it was the only getaway vehicle they had ever seen that contained eight pee cups.

Mysterious, the thieves left

the robbery-in-progress every day, fifteen minutes before 'The Early Bird' specials started. Thinking they were home-made burglar tools, police studied two large leverage implements for days before they concluded they were walkers.

"The Great Big Hole In The Wall Gang" was sentenced to a total of 35 years, Instead of a chance for parole, the robbers will benefit from a rarely-used clause "or dying of natural causes whichever comes first." Police would have responded to the break and enter operation at the Hatton Safe Depository except every time the burglar alarm went off, one of the robber's pacemaker malfunctioned. cancelling the surveillance alert.

The thieves admitted at their trial that they could have pulled off the heist in two days except their total nap time on the job totalled more than 36 hours. Also, at least a half of their time was spent trying to remember where they left the keys to the getaway van.

In court, two of the thieves turned on one another with one threatening to take the other off his pallbearer list.

As of now, \$180 million of jewelry taken in the heist have not been recovered. I say this only because if your husband, for no apparent reason surprises you with a \$1.5 million diamond necklace that has faint traces of Poligrip on it ... call the cops!

Many backyard birders live in our area, amongst them is Bob Rigby, an avid birder for over fifty years. Mr. Rigby resides in Espanola, but grew up in the north of England and Australia. His love of birds began when he was just a child and continues to this day. He loves sharing his interest and knowledge of birds with anyone who expresses a desire to listen, including giving presentations at schools. In addition to his love of birds in the wild, he has kept birds as pets his entire life, and is often called upon to assist when pet bird owners have questions or are in need of help to care for a sick bird. This is Mr. Rigby's first submission for a new Around&About column entitled "Birds I View."

The weather is warming up gradually and finally Black Creek is rid of its ice. As such, a few waterfowl species are being seen in the area, including: bufflehead, mallards, common merganser, hooded merganser and common loons. Not too much to report, sighting-wise, in the forest yet apart from northern juncos, tree sparrows, and common redpolls moving northward to their Tundra nesting grounds. I have, however, heard eastern phoebe and white-throated sparrows in

song. Red-winged blackbirds, common grackles and American robins are starting to become plentiful around town. The sunny mornings are bringing out the sounds of singing birds, many of the American goldfinches that braved the winter with us are in full song, and the males are starting to change into their summer plumage of yellow and black, a nice contrast after their drab winter green colour. I was awakened one morning last week by the sound of singing purple finches in my apple tree. Also arriving back as the ice recedes from our creeks are the beautiful great blue herons, and if you happen to be driving and glance into the fields, you may get a glimpse of sandhill cranes performing their mating dance.

I suspect by later this week we will be seeing golden- and white-crowned sparrows also heading farther north to nest. My true enjoyment is just around the corner and that is observing North American wood warblers, some moving through and others nesting in the area. It really is an enjoyment seeing these little songsters in full colour, after wintering in the South Americas and beyond. Look forward to sharing more sightings with you in the near future.

Autism Funding: Front And Centre



In his News From the Park column last week, Algoma-Manitoulin M.P.P. Michael Mantha wrote the following: "This week at Queen's Park it became clear to families of children with Autism Spectrum Disorder that Liberals have been ignoring expert advice not to abandon children The Wynne with autism. government is taking away essential treatment for children with autism, after a warning from experts who said that would violate the code of ethics of board certified behavioural analysts (BCBA).

A group of experts released a letter outlining concerns with the government's recent decision to remove children from intensive therapy. It stated, 'Abandonment of our clients is in serious violation of the BCBA code of ethics.'

Certification guidelines state that treatment should be based on clinical need, and not constrained by age. The Ontario Association of Behaviour Analysis (ONTABA) highlights a need for transition toward consistency with the ethical obligations to protect the best interests of clients.

Families who have been offered contracts are being told they will be removed after only six months, even though the expert report suggests that intensive therapy be run for a minimum of a year. It is concerning that this government continues to ignore advice from experts and continues to move forward with this wrong decision."

April was Austim Awareness month and Espanola resident Dennis Lendrum attended a rally in Sudbury on Saturday, April 16 to bring attention to and protest the new government protocols. He said, "One of our five grandchildren was diagnosed as being non-verbal and severely autistic. Knowing nothing about autism, our family lives changed at that moment. The search began looking for help. Thanks to Frank Klees and John Tory. Every time I see Alex, those two guys pop into my thoughts



for assisting in getting Alex into the government-funded IBI therapy well beyond the age of 5 (he is now 12)."

Lendrum has been instrumental in creating awareness and challenging politicians on their stances for therapy. Every time a political candidate comes through Espanola, Lendrum requests an audience with him or her to talk about his family's experience and to see how they will help families who deal with autism on a daily basis. He is now encouraging everyone to voice their concern over cutting funding for autism. Lendrum says he wants to see, "The Canada Health Act being amended to include Medicare coverage for ABA for ASD or, alternatively, the government of Canada to work with all provincial

and territorial governments to ensure inclusion of ABA or ASD within their respective medical services plans."

