Webbwood Celebrates Town's History

By Chloe Kneer — Canada is getting ready for a milestone birthday, 150 years. It will also be 81 years since Webbwood elected the country's first female mayor. The woman who made history, not only for the town, but the entire nation as well, was Barbara Hanley. When she beat her opponent, R.E. Streich by thirteen votes, her victory speech was, ""I had a four-square platform. I promised to do the best I could. It makes me feel very meek, indeed, to be the first woman mayor of Webbwood. I feel that it is a great responsibility."

Before being elected to the mayoral post, Mrs. Hanley had served for twelve years on the public school board and one year on town council. Early media coverage focused on the question of

you still get a little choked up when you hear Muskrat Love.


- You know you're from Wainfleet if you've applied for a building permit to construct your dream home at Long Beach overlooking the eighteenth hole of Al's Mini Putt.

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"Birds I View"

interest, I thought I would share a conversation I had with a "Birds I View" reader. She said that she found the articles interesting, and that she particularly liked the way I simplify a bird's song, because it helps her identify a bird, even without actually seeing it. I explained to her that there are countless birds that have been named because of the sounds or songs that they make, and that I also use this means of identification when I am out bird watching.

Last week, I mentioned that we'd discuss some feed mixes that would attract birds to your yard, including some that perhaps you've never seen before. I must mention that some locations may not be suitable to attract all species no matter how many different types of food one purchases. However, to get you started, you can visit one of the local feed mills, such as Valley Farm and Feed in Espanola, which carries an excellent finch seed mix, produced by Baden Mills. To this mix you can add your own black oil sunflower seeds to give a good balance of choice for the birds. I also recommend nyjer seed, but placed in a separate, special type of feeder designed for that type of seed. Please do not forget suet and a suet block holder. There are many suet block choices today, and they all attract birds. Suet blocks are best placed in close proximity of your feeder(s).

With regards to the feeders themselves, there are many choices on the market, but personally, I

By Bob Rigby - As a matter of prefer the wooden open concept feeder, to which you can add a couple of handfuls of food each day minimizing wastage. Many feeders are designed on the silo system allowing the birder to put at least a week's worth of food in it. These feeders are good in many ways, but one of the drawbacks is that they allow the birds to throw unwanted seed to the ground. Picky eaters will see the abundant supply and disregard what they don't like. Birds will also often hoard the plentiful seeds and bury them in other places (behind tree bark, under roof shingles, etc.) for later consumption. When this happens, you may see a bird on your feeder for a couple of days, then it seemingly disappears for long stretches, eating the excess that it took away from your feeder. Placement of the feeder is equally as important as the type that you choose to use. If you are using a pole base, try to ensure that it is at least 8 feet high and that a coneshaped squirrel baffle is in place to prevent squirrels from climbing up to it. Try to place the feeder in an area that it is sheltered from wind. If you intend to hang your feeder from a tree limb, allow at least two feet of chain or wire, and again, install a cone squirrel baffle to prevent squirrel access from above. Also, remember not to place your feeder too close to the house, yet still in a good position that allows easy viewing for bird identification purposes or pictures. Next week we'll discuss the birds that you are most likely to attract in this area.

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
In Flanders Fields



whether she would continue her housekeeping duties while serving as mayor, to which she responded, "Webbwood is hardly a big enough place for me to give up my housework just to be mayor." She was a visionary, strongly supporting the establishment of a home for seniors in the Sudbury district. Eventually her efforts led to the opening of Pioneer Manor in Sudbury in 1953. She was also a champion of the under-privileged. One of her first acts as mayor was to support the suspension of the salaries of Webbwood's mayor and council in order to help fund a program to buy Christmas turkeys for struggling families. She was named one of that year's outstanding women by the New York Sun. In all, she served eight years as mayor (the longest-serving mayor in Webbwood's history before being dissolved into Sables-Spanish Rivers Township in 1998) and four years as clerktreasurer of Webbwood before retiring.

After her death at age 76

in 1959, Mrs. Hanley was buried in her hometown of Burks Falls. Her memory lives on in Webbwood and she will be honoured when the specially created red and white tulips break through the soil at the 150th Celebration Garden in the spring of 2017 at Webbwood's St. Lawrence Catholic Church. The tulip bulbs were recently planted, spelling out her name.

Futsal Fun

Futsal, or indoor soccer, is played around the world, but has only recently begun to gain popularity in North America. Larger centres, such as Toronto and Hamilton, have dedicated indoor arenas for the sport, but in northern Ontario, typically teams make use of school gyms under the community use of schools agreements to play through the winter. The sport is a great alternative to hockey, and diehard year-round soccer players take advantage of the more confined playing space to hone their ball-handling skills. Futsal games are played with fewer players and boundaries. The ball can bounce off the wall (so long as it doesn't hit higher than 8 feet from the floor). It is a fast-paced activity, using a smaller, denser ball than what is provided on a big outdoor field. Players wear indoor soccer shoes, or just running shoes, and shin pads.

Espanola Minor Soccer has had its Futsal program in place for four years now. Children take advantage of the opportunity to play recreationally with friends, but there is also a competitive option for those

who are interested. Last winter, the Espanola Phoenix U16 team won silver in the first annual Sudbury Futsal Tournament. The U14 team garnered bronze. They played teams from as far away as Rouyn-Noranda, Quebec. The second annual tournament happens November 26-27 and the Phoenix are hoping to best their results from last year under the direction of Coaches Mark Volpini and Bob Rigby. "We have a great group of kids," said Volpini. "The older boys and girls have been playing together for many years and are very cohesive, and our younger, under 13's are going to be fantastic. They are very passionate about soccer and are already terrific players."

Regular weekly play is Wednesday evening beginning at 6:00 p.m. for those ages 6 -12 at Sacred Heart School with Paul Kallioinen and Will and Chrystal Noble. The 13 – 18 year old age group practices Fridays from 6:00 – 9:30 p.m. at Espanola High School. Registration is on-going (just drop in); EMSA coaches always look forward to seeing new faces.

- 2 Tbsp. fresh parsley, minced
- 1 cup shredded mozzarella

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Cut biscuits into fourths, and place in a large mixing bowl. Add the butter, garlic powder, parsley, and mozzarella, and mix with your hands, coating all of the biscuit pieces. Place the pieces in a muffin tin, 3

pieces per tin (you'll have 2 extra—just use them in whichever tin vou want). Bake for 15 minutes or until lightly browned. Best served fresh out of the oven!
