# **Famous Last Words**

We talk too much, listen not nearly his Spartans were scheduled to play an enough and what we say just before we afternoon game against the University of die tends to become a tag line for life thereafter. The last thing we say on the death bed seems to be the first thing people remember, after you're long gone. Kermit Tyler died last January at the age of 86 in San Diego. He will never be able to shake the four words that haunted him for most of his life, "Don't worry about it."

Tyler was the young fighter pilot on duty at the tracking centre at Wheeler Field on the island of Oahu on the sunny morning of December 7, 1941, when the Japanese fleet attacked and destroyed Pearl Harbor. The two privates working under him had spotted a curious blip on the island's radar system and rushed to Tyler with the news. Knowing the radar system was brand new and expecting a flight of American B-17 bombers anyway, Kermit Tyler dismissed the privates' concerns with: "Don't worry about it."

Within minutes, the most vicious and successful attack ever to occur on U.S. territory was underway, erasing America's entire Pacific fleet of nineteen ships at dock and 188 planes on the ground. There were 2,200 causalities. That's certainly something to be concerned about.

The massive attack on Pearl Harbor was also unkind to the budding career of a college journalist by the name of Sebastian (Scrappy) Squatrito. Not a great football player at San Jose State College, Scrappy was, however, a triple threat in 'name alliteration.' So Scrappy became the sports editor of the student newspaper and just happened to be in Honolulu on December 7, 1941, the day



Hawaii.

Meanwhile, back at San Jose State, Dwight Bentel, the head of the college's journalism department could not believe his good fortune. He ... and nobody else, had a reporter on the scene to witness the greatest wartime disaster in American history!

Bentel anxiously sat by his phone ... which never rang. Days went by and he could only assume the worst - that his intrepid reporter aptly named "Scrappy" had been wounded or killed in the Japanese attack at Pearl Harbor.

Then one day weeks later, to his great surprise Bentel ran into Sebastian Squatrito in the hallway of the college, fit as a fiddle having just returned to the mainland by boat. Suddenly the shocked professor had his young student by his shirt front yelling: "You're alive! What happened?" and finally, "Where's the story?"

Replied the reporter dumbstruck but oddly calm: "There wasn't any story. Didn't you hear? They cancelled the game!"

Those words, innocent as they were, followed Scrappy through life. They also explain why we never heard other words from Scrappy like: "I know it won't be easy but as of today, I will be replacing Walter Cronkite here at the CBS anchor desk."

When you're watching history unfold before your very eyes, at least take notes. Or, like Dick Rowe of Decca Records back in 1962 – just dismiss it with the casual wave of the hand. "We don't like their sound, and guitar music is on the

way out." And that was the end of Dick Rowe becoming the recording manager of a pop band called "The Beatles." Never will he live down those words.

Oueen Marie Antoinette after being convicted of treason by a French court was dragged through the streets to the guillotine scaffold where she had been sentenced to die. Disoriented, she stepped on the foot of her executioner. "Pardon me, sir," she said, "I did not do it on purpose." Those were her final words in life. And of course the executioner accepted her apology on the spot. I mean who can hold a grudge and that person's head in his hands at the same time?!?

A number of famous writers are credited with uttering last words that became quotes which forever defined their lives. Oscar Wilde died in a hospital in France. Ever the guardian of good taste, he looked around his room and said: "Either this wallpaper goes, or I do!" The wallpaper won that one.

And the great Welsh poet Dylan Thomas died of alcohol poisoning in New York after he bragged: "I've had 18 straight whiskies, I think that's the record." Dylan Thomas also wrote 'Do Not Go Gentle Into That Good Night' so to those words he remained true.

Humphrey Bogart also put it on the drink, but with such more modesty and wit. Dying of malignancy of the esophagus and summoning his family to his death bed in January of 1957 he lamented: "I should have never switched from Scotch to Martinis." Seconds later that beautiful friendship between Bogie and the big screen was over.

Knowing the end was near having refused treatment for cancer and noticing two nurses praying for her beside her bed, in 1977 actress Joan Crawford's last words were: "Don't you dare ask God to help me!"

Last words to be remembered are well worth rehearsing. Mine will be directed to my good friend David Hurst and accompanied by a cough: "For chrissakes Doc, I told you I wasn't feeling good!"

# "Birds I View"

By Bob Rigby - I was speaking with a friend regarding last week's winter checklist, and how I had forgotten to mention cedar waxwings and bohemian waxwings as possible visitors to your bird feeder. Lo and behold, last Sunday I had about thirty bohemian waxwings feeding, not at the feeder, but on the scores of decaying apples still left on my tree. I had bohemian waxwings visit the same tree last January, during an extreme cold spell and they wound up staying around for about six days before leaving in the search for more food, no

doubt. There were also several small flocks of cedar waxwings in the area this past weekend. I had someone ask if the small flocks of black and white birds he'd seen are snow buntings. I explained that they could be, noting that I had already seen snow buntings this month. I also pointed out that there has been a huge presence of lapland longspurs, a bird that is similar to the snow bunting, especially in flight when it shows a dark and white body pattern. About the lapland longspur, this small sparrow-sized, Arctic groundnesting bird can often be seen on roadways running in small flocks. Once they take to the air, you notice the dark and white colour pattern. More often than not, once the longspur takes off it will land again only a few hundred metres in front of your car. It will repeat this time after time if you choose to follow the flock. These birds can be seen often in our area during the winter before they head back to their tundra breeding grounds.

# Recipe

I haven't personally made this recipe but it was given to me by a friend who said they really enjoyed it, and thought it would be a great recipe for my column. I love cabbage

rolls and can't wait to try it. It's so much quicker than rolling up individual rolls and equally delicious.

#### I Crock Pot Cabbage Roll Casserole

- 1 1/2 lbs lean ground beef or pork
  (or a mixture of the two)
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 onion, diced
- 1 (15 oz) can tomato sauce, divided
- 1 cup water
- 1 can condensed tomato soup
- 1 (28 oz) can diced tomatoes, undrained
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 1 teaspoon paprika
- 1 teaspoon thyme
- 3/4 cup long grain white rice, uncooked
- 1 head cabbage
- 1/3 cup water
- 1 1/2 cups mozzarella cheese (optional).

In a skillet, brown beef or pork, onion, garlic and seasonings over medium heat until no pink remains. Drain .Add 1 cup tomato sauce, 1 cup water and 1/2 can of tomato soup and diced tomatoes to the beef. Stir in rice, and mix well until heated through. Remove from heat. Chop cabbage into 4 wedges and remove core. Chop into chunks (about 3/4" x 1.5"). Layer 1/2 of the meat mixture and 1/2 of the cabbage in the slow cooker. Repeat layers, placing half the meat and then half the cabbage in cooker. Combine the remaining tomato soup, remaining tomato sauce and 1/3 cup water. Pour over top of cabbage. Cook on low 4-6 hours or just until rice is cooked. Once done, turn slow cooker off, sprinkle cheese on top and let sit 10 minutes to set and melt cheese
