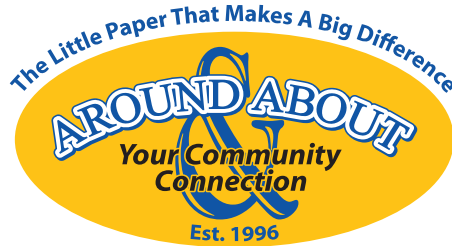

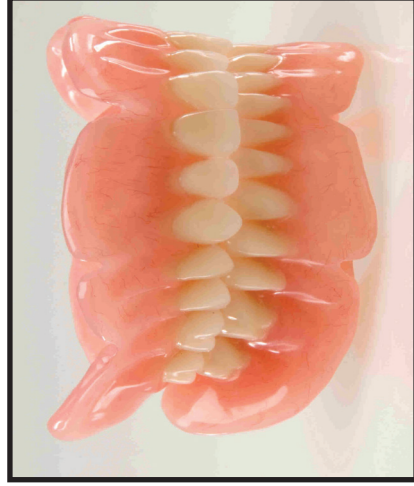

Careful – That Might Not Be A Guy In A Bear Suit

Rare but still dangerous, three black bears were sighted this past summer roaming deep in the countryside of southern Ontario. Full grown and weighing more than 300 pounds, two were spotted near small communities near Sarnia and one just outside Wallaceburg, near Windsor. Bob: "Why he pointed the gun right between my two eyes!"

Sam: "And whaddid you do?"

Offended by the joke, the bear slams the phone down at which point call display on the Nuisance Bear Hot Line gives away his position. Then, using Global Positioning decoder rings, two guys named Bob and Sam swoop down in a Ministry of Natural Resources helicopter and shoot the bears in their collective bums with tranquilizer darts. (I know what you're thinking – somebody should take a dart just for telling that joke, but you're missing the point.)

The point is that if last summer is any indication, bears seem to like the relocation program and they're now on their way. I mean London, Sarnia and Windsor! Fortunately the bear that got as far south as Windsor did not have the exact change at the border crossing, otherwise he'd have been foraging for souvlaki in Greek town and fighting off Detroit tigers.

This forced migration just naturally has to stop before these black behemoths are knocking on our doors for food and scaring the hell out of Jehovah's Witnesses who can rightly claim – they were there first.

At first glance, a plan to move bears from the wilds of northern Ontario to the shopping malls of southern Ontario appears to be the stupidest idea since the wooden submarine but trust me, it'll

double the excitement for children out on Halloween night.

Please don't think of us as ungrateful. I know this was a kind gesture – northern Ontario reaching out to southern Ontario saying "Let's share the bears, OK?" But this is us southern Ontario responding in kind to northern Ontario: "Thanks but we were really hoping for a crate of blueberries and a backup goaltender for the Leafs."

"Birds I View"

By Bob Rigby - Hoping you had a safe and happy holiday season. With no shortage of snow, I thought I would visit a few bird feeders in the area to see if I could spot something out of the ordinary. Unfortunately, it was not to be. In fact, I was amazed not to see, northern juncos, tree sparrows, or goldfinches around. However, I am sure most have you have had pine and evening grosbeaks at your feeder, as there are a few in the area. Over Christmas, I had a reader ask me why there are not many blue jays around this year. I explained that some years we have lots stay behind and other years, they move southward, which is the case this year. Just before the Christmas break I visited my sons in Nobleton, and the blue jays in the neighbourhood are plentiful, as are the juncos, purple finches, tree sparrows, and goldfinches. If you can believe it, I also spotted a

lone robin. My son informed me that there have been a few hanging around straight through the winters. There appears to be no shortage of hairy woodpeckers, but as for downy woodpeckers, I have only seen a couple of pairs. White breasted and red breasted nuthatches are plentiful. I enjoyed seeing a good sized flock of bohemian waxwings in the apple tree eating the old, fermented fruit, they then dizzily went over to my neighbour's small crab apple tree and spent the day devouring what remained there.

Recipe



I have a favourite meatloaf recipe that I have used for years but every once in a while I like to try a different recipe. There are many, MANY different versions of the classic meatloaf out there; some with cheese, some with real bread crumbs, some with or without a glaze. I tried this one last night and I think I may like it more than my old standby recipe. It has a lot of flavour and is moist with a sweet glaze topping.

Classic Meatloaf

- 1- 1 1/2 pounds ground beef
- 1 small onion or half of a larger onion, chopped
- 1/2 cup bread crumbs (Italian adds a nice flavour)
- 1/4 cup Parmesan cheese
- 1/4 cup parsley, chopped
- 1/4 cup milk
- 1 tablespoon garlic, minced
- 2 eggs, beaten
- Salt and pepper

For the Glaze:

- 1/2 cup Ketchup
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon mustard
- Dash of Worcestershire sauce

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. Place all of the meatloaf ingredients into a bowl, and using your (very clean) hands, combine all of the ingredients. Then, in a separate bowl, mix together all of the ingredients for the glaze. Remove the meat mixture from the bowl and form into a loaf, place in a baking dish. Spread about 1/2 of the glaze over the loaf. Place the loaf in the oven and bake for 45 minutes. I take it out of the oven and drain off any fat that has accumulated and then spread the loaf with the last half of the glaze and cook for an additional 15 minutes. Once the loaf is done (internal temp of the meat should be 155 degrees and/or no longer pink), remove from the oven and serve.
