By Chloe Kneer – There was a great deal of emotion expressed at the Rainbow District School Board's public meeting to hear input from residents regarding the closure of Webbwood Public School. The Public Meeting Accommodation Review began with introductions of the school board superintendents, trustees and principals in attendance. Then a slide show was presented with the facts and figures behind the staff recommendation to close the school. "The need for change is financially white "said Superintendent of Schools and Superintendent of Schools and Superintendent of Schools."

"The need for change is financially driven," said Superintendent of Schools Bruce Bourget. He cited declining enrollment and the cuts in pupil funding



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Are We Prepared For The 'Era Of Old Age'?

It's the little things that tell the big story. Obama's health care plan called for Like that image of a little old lady on a corner waiting for a Good Samaritan to help her across the street. Well soon there will be a dozen old ladies on that corner kicking each other in the shins over who's first in line and the Good Samaritan, a.k.a the government, will be a "no show."

That lovely scene of two men playing checkers in the park. Soon there will be more checkerboards than benches in that park because the world's population is aging at an accelerated rate never seen before in the history of mankind. The number of older people is increasing much faster than the number of young people. That's right, The Golden Girls are cancelling Sesame Street so fast nobody cares How I Met Your Mother!

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Espanola Town Council Report

By Chloe Kneer (with contribution from Camilla Kirkpatrick) - Fibre Arts Festival Coordinator Jody Pilon made a presentation to council commenting on the success of this year's festival, which drew over 2,000 people to Espanola for the weekend. The festival celebrated its 5th year and continues to grow.

The Employee Code of Conduct came up once again, but was sent back to the Corporate Services Committee because Councillor Ron Duplessis's assertion that it should be more specific as to who investigates complaints as well as the timelines for making a complaint. Code of Conduct has been an on-going issue of contention, having been sent back to

committee several times so far.

The Espanola Legion got support from council to re-name Highway 6 South between Highway 17 and South Baymouth to Veteran's Memorial Highway. Council recommended that the new name have signage in French in addition to English and Ojibway.

For the second year, council will host an open house with department heads available to speak with residents on Thursday, December 15 at the Espanola complex. The open house welcomes everyone between the hours of 10:00 a.m. to noon, 2:00 – 4:00 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. - 7:30 p.m.

The next regular meeting of council will be Tuesday, November 22 at 7:30 p.m.

by the Ministry of Education as the catalysts for the necessary changes to the board's current structure. Schools having a utilization rate of less than 70% (the number of students enrolled vs. the number of students a school can accommodate) puts them in the poor category. A rate under 50% is deemed critical. Webbwood Public School's utilization is currently at 27%. A.B. Ellis, where the school board proposes to send students, presently has a utilization rate of 76% (with many complaining of overcrowding).

Adding the 51 Webbwood students to the A.B. Ellis roster will increase the utilization rate to 90%. Parents pointed out, however, that S. Geiger School in Massey currently has a 36% utilization rate, and by relocating Webbwood students to that school, the rate would increase to 60%, taking it out of the critical category. Plus, the students would remain in the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers and at a school that isn't as large as A.B. Ellis. Those two factors were repeated many times over by parents who, if given their druthers, would keep Webbwood School open, or, as their second option, have their children bused to S. Geiger in Massey rather than to Espanola's A.B. Ellis.

Two S. Geiger volunteer parents, Cindy Seel and Lyla

Hobbs made an impassioned plea and a read a letter of welcome to persuade educators to consider busing students to Massey, an idea that many said should have been on the school board's radar from the very beginning. Seel and Hobbs talked about the joint skiing trips, track and field days and other experiences, that the two schools have shared. The schools also share the same award-winning principal, Cori Pitre. Those in attendance were astounded that the school board hadn't even collected a key piece of information to make an informed decision about where students would bused: the difference in transportation costs to Espanola vs. to Massey. It was acknowledged, however, that there wouldn't be a significant difference in costs to transport students to either location.

The school board's stance that the decisions are purely financially driven didn't exactly wash with those in the crowd, who say that a sense of community and belonging are much more important to them and their children.

The next steps in the process include a special meeting on November 24 to present the final staff report, taking into account the public input from the session. Then, on December 12, delegations will be able to present at another special meeting. The fate of the school will be decided on February 7, 2017.

Words matter. They mattered when a student emigrated to Canada from Africa and was able to share her unique sense of home with her new classmates through a poem. "The little girl's family had a home through Habitat for Humanity, and she was able to say to her classmates 'you kids maybe haven't seen the other side of this, but know we have a chance to change it. We can make a difference.""

Genworth Canada's Meaning of Home contest gives Grade 4, 5 and 6 students the chance to direct \$50,000 to Habitat for Humanity for use in the construction of an affordable home in their community. Kathy Yusko is the Family Selection Chair of Habitat OGN's Sudbury District Chapter and an account manager with Genworth Canada. She shared the girl's story when asked to recall a memorable contest entry.

"They realize not every child like themselves has a home," said Yusko. "A home can make a difference in the lives of these children because they can prosper and grow." Yusko has witnessed it first-hand throughout her years of service with Habitat for Humanity, including with builds in the Sudbury District and

Calgary.

"My perspective of home has changed. Absolutely it has changed. I understand a house is not just a house, it's not just the four walls. A house is the memories that are created there, it's a home."

The Meaning of Home contest engages students and asks them to use their critical thinking and writing skills to spark a real tangible change in their neighbourhood. "An opportunity to make a difference," said Yusko.

Already students in the region are joining the movement. Habitat OGN Sudbury District Chapter Chair Claudette Strom has visited schools and asked students to enter the contest by sharing their meaning of home. Evelyn, a Sudbury student in Grade 4 writes "Warmth always fills the air and everyone loves to share. Hugs and Kisses everywhere."





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Recipe

I feel like I've seen a million different recipes for this casserole; everyone likes to change it up a little bit. I have a couple different variations myself, but this



one is definitely my favourite. My kids love these potatoes and I try and make them when they are home to serve at breakfast. This is an easy casserole to prepare and take to various gatherings, and why they are also referred to as funeral potatoes.

Hash Brown Casserole (aka, Funeral Potatoes)

- 1 8 ounce container sour cream
- 1 can cream of mushroom or chicken soup
- ½ cup butter, melted
- Two pound package frozen, diced hash browns (thawed)
- 1 1/2 cup cheddar or monterrey jack shredded cheese
- ½ cup chopped onions
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- ¼ teaspoon pepper
- ½ cup bread crumbs
- 1/4 cup melted butter

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Combine sour cream, soup, and melted butter in a large bowl. Add hash browns, 1 cup of grated cheese, and chopped onions. Stir well. Add a shake of salt and pepper. Pour into a 9x13 pan. Mix the ½ cup of melted butter with breadcrumbs. Cover casserole with the buttered bread crumbs and sprinkle with the ½ cup of cheese. Cover and bake for 45 minutes. You can uncover for the last 15 minutes if you want the top browned.
