Espanola Man Being Called A Hero - Saves Life Of Another



Andrew Dagg of Espanola saved a man's life earlier this month.

Dagg and his girlfriend, Laura Hunda,

had brought their dogs out for a swim to Little Hannah Lake on Tuesday, July 4th when she heard a splash. Hunda described the rescue.

"I was watching the boat come in, all of a sudden I saw something fall out of the boat and heard a splash. I told Andrew someone just fell out of the boat. We yelled a couple times and got no response.

"We then decided that Andrew should

swim out and see if the person needed help. He grabbed the life jackets, he put his on and took the other in case he needed it."

Meanwhile Hunda called 911 and stayed on the phone until the OPP arrived.

The man had fallen out of his boat.

When Dagg got to the boat, the elderly man was barely holding on to the side of his boat.

He was wearing a life jacket, but after being in the water so long, he was exhausted.

Dagg managed to get him to the shore while waiting for the OPP to arrive to tow them back to the opposite end of the lake where the ambulance was waiting.

The victim has recovered from his ordeal and Dagg is getting a recommendation for a citation of bravery from the OPP.

because "He's Lovin' It" even though he's not supposed to ... finally ushers him out the door. Canuck made international news last month when he did what normally takes 50,000 heavilyunionized workers to do. He shut down Canada Post. Seems it was the middle of nesting season and Canuck became a tad too territorial when he dive-bombed the Postie on that route. Canada Post has stopped mail delivery to Canuck's neighbourhood claiming he "harassed and injured their employee."

Canada Post is now adjusting their motto to read: "Neither rain nor sleet, nor gloom of night ... but that 8#%!@n' crow's a real deal breaker!"

Canada Post wasn't budging last time I looked, stating mail delivery will resume "when it's safe." More than likely they'll use Canuck The Crow as the reason to install yet another community mailbox.

Nobody seems terribly upset by not getting bills in the mail especially Canuck's best buddy and protector, Shawn Bergman. Not long ago Vancouver police were investigating a stabbing and just as they had the crime scene on the street cordoned off with yellow tape, Canuck flew in and stole the weapon. A Canadian Press photographer shot a photo of Canuck with a serrated steak knife in his mouth, looking rather proud of himself. This of course forced an embarrassed Vancouver police detective to use the old "A crow stole my evidence" excuse in front of a provincial iudge.

Manitoulin Man's Criminal Case Tossed Over Police Delays - Court Throws Out Charges Of Criminal Negligence Causing Death In Case Of Massey Man's Death On The Job

A Manitoulin Island man is no longer facing criminal negligence causing death charges after a judge ruled delays in bringing the case to trial were a violation of his rights.

The case dates back to June 21, 2012, when Wesley Gatchell, 49, of Massey was killed in an accident involving a crane in Gordon Township.

Gatchell was working with a crane at a business on Highway 540 when the crane tipped over and struck him.

The Ontario Provincial Police and the Ontario Ministry of Labour both investigated, with the MOL laying charges in May 2013.

Business owner Ron Campbell pleaded guilty in April 2014 to a charge of failing to ensure that a crane was in good operating condition and was fined \$3,500. The OPP laid a charge of criminal negligence causing death in September 2014. But a series of delays meant that his trial was eventually set to begin in October 2017, more than five years after the incident took place.

While some of the delay was related to Campbell's change in lawyers, the judge ruled the main issue in the case was police's decision to wait until the MOL charges were dealt with before laying charges of their own.

The Crown argued the ministry was the lead investigator in the case, and had broader investigative powers. Unlike police, they didn't have to get warrants.

The Crown also argued the MOL case and the OPP case were different, even though they stemmed from the same

incident.

"Although the information arose from the same event and victim, the charges address different societal interests and conduct," the Crown argued.

The judge ruled the OPP caused an unreasonable delay by deciding to wait until after the MOL charges were dealt with rather than proceeding sooner.

"There was no reason why the OPP investigation could not have proceeded in tandem with the investigation of the Ministry of Labour," the judge wrote. "Though the ministry has greater powers of search and seizure, there was nothing precluding the OPP from obtaining a search warrant so that the same evidence could be retrieved. A lack of expertise performing such investigations is not a valid explanation.

"There was no necessity for waiting until after the applicant had pled guilty to the offence under the Occupational Health and Safety Act. Furthermore, it is obvious that the ministry was cooperating with the investigation of the OPP."

While a delay can be considered reasonable if a case or investigation is particularly complicated, this was a relatively straightforward situation, the court ruled.

And an important witness died since the incident, making it more difficult for the defendant to present his case. The judge wrote that people have a right to expect that once they have been dealt with in court, they can expect finality to their legal case. Trying Campbell on MOL charges and then laying criminal charges afterwards was unfair.

Recipe

It's blueberry season in the North and these muffins are a delicious way to use them. The secret to the flavour is the sour cream. Not only are they moist and



flavourful, they also come out of the oven looking pretty. You can sprinkle a little sugar on top before baking for an extra crunch or add a streusel topping. This recipe makes 24 muffins but can be cut in half. Be sure to follow the mixing directions as written to get the right texture and don't over mix.

Blueberry Cream Muffins

- 1 ½ cup granulated (white sugar)
- 1 1/4 cup brown sugar
- Pinch of nutmeg
- 1 ½ teaspoons of cinnamon (optional)
- 1 cup vegetable oil
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 4 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 2 cups sour cream
- 3 cups blueberries



Preheat oven to 400 degrees F (200 degrees C). Grease 24 muffin cups or line with paper muffin liners. In large bowl beat eggs, gradually add sugars while beating. Continue beating while slowly pouring in oil. Stir in vanilla. In a separate bowl, stir together flour, nutmeg, cinnamon, salt and baking soda. Stir dry ingredients into egg mixture alternately with sour cream. Gently fold in blueberries. Scoop batter into prepared muffin cups. Bake in preheated oven for 20 minutes.
