





Major Changes In Garbage Pickup Kicks In November In Espanola



Start getting rid of those green bags because as of FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 3, you won't be able to use them anymore in the Town of Espanola.

There are several new rules coming into play in Espanola when it comes to getting rid of waste, and Green Box is a big part of it too.

As of November 3rd, each household is permitted two bags of trash weighing no more than 50 lbs and they have to be clear bags.

You may continue to use grocery bags and white bags: however these smaller non-clear bags should be emptied and placed loose into the clear bag.

Garbage in opaque or solid colour bags defeats the purpose of the initiative.

However, the public is permitted to use one 'privacy bag' in one of their larger clear bags.

Some people may choose to use smaller clear kitchen bags (available at some stores) that can be thrown right into the large clear bag.

Major Changes In Garbage Pickup Kicks In November In Espanola

Friday mornings at 6:00 a.m. Yard waste may be disposed in bags and is counted as part of the two bag limit.

If you have more than the two bag limit, trash bag tags will be available at the landfill site at 1653 Bass Lake Rd.

If you don't use clear bags or have recyclable/hazardous waste in your clear bag your garbage will be left at the curb.

Each business is permitted eight


bags of trash weighing no more than 50lbs, picked up twice per week.

Large items may be taken directly to the landfill.

Tipping fees are \$15.90 per cubic vard.

The landfill is open 9 am to 3 pm, Monday to Saturday and can be reached at: (705) 869-3867.

Dangerous Designation Sought For Espanola Man - McColeman **Sentence Pushed Forward Into September**



It will take a while longer for a dangerous offender status the public to hear what kind of sentence an Espanola man will receive following a sexrelated case, which took over three years to come to court for trial.

Paul McColeman of Espanola, 45, who was convicted last month of several sex-related luring charges involving young boys, made a short appearance at the Sudbury Courthouse on Friday, July 28th, but will return Thursday, September 14th

for hearing.

A judge is to decide that whether to order an assessment of McColeman, which is part of the process in pursuing either

or a long-term supervision order.

Arrested in 2014, July McColeman was convicted following six-week trial held this past June on 34 charges, including communication for the purpose of child prostitution, luring children, sexual exploitation and indecent exposure involving 17 male minors between 2006 and late June 2014 in Espanola. Two of the luring convictions were stayed, leaving 32.

another The Crown alleged during his trial that McColeman up several personas on Facebook and MSN Messenger to contact teenage boys in Espanola and offered them rewards such as drugs, alcohol or cash for participating in sexual acts with him or strangers. The sex acts were referred to as "missions" or "dares" in the messages the teens received, the Crown said.

> McColeman denied having sexual relations with the victims and said he had never even heard of or met some of them. Justice Patricia Hennessy rejected those claims, and even said the evidence of the young males who testified was "overwhelming" as a whole. The dangerous offender designation is intended to protect the public from the most dangerous violent and

sexual predators, and it can carry an indefinite prison sentence.

A judge who hears a dangerous offender application can dismiss it and proceed with regular sentencing. If the application is granted, however, one of three things could happen: indefinite incarceration; the issuing of a defined sentence followed by a long-term supervision order of up to 10 years, or proceed with regular sentencing.

The judge could also rule that the person should be classified as a long-term offender, viewed as a lesser risk to re-offend, and receive a defined sentence with a long-term supervision order. McColeman is being held at the Sudbury jail following a denial of bail in late June after he was found guilty on the charges.

worm with such force that it broke the reel mounting on my rusty rod.

Now I'm trying to get control of the line with the reel dangling from the pole when the trout breaks the surface of the water – this fish is twoand-a-half feet long and feisty. It's a hog!

At this point, Lewis rushes onto the bridge and yells: "Ma! Did you see the size of that !%!#in' fish?" My ears couldn't believe what they had heard but I was quite impressed by the kid's use of literation.

The mother went ballistic: "Lewis! If you ever use that word again, I'll wash your mouth out with ..." Now Lewis is on my left, his mother on my right and I'm in the middle of their fight as they are in the midst of mine with the trout. Even the old man and the sea did not have to land his catch in the middle of Lewis say, "He's not much of a family squabble.

"Every time he comes back from visiting his father, his language is just awful," explained the mother.

I'm trapped. The rod and reel are now useless so I toss them aside while keeping the line taut, using only my hands. I can't get around my other fishing rod – the one baited with – thanks to Lewis – the only sole surviving minnow on Manitoulin Island.

Seeing my struggle, the mother grabs the rod that's in my way and begins reeling it in. Simultaneously, I'm trying to get under her line while she's trying to pull the line back and reach over my head and Lewis keeps saying, "Can we eat the son-of-a-bitch, ma? Can we?"

The mother now takes a swing at the kid, misses and knocks my fishing pole into the creek. But that's okay because I've still got the line tight in my hand.

I come down off the bridge, walk along the bank of the creek and with a mighty heave, I hoist the fighting trout onto land where it spits out the hook and begins flopping around madly in the mud at the edge of the creek. "No!" I scream throwing myself on the fish and getting my hands around its girth just as it squirts between my knees and out past my sneakers. With quick glance over my shoulder, I see the fish flop straight into the stream. I'm shocked. I have the slick of fish on my hands but no fish. I collapse in a heap in the mud and I'm breathing heavy, I want to cry when I hear a fisherman, is he Ma?"

We exchange looks - me and the kid then me and the mother. Then she wisely takes Lewis by the hand and deposits him safely inside her car, thus avoiding any other criminal acts being committed by me that particular day.

On the way back to Gordon's Lodge I picked up a newspaper and the lead story was about Canada building five new federal prisons. They better hurry I thought, because in a few years Lewis will be ready to graduate from "juvy."

The successful applicant would play a vital role in sharing the public's concerns about policing issues in Espanola as well as sharing their ideas for improving the service in town.


However, since that member, if appointed by the provincial government, the town does not take in the applications.

Recipe

believe this recipe originally came from one of my sister's friends. I make it quite often. It is great for bake sales, because it uses basic ingredients that I



usually have on hand, it's quick and easy to prepare and it makes a large pan of squares. It tastes like a brownie but is not as thick as a regular brownie.

Fudge Squares

- 1 cup of butter
- 2 cups of brown sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2 tsp of vanilla
- 1 ½ cups of flour
- Pinch of salt
- 4 tbsp cocoa

Frosting

- 2 tbsp of cocoa
- 1 tbsp butter
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 3 tbsp milk
- Enough icing sugar to make a stiff mixture.

Cream the butter and brown sugar together. Add the eggs and vanilla and beat well. Add the flour, salt, and cocoa and beat on low speed until well blended. Spread into a 9 x 13 greased pan and bake for 30 minutes in a 325 degree oven. Remove cake from oven to cool. Meanwhile make frosting by combining cocoa, butter, vanilla and milk. Slowly add icing sugar while mixing until the frosting becomes stiff. Ice the cake when it's cool.