In addition to his voice regarding policy, Lendrum is organizing another Autism Acceptance event in Espanola for families. It is a way for those dealing with autism to interact and socialize, thereby leading to acceptance. He recently announced on his Facebook page, "Very excited. One of the owners of the Espanola Express [Jr. A hockey team] and I had a discussion today. We will be doing an Espanola Express - Autism Acceptance event during the upcoming hockey season." The call for volunteers is out and a date is yet to be determined. Like the Facebook page Autism Acceptance to find out more.

Espanola Town Council Report

By Chloe Kneer – If Espanola Minor Soccer wishes to purchase new goal nets for the big soccer field at the complex, parents should have to pay higher registration fees. That was the message council delivered when they voted against a one-time waiving of EMSA's user fees for the upcoming soccer season. EMSA had previously sent a delegation to council requesting the one-time offset of user fees (which are budgeted at \$12.75/ child), so that the organization could put the funds (along with a donation from the Lions Club) towards the new goal nets. The existing nets are not comparable to a standard soccer net sizewise and lack the box at the back to catch the ball.

"It was said that nearby communities charge more, so that's something they can do," said Mayor Ron Piche during the discussion. In her recommendation, Townsend cited that the ball and soccer fields are heavily subsidized by taxpayers and that the town is committed to doing some field work to maintain consistency in the measurements along the A public hearing was also held on a developer's request for a zoning amendment to residential lots along Second Herbert Lindsay Avenue. and Mitch Ouimette are the developers proposing a change from an R-1 to R-2 classification to pave the way for up and down duplexes and semi-detached homes to be permitted. Lindsay and Ouimette are also moving the two homes from Church and Haig Streets that have to be taken away for site preparation to begin on the new Sacred Heart and St. Joseph combined school. One of the existing homes will be converted to an up and down duplex, with a basement apartment, and the other will remain a single family home. Ouimette says that he hopes to, "Create an environment probably designed

for senior citizens." Only two residents in the neighbourhood expressed concern for the proposal, one challenging parking, which was noted confirms to regulations. Council voted in favour of the zoning change.

MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

As the weather starts to warm, you will begin to see different capital projects take shape, moving our community forward.

Workers are busy in the south side of Town as Phase 1F of the Watermain Rehabilitation Project has begun for Algoma and Annette Streets.

Garson Pipe was awarded the tender on April 1, 2016. They were the lowest of the five bids received, coming in with a bid of \$3,804,405 + HST. Funding applications were approved by both the Federal and Provincial governments, which will cover \$2,373,000 of project, leaving the municipal portion at \$1,431,405.

We are all aware of the major repairs needed to the section of Hwy 6 that runs through the municipality. During the budget process, Council moved forward to ensure the crumbling infrastructure was addressed and placed \$285,000 in the capital budget for engineering purposes. The Town applied for funding in the amount of \$256,500 to the Ministry of Transportation, leaving the amount to be levied through the taxpayer at \$28,500. The municipality has since learned that the Connecting Links Funding Application was unsuccessful.

Council and staff firmly believe that this portion of the highway should be the responsibility of the province, as it is a connecting link for motorists and heavily travelled to access areas such as Manitoulin Island, the Bruce Peninsula and areas further south. Council and staff will continue to reach out to the province to ensure our voices are heard and the costs associated with these repairs are distributed in an equitable manner.

Many of you are aware of the issues that the municipality is faced with when dealing with our biosolids. Currently, these biosolids are being transported to the City of Greater Sudbury for disposal. Not only are the transportation fees costing the municipality \$50,000 per year, but the expense of having the City dispose of this waste is costing the municipality an additional \$70,000. Council has agreed to take part in a pilot project that will allow the municipality to manage our own biosolids, eliminating the high transportation and disposal costs. This 2 month trial project comes at no cost to the ratepayer. Once the trial period is complete, Council will review the findings and decide whether this new method of treating our biosolids is a benefit to the community.

Another major project that will be taking place is the relining of the water tower. The scope of work includes tank interior welding and repairs, complete interior lining replacement (paint/coating) as well as exterior paint over-coating of the top only. This work is due to regular corrosion/wear and the new interior lining should last another 15-20 years before requiring relining. The project is scheduled to begin the week of May 30, 2016 and last until July 29, 2016.

The water tower will have to be drained throughout the maintenance and the Espanola Water Distribution System will be fed directly from the Water Treatment Plant by the high lift pump(s). Mandatory watering restrictions will be required above-and-beyond the regular restrictions within by-law No. 1336/98 to ensure that the Town's water demands are met.

