Fundraising For New Park For Seniors Well Underway: Espanola Nursing Home Therapeutic Park



By Rosalind Russell - Conceptual plans for a new park for residents of the long-term care facility at the Espanola Regional Hospital and Health Centre have been released to the public.

The facility announced its plans to build the facility last fall and The Moose 99.3FM CJJM – Espanola launched the fundraising through the annual Christmas Radiothon last year with the first \$10,000 or so, as well as a road toll that is held by hospital volunteers every year on the Labour Day Weekend.

Since then, hospital fund development coordinator, Terri Noble, says the fundraising has been going well now that supporters and donors can visualize the park.

Carol Hughes' column CRTC seeking submissions on rural and remote broadband service

People in rural and remote locations across Canada are familiar with the challenges related to telecommunications connectivity and the wide gap in the level of services when compared with urban centres. While it is easy to be frustrated by the challenges, it is important to recognize when the opportunity to do something presents itself. That is the case with the process the CRTC has undertaken to determine how it will develop and carry out the broadband funding regime it has committed to.

The growth in telecommunications along with the clout that sector carries in the Canadian economy highlight how important these services have become in our modern life. In a best case scenario, new technology can transformative allowing be people to overcome barriers, but in rural and northern Canada the capacity to employ these technologies is itself the barrier. This is why the CRTC has decided it will establish a new funding mechanism designed to close the gap in connectivity.

The plan is to place a service charge on existing customers to finance capacity growth which is similar to how telephone services were brought to rural and remote areas. The CRTC plans to work in concert with other efforts to increase connectivity and expects applicants to secure government funding, provide some funding of their own, and show how services would not be increased without Commission assistance. This is why it is vitally important for the government to be committed to increasing rural and northern services and to back that up with real infrastructure dollars. All of the Commission's investigative work is expected to take place at arm's length so that proposals can be judged on their merit. They are expected to pursue the successful model of non-profit,

third party administration that is developed using a corporate structure. Safeguards to ensure the fund is distributed fairly will include the establishment of an audit committee and a fairness monitor. If all goes according to plan, the third party board will make recommendations based on applications and the Commission will make the final decision on which projects will receive funding.

Eligibility will be based on criteria related to geography and current service. They will attempt to avoid using fund money for underserved areas close to urban centres where the market can reasonably be expected to fill any gaps. Currently about 82% of Canadians have access to broadband Internet service that meets one of the criteria (download or upload speeds, and the yet to be defined minimum quality of service) for achieving the broadband portion of the objective. Once an area is determined to be underserved, those applications are expected to be given more weight.

There is far more contained in the CRTC document than can be condensed to match this format and I would encourage any interested parties and communities to make themselves familiar with the contents which can be found online at: http://www.crtc.gc.ca/ eng/archive/2017/2017-112. htm

Unlike parliamentary which committees cap submissions, and limit testimony, the CRTC is inviting submissions from the public. It is important for interested persons to file an intervention with the Commission by June 28, 2017. Replies to interventions must be filed by July 26, 2017, and final submissions must be received by November 29, 2017. I encourage anyone interested to make themselves familiar with the process which is explained in the document.

Update: More Details On New Access For Cup And Saucer Trail - You Can Help Build It

As A&A has reported earlier, a deal has been struck to ensure the Cup and Saucer trail on Manitoulin can re-open for the summer.

That deal is between an Island municipality and the Escarpment Biosphere Conservancy which owns the land the new trail will cross.

The work includes creating a new access off Highway 540 and then building one thousand metres of a new trail and a parking area.

The proposed route eventually links up to the existing trail.

It's hoped that donations can pay for the work and for more information on how to help financially call 368-3500.

North-Eastern Manitoulin and the Islands (NEMI) Mayor Al MacNevin says the municipality is proud to support the trails, but he is also sending a big thanks to a couple of Manitoulin business people. MacNevin says Randy Noble and Meredith Chandler both say the public can keep using their property to access the Cup and Saucer trail.

"Both Noble and Chandler have allowed public access over their property since the Cup and Saucer trail first opened, but neither business person has even been compensated for use of their land.

