 Numbers Are The Game*

By Rosalind Russell - David Harrison of Espanola, he's a spry 78, was recently honoured by his peers in the Northern Ontario Junior Hockey League in a very special way ... a trophy was renamed the David Harrison Trophy acknowledging his years of contributing to Canada's favourite game.

Not many people may know it, but Harrison doesn't and hasn't played hockey, but he's more than just an arm-chair fan. It goes back to his post-high school days.

Originally from England, he came to Canada just in time for Grade Nine at Espanola High School. With his mother being a widow, the decision had been made to emigrate and he settled in with family member, Doreen Bourcier. Arriving in the summer, getting used to his extended family, new surroundings, cold winters, yup, a bit colder than 'across the pond', he settled in and began

NOTICE OF A PUBLIC MEETING Concerning Application for Consent

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers will hold a public meeting on **Wednesday, April 26, 2017 at 7:00 p.m.**, at the Township Office, 11 Birch Lake Road, Massey in order to consider a proposed application for Consent under Section 53 of the Planning Act, RSO 1990 as amended.

File No. C-17-05: The purpose of this consent application is to provide for a lot addition in the Residential Zone. The property is described as Hallam Township, Pt Lot 8, Con 6, M38 Block A, Parcel 911. The land subject of this application is not subject of any other application under the Planning Act.

If you wish to be notified of the decision of the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers in respect of the proposed consent, you must make a written request to the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers. This will also entitle you to be advised of a possible Ontario Municipal Board Hearing. Even if you are the successful party, you should request a copy of the decision since the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers decision may be appealed to the Ontario Municipal Board by the applicant or another member of the public.

To appeal the decision to the Ontario Municipal Board, send an appeal form to the Clerk of the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers outlining the reasons for the appeal. You must enclose the appeal fee of \$300.00 for each application appealed, paid by cheque, made payable to the Ontario Minister of Finance.

If a person or public body that files an appeal of a decision of the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers in respect of the proposed consent does not make written submission to the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers before it gives or refuses to give a provisional consent, the Ontario Municipal Board may dismiss the appeal.

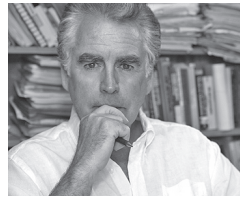

Hughes Not Happy With Federal Budget - No Help With Jobs Or Cost Of Drugs

The federal budget has failed Canadians and Northern Ontarians according to Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing MP Carol Hughes.

Hughes says the budget failed in many different ways, whether it is jobs, healthcare or services for Indigenous people.

Hughes also says Northern Ontarians who have struggled for part-time employment, as well as with rising hydro costs and record household debt, will be disappointed that the budget has no investment towards a fairer economy.

She also says albeit the \$11 billion to be invested in housing over the next 11 years is a positive, most of that money is heavily delayed and 90% of the funding won't be spent until after the next federal election.

Hughes also pointed out that in terms of healthcare, their funding was basically being carried forward from the Stephen Harper plan, and so there is no true investment there for Northern Ontarians.

The next federal election will be on or before October 21st of 2019.

Mike Mantha Nominated To Run For Next Provincial Election - Priorities In The Riding Include Hydro Rates, Health Care, Roads And Jobs, Always Jobs



About 20 faithful party members took in the nomination meeting and riding association Annual General Meeting for the NDP in the Algoma-Manitoulin riding held in Espanola this past Saturday, March 25th at the Pinewood in Espanola.

The vote was unanimous to nominate Mantha to run once again for the party.

First elected in 2011, he has been one of the most active MPPs in the riding over the years having visited literally every single community and First Nation in the huge riding. Mantha graciously thanked the party for their support stating that there might be an early election.

He says following reading an article in the Toronto Star, there is some anticipation that the Liberals could call an election as early as this summer.

Mantha says although summer elections are not popular, the Liberals approval rate is so low right now, a fall election could really hurt them because that is when the trial for the election scandal will be underway and the results of the investigation into the

deleted gas plant emails will also be likely made public.

Mantha says his main priorities for the riding continue to be hydro rates, as well as health care, especially when it comes to home care programs, road maintenance and jobs, always jobs.

He adds the party will be hosting its provincial meeting next month where plans for the next election will be laid out.

If there is no early election called, it will be held in 2018.

Prime Minister To Travel To France - 100th Anniversary Of The Battle Of Vimy Ridge

The Prime Minister, Justin Trudeau, announced today that he will travel to France from April 8 to 10, 2017, to attend commemorations for the 100th anniversary of the Battle of Vimy Ridge.

He will join several of his ministers, as well as David Johnston, Governor General of Canada, Prince William, the Prince of Wales and Duke of Cambridge, Prince Harry, and General Jonathan Vance, Chief of Defence Staff for the Canadian Armed Forces.

"The Battle of Vimy Ridge was a turning point in the First World War and for Canada, when Canadians acted – and fought – as one. At Vimy Ridge, we will mark this great victory, and pay tribute to every Canadian who answered the call to serve. Canada enjoys peace and freedom today because of their sacrifices, for which we are forever grateful," says Trudeau.

More than 650,000 Canadians served in the First World War, which lasted from 1914 to 1918.

The Canadian assault on the German positions at Vimy Ridge

began on Easter Monday, April 9, 1917.

The Battle of Vimy Ridge lasted four days, ending with an impressive Canadian victory. This was the first action in which all four divisions of the Canadian Corps – representing every region of our country – fought together side-by-side on the same battlefield. Of the more than 10,600 Canadian casualties at Vimy Ridge, some 3,600 soldiers lost their lives.