A topic that has been discussed frequently is that of an OPP costing. Council has begun to move forward with an OPP Service Proposal for the Town of Espanola and the initial steps have taken place. This is a lengthy process that will take some time before final results are received. We have been advised that Council can expect a completed proposal by Jan/Feb of 2017.

every Canadian to go towards finding a cancer cure. Terry almost made it to Thunder Bay when he learned that the cancer which had taken his leg returned and was now in his lungs. He was forced to abandon the run to get treatment in B.C. Terry's older brother Fred reminisced about that time during his recent visit to Espanola. showing a slide with the last picture he had taken with his brother. The photo was snapped in Wawa. The elder Fox says of his brother, "We did everything together. We loved to compete, and what Terry would want you to know is that he's just like you. He didn't want to be a hero or famous; he just wanted to help other people."

Fred Fox's presentation to the students included many memories of Terry. He spoke of how his brother loved playing sports, any sport, but especially basketball. In high school, he was cut from the school team and was told that he wasn't suited for basketball.

That news only made Terry's determination stronger. He trained relentlessly and eventually his hard work paid off by his securing a spot on the junior varsity team at Simon Fraser University. "The coaches said he was an inspiration to everyone on the team." Fred remembers. "He worked harder than anyone." Fred attributes this work ethic to his parents, who always had expectations of their children. "We learned early on that if we wanted something, we had to work for it," Fred said. Sadly, Rolly Fox, the boys' father passed away earlier this vear at age 80.

The entire Fox family has been involved in keeping the Terry Fox Run going. Thirtyfive countries around the world host the runs, including Cuba, which had 200,000 participants, and Abu Dhabi, with 20,000. Fox ended his speech by telling the children that they can be just like his brother, "Just like Terry, always set goals and never give up on your dreams."

Wildlife Collisions – Reduce Your Risks!

The Ontario Provincial Police and the Ministry of Transportation (MTO) would like to remind motorists of the possibility of encountering wildlife along roadways. Police urge motorists monitor their to speed. particularly at night, avoid over driving the illumination of their headlights and scan the highway ahead as far as possible, with special attention to the road side. Animals can bound out onto the highways unexpectedly, and if you see an animal, slow down and be prepared to stop.

Since January 1, Sudbury/ Espanola detachments have responded to 36 motor vehicle collisions involving wildlife. The OPP would like motorists the take following to precautions to help avoid collisions with animals:

• Watch for the yellow wildlife warning signs that indicate an area of increased risk and slow down when travelling through these areas.

Do not overdrive your headlights, as this will allow you an opportunity to see an animal and stop in time to avoid hitting it.

• Use high beams at night, where possible, and watch for the glowing eyes of animals. If you see this, slow down until you have safely passed the animal and be on the lookout for a second animal, as they often travel in pairs or groups.

• Do not drive while distracted by phones or other activities. Keep your eyes on the road. Just drive.

The higher the speed – the more severe the impact, even a small reduction in speed can make a big difference in a driver's ability to avoid a collision.

The OPP is also encouraging drivers to use MTO's Ontario Traveller Information 511 Services, which provides easy access to up-to-date information on road conditions and road closures on provincially maintained roads. Ontario 511 also provides voice-activated. hands-free service. Drivers are expected to observe Ontario cell phone laws when using Ontario 511 while on the road and are encouraged to pull over to a safe location when using your cell phone to make it as safe as possible.

Recipe

I made this for supper the other night and it doesn't get any easier than this. Cut up your chicken and veggies, stir in the rest of



the ingredients, and pop it into the oven. A one dish dinner without a huge clean up in the kitchen afterwards. I served it on whole wheat tortillas with Greek yogurt in place of sour cream, (it's a great alternative, try it), sliced avocado and tomatoes, shredded low fat cheese and salsa. It's a quick, healthy meal that the whole family will enjoy.



Oven Baked Chicken Fajitas

- 1 pound boneless, skinless chicken breasts, cut into strips
- 2 Tbsp extra virgin olive oil
- 2 tsp chili powder
- 2 tsp cumin
- ¹/₂ tsp garlic powder
- ¹/₂ tsp dried oregano
- ¼ tsp salt
- ¹/₂ can of Aylmer Accents Chili seasonings diced stewed tomatoes.
- 1 medium onion, sliced
- ¹/₂ large green bell pepper, seeded and sliced
- $\frac{1}{2}$ large yellow bell pepper, seeded and sliced
- ¹/₂ large red bell pepper, seeded and sliced

Preheat the oven to 400 degrees. Slice chicken and veggies into strips. Place chicken strips in a greased 13×9 baking dish. In a small bowl combine the oil, chili powder, cumin, garlic powder, dried oregano, and salt. Drizzle the spice mixture over the chicken and stir to coat. Next add the tomatoes, peppers, and onions to the dish and stir to combine. Bake uncovered for 30-35 minutes or until chicken is cooked through and the vegetables are tender .Serve on tortillas with

desired toppings.