"However the municipality does pay the liability insurance in exchange for public access over the joint properties."

Noble operates Randy Noble and Trucking while Chandler is the owner of Health and Safety Matters.

The Cup and Saucer trail will reopen this summer.

The popular hiking trail was in danger of closing because part of it goes through private land and the owner of the main access and parking lot had stated he could no longer afford to keep it open.

"The cost is expected to be between \$125,000 and \$150,000, but we are hoping to off-set some of that with donations of benches, that sort of thing," explains Noble. "We have raised about \$55,000 so far, which also includes a pledge of \$25,000 from the Espanola Lions Club."

Residents are doing their part too. Members of the Espanola Nursing Home Family Council raised \$766 earlier this month bagging groceries at FreshCo. They also raised \$200 serving breakfast to staff.

Noble added at this time they are also selling tickets on the Father's Day Draw, which includes a chance to win a BBQ or Gas powered grass trimmer, gift cards and patio chairs.

"All the money we raise at our annual road toll and in partnership with The Moose and Radiothon 2017 again this December will be used in the development of the park.

"We are hoping to break ground next spring. There is absolutely no funding for this project and every cent must be raised through fundraisers or donations."

Espanola Lobsterfest Held May 27 will also be donating a portion of their proceeds to the project as well.

Many of the residents who will access the park are

Alzheimer or dementia patients and, as a result, can't be allowed to walk outside on their own since they are in danger of wandering off. The park will provide them with a safe, enclosed, friendly space to enjoy all that the great outdoors has to offer.

"Our seniors have earned the right to have a beautiful outdoor space to spend time in," says Noble. "The park has been designed to accommodate all of the challenges that our seniors may have. There will be hand rails, wider walking paths, raised garden planters, shelters, water features and more! We are so excited and appreciate the assistance of the public, businesses and organizations that have and are stepping forward to assist us with this project."

MASSEY WATER RESTRICTION ADVISORY

Massey residents who draw their water from the municipal water supply are being advised of a **complete water restriction** due to necessary work to our water storage tower.

Starting on June 15, 2017 for a five-week period, our water storage tower will be off-line and will remain empty. This means that all water that is being used by the public is being chlorinated and pumped directly into the water line distribution system as it is consumed. THERE IS NO BACKUP WATER SUPPLY IN THE TOWER during construction.

Residents may only use the water necessary within the household for this time period; **no outdoor watering** shall occur. A slight drop in water pressure may also be noticed.

Celebrating 300 Years Of An International Fraternity: Espanola Masons Open House This Saturday

By Rosalind Russell - Many people have heard of the Masons and wonder what they are all about. The common thought is that freemasonry or masonry consists of fraternal organizations that trace their origins to the local fraternities of stonemasons, which from the end of the fourteenth century regulated the qualifications of stonemasons and their interaction with authorities and clients.

Members of these organizations are known as Freemasons or Masons.

The basic, local organizational unit of Freemasonry is the Lodge and this is the case in Espanola where the lodge is 102 years young. The Lodges are usually supervised and governed at the regional level. usually marked by either a state, province, or national border, by a Grand Lodge or Grand Orient. There is no international, worldwide Grand Lodge that supervises all of Freemasonry; each Grand Lodge is independent.

So how do Masons get to celebrate a third centennial this year? Well, back on June 24, 1717, in London, England, four lodges decided to create the Grand Lodge of England and this structure of organization has continued for three centuries and has spread around the world.

Sudbury-Manitoulin District is one of the 42 districts under the jurisdiction of The Grand Lodge of Canada, in the Province of Ontario. This website provides comprehensive information about the programs and activities of the lodges of the Sudbury-Manitoulin District.

District Deputy Grand Master for the Sudbury-Manitoulin District, Jason B. Ashley, explains what the fraternity tries to accomplish.

"Freemasonry is a way of life and is composed of people of all nationalities, religions, occupations and ages. Freemasons believe in truth, tolerance, respect, and freedom. Anyone may petition to be a Mason so long as they meet a

few requirements," explains Ashley.