Four Victoria Crosses were awarded to Canadian soldiers for their bravery at Vimy Ridge.

The Canadian National Vimy Memorial was designed by Canadian sculptor and architect Walter Seymour Allward. It was unveiled on July 26, 1936, by King Edward VIII. Inscribed on the base of the memorial are the names of 11,285 Canadians who lost their lives in France during the First World War and then had no known graves.

to live a Canadian life.

"I didn't play hockey in high school, and haven't ever really played it," explained Harrison. "I remember some friends inviting me out to see a local game, everybody went to the games back then, but there were so many people in front of me, I couldn't really see what was going on."

Then came the Spring of 1957 and Art Shannon invited him to tag along with the local hockey team to write a bit about the tournament for the Sudbury Star ... his first taste of journalism.

He loved the writing, but did do some stints at some other jobs, a teller at the Royal Bank, with the Espanola Police Service, the Town of Espanola and eventually settled in with the former Espanola Board of Education. But, the freelancing was his real passion.

"I did all sorts of minor sports back then; bowling, men's football, that sort of thing, and started doing the statistician's work with the then Junior Hockey League," recalls Harris. "I've seen many teams come and go over the years, met many people and I really enjoy it.

"Truthfully, if I had anything to say to the kids out there, it is make sure you get your education aside from hockey. Not everyone makes it to the big leagues ... love and play the game, but keep your options open. They must get an education. On average only about 200 players are drafted every year and that means thousands who are not."

The inaugural presentation of the David Harrison Trophy was made to this year's recipient, Blind River Beavers' rookie forward Anthony Bastianello. In 54 games played, the 16-year-old Nobleton, Ont., native incurred just two minor penalties in total. He also contributed offensively with 18 points by scoring four times and helping set-up 14 others.

The Northern Ontario Junior Hockey League renamed its Most Gentlemanly Player Award for Harrison's work as their long-time statistician and historian.

Harrison has spent many years providing countless hours of service to the NOJHL with his tireless efforts in maintaining league statistics as well as keeping up to date both the NOJHL Record Book along with the archives of its member clubs.

"We at the Northern Ontario Junior Hockey League would like to commend David for his tremendous assistance all these many years," offered NOJHL Commissioner Robert Mazzuca.

"David's multitude of behind the scenes contributions to junior hockey across northern Ontario have not only made a long-lasting impression within our league, but to all of member clubs, past and present, as well as to everyone who has followed the NOJHL the past four decades," stated Mazzuca. "With the renaming of our Most Gentlemanly Player award in his honour, it's a token of the league's appreciation for his incredible assistance and dedication to the NOJHL," added the commissioner. "We look forward to working alongside him for many years to come."

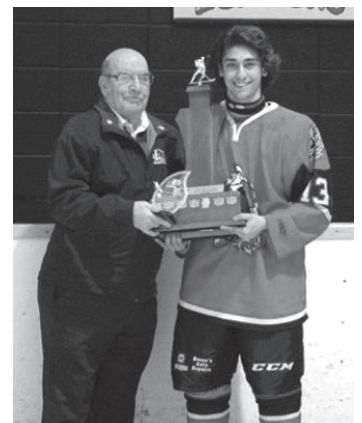

Recipe

An old family favourite re-made with fresh ingredients to make a delicious casserole, perfect for your Easter table or any time you need a delicious side dish. If you have non-mushroom lovers in your family like I do, they can be omitted.



HOMEMADE BROCCOLI CASSEROLE

- 3 pound broccoli florets, cut into bite-size pieces
- 8 tablespoons unsalted butter, divided
- ½ medium yellow onion, finely chopped
- 8 ounces white button mushrooms, finely chopped (optional)
- 5 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 4 cups milk
- 1 teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 8 ounces sharp cheddar cheese, shredded and divided

For the Topping

- 30 Ritz crackers, crushed
- 2 tablespoons unsalted butter, melted

1. Preheat oven to 400 degrees F. Lightly grease a 9×13-inch baking dish; set aside.
2. Bring a large pot of water to boil, add the broccoli and boil for 3 to 5 minutes, until still firm, but tender enough that a fork can pierce through. Drain the broccoli in a colander and rinse with cold water.
3. In a medium skillet over medium-high heat, melt 3 tablespoons of the butter, add the onion and mushrooms. Cook, stirring occasionally, until the mushrooms release liquid and it has all evaporated, about 10 minutes. Transfer to a bowl and set aside.
4. In a medium saucepan over medium heat, melt the remaining 5 tablespoons of butter, then add the flour and stir until the mixture is lightly browned and has a nutty aroma, 1 to 2 minutes. Slowly begin to add the milk, whisking constantly until all of the milk has been added. Cook for 2 to 3 minutes, until the mixture begins to thicken. Add one-third of the shredded cheese and stir until completely melted. Remove from the heat and stir in the reserved onions and mushrooms, then stir in the salt and pepper.
5. Place the broccoli in the prepared baking dish and sprinkle with another one-third of the shredded cheese. Pour the sauce over the broccoli, then sprinkle with the remaining third of the shredded cheese. In a small bowl, combine the Ritz cracker crumbs and melted butter until all of the crumbs are moistened. Sprinkle evenly over the top of the casserole.
6. Bake in the preheated oven until the top is golden brown and the sauce is bubbling, 15 to 25 minutes. Remove from the oven and let sit for 10 minutes before serving. Leftovers can be stored in an airtight container in the refrigerator for up to 2 days.