"Freemasons believe in "making good men better" which implies that its members should seek continual improvement and growth in themselves. There is a saying from ancient Greek times, "Man Know Thyself", and it has echoes in modern day Freemasonry which implies the importance of learning about self. In becoming a more enlightened and principled individual it is most probable that a person will in turn be a contributing member of society."

Masonic lodges existed before that time, but the 1717 date represents the basic, creative step in the overall continuity and agreement of principles that still govern the international fraternity we have today.

The coordinator of planning for the 300th anniversary celebrations at the United Grand Lodge of England, Keith Gilbert, explains how preparations are progressing in the run-up to October 2017.

"It will be a special meeting of Grand Lodge. Apart from some traditional elements, such as addresses and processions, there will be a theatrical extravaganza, which is being coordinated by Gerry Hann, a Past Assistant Provincial Grand Master of Berkshire.

"Preparations and the booking of professional musicians and performers have already taken place. There will be opportunities to dine and take refreshments in the Royal Albert Hall.

"Some 2,000 guests will then go on to dine at Battersea Evolution, where a banquet is being organized by Mark Scholfield, a Past Grand Steward. This will include a reception, wine with dinner, and drinks afterwards."

While the Espanola event might not have been as ostentatious, none the less, it was grand to see people come out to the Open House held last Saturday, June 3rd. Everyone was welcome to come out and join lodge members for a hot dog, pop and a tour of the lodge.

Espanola Youngster Synchronizes Love Of Water With Dance – Ecstatic With A Top Ten Finish This Year

Since September, Sophia Flabiano of Espanola, 10, has been training with Sudbury Synchronized Swimming Club (SSSC) twice a week out of the Jeno Tehanyi pool at Laurentian University.

Her mother, Melanie, says the young Ladies of Sudbury Synchro train at least six hours every week, both in the pool as well as doing cardio, stretching and land drilling (practicing their routine on land). Melanie says they also attend five Ontario Synchro Meets throughout the season. Swimmers also have the potential opportunity to try out for the Ontario Team to represent the Province or even make the Canadian Team.

"This past week, SSSC Teams had the opportunity to compete in 2017 Ontario Open Age Group Synchronized Swimming Championships (OOAGSSC) in Etobicoke with events running from Wednesday through Sunday," recalls Melanie. "This is the largest synchronized swimming competition in Ontario with over 800 athletes and coaches from across our province and others from as far away as Alberta.

During this meet, the athletes are judged on their individual "Figures", a series of four compulsory maneuveres by a panel of six judges for each Figure. This score is then combined (averaged) with the score they obtain during their "Team Routine" (2 panels of 6 judges).

"Their Routine Team event is by far the most fun to watch by far," enthuses Melanie. "Loud music, elaborate swim suits, makeup, gelled hair and an intricate blend of dance, gymnastics and swimming ... it really is beautiful!"

She is especially proud that Sophia's U10 Team won nineth out of 25 teams for their best swim of their careers during Saturday's Preliminary with the U10 Event improving their score to 54.0333 (from 51.9667) at the Central/North Regionals in March.

Sophia had great success during her figures placing an impressive 127th out of 230 swimmers with a new personal best of 54.4168 up from 53.000 in January.

"It seems as though Sophia has found her "thing", as a parent, nothing could make me happier! Their smiles are ear to ear, honestly, I'm still not sure how they can hold their breath when they smile so much!! The competition is intense!

"I've been a hockey Mom before, but "Synchro Mom" has GOT to be the most stressful role I've yet to play (and I work in healthcare)! Thankfully, the entire synchro community as well as our Club, Sudbury Synchro, has been welcoming, friendly and helped guide Sophia and our family through what I refer to as our "Rookie Year""

Next year, Sophia will move up to the 11-12 age division which requires her to practice three times per week. Sudbury Synchro will compete in 5 - 6 meets around the GTA between January and May. The commitment is huge; time, finances and travel, not to mention juggling work, school, family and other commitments.





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

- ¹/₄ teaspoons ground pepper
- Feta cheese (crumbled)
