





Lively Discussion For Improving And Expanding Recreation In Espanola -Next Step Is The Draft Plan



By Rosalind Russell There were only about 20 people at a special consultation meeting focusing on parks and recreation held on Tuesday, February 28th.

Kimberley Wilmot, a consultant with the firm, Sierra Planning and Management, led a lively discussion with several enthusiastic residents, clubs, users and others at the recreation complex Tuesday evening. The firm has been hired by the Town of Espanola to help draft the master plan, which will guide parks and recreational development in Espanola for the next five to ten years.

Wilmot reviewed the process that began last year with an Oracle Poll conducted in Espanola. The primary findings: the Al

This commodity was the first food to be freeze dried and can actually improve your health? Grown in the tropics, one pound of this commodity needs 2,500 gallons of water and one plant can live over 200 years. So...what is the correct answer??? Well come on out to the Espanola Horticultural general meeting on Monday, April 3 rd to find out 1?!?

.....actually the answer is coffee but you are still invited to our meeting on the 3rd. Espanola is lucky enough to have a young man who is a coffee fanatic. Daniel Massicotte has been roasting coffee beans, actually they are berries, in his garage for about seven years. His fascination with the bean was piqued by a friend in the Maritimes and he hasn't looked back since. He started out small ... that didn't last long. He has expanded and started a small business within the last couple of vears.

You have certainly seen and hopefully tasted his home brews at the Espanola Farmers' market. He supplies the coffee at the Spiritual Centre on Anderson Lake, and has just signed a contract with the new restaurant, Ketchup, in town. You can also taste his coffee beans at Roger

Coffee beans do grow on trees and the beans are actually red berries which are picked, matured, dried and finally roasted. Daniel buys his beans from Mountain Coffee in British Columbia. The beans he uses mainly come from Columbia and Costa Rica. He does not blend the various kinds of beans because it dilutes the authentic flavour of the beans. His company, Espanola Coffee Roaster was started in 2016 and has grown ever since. At 400 F., the beans crack and the oils will seep to the surface. After the second "crack"I'll let Daniel fill you in.

Starting out with a small roaster, Daniel has just purchased a much larger one which can roast up to three pounds in 12 to 13 minutes. Coffee, for a long time was considered not healthy! Recently, however, science has proven that coffee does indeed contain important nutrients which do help us. It's the old adage.... everything in moderation.

Daniel will be our guest speaker at the Horticultural Society's April General meeting. This will include a try and buy! Try out the various coffees and if you like, buy a pound or place an order. Secord Trail is a favourite at 41%, but Clear Lake Beach was at only 27%, the sports fields, whether soccer or baseball had good response at 40%, and the fitness facilities at the complex measured out at 33%.

She also pointed out that 48% of respondents believe the user fees for recreational services were not affordable to the average citizen. Wilmot says the consultation meeting is only the first of at least two public forums this Spring. Recommendations for developing the Espanola's Parks and Recreation Strategic Master Plan will eventually make their way to council who will decide whether they are to be incorporated into the future plans for the town.

Most of the people taking part agreed that Espanola has excellent facilities in place, but it is how they are utilized that is a major concern. Most called for more multi-use development for various facilities, such as the recreation complex, which could be used in the summer for gymnastics, BMXing, trampoline or just great game play; a splash pad and opening the pool in summer; the return of the Summer Parks Program; cleaning up the water at Clear Lake Beach, so people can swim safely; building a skateboard/scooter/ rollerblade/BMX park near the soccer fields; more programs at the ski club, especially geared to youth, and that all recreational 'assets' such as parks should be all inclusive, especially for those who are autistic and/or special needs. There was also a strong case made for the return of the recreation committee to work directly with council.

Volunteerism is considered high in Espanola and without it many sporting leagues and other groups would cease to exist, so the development of partnerships and community participation is also of prime importance to those in attendance.

Increasing taxes was a bit of a sticking point as well with most in attendance agreeing they

wouldn't mind paying an extra \$5 to \$10 a year in taxes for it to go to a capital fund for future and/ or ongoing recreational assets for programs, but others were cautious pointing out there are many seniors in Espanola who live on fixed incomes and simply can't afford to pay any more taxes.

Wilmot pointed out there are many ways to raise funds: a surcharge of \$5 when someone registers their child for organized fees with that money going to a central capital fund, sponsorships and support from the business community; government grant programs to offset costs and individual club or association fundraising.

Back in 2010, Espanola was designated a chartered Active Living Community. The council of the day accepted the challenge and the document is to be always considered in all deliberations when it comes to developing recreational programming in Espanola.

Wilmot says a complete inventory of all recreation assets in Espanola will be carried out.

"This includes any recreational facilities: the complex, parks, trails, playgrounds, any open spaces," explained Wilmot. "The other part of the initial study will also include service delivery ... that is marketing, the perception of outlying communities, user fees and affordability."

She will now take the comments and recommendations back to the drawing board and put together a draft document, which will then be brought back to Espanola. There will be another opportunity for the public to comment on the draft proposal before it is presented to council for final deliberation.

The final document is expected to pass into law by late Spring, early Summer, of this year.

Espanola Town Council Report

Water Fees Go Down – Sewer Goes Up – Overall Small Increase For Espanola Taxpavers: At Espanola Council's late February meeting a motion was made to adjust the Water and Sewer Rates for the town. The new bylaw came into effect on Wednesday, March 1st. Effective March 1, 2017, the new residential rate will be \$99.91, an increase of \$1.23/ Of that amount, month. \$54.95 will be allocated to water user fees and \$44.96 will be allocated to wastewater/ sewage.

This is a decrease to water and an increase to sewer charges, which town council says will accurately reflect actual cost allocations.

Recipe

Last month I had tuna casserole for the first time in my life. Many people grew up eating tuna casserole, but I don't remember it being part of my childhood.



In later years, to be honest, the idea of tuna and noodles didn't sound appetizing to me; but I've had a change of heart. My daughter was home from school for a weekend and whipped up the following casserole. I really enjoyed it; in fact, I ate the leftovers for lunch two days in a row. I am now a tuna casserole fan. We didn't have frozen peas when we made ours, so we threw some broccoli florets into the pot that the noodles were cooking in for the last couple minutes. I think this casserole can be tweaked to use whatever you have on hand or adjusted to your taste. Who knew tuna casserole was so good?

Classic Tuna Casserole

(can be doubled for a 9 x 13 pan)

- 10 1/2 ounces cream of mushroom or chicken soup
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise
- 1/4 cup milk
- 1/2 cup diced onion
- 1/2 cup diced celery
- • 1 cup frozen peas, thawed
 - OR 1 cup of blanched broccoli OR both
 - 1 -2 cans of albacore tuna (recipe calls for one, we added 2)
 - 6 ounces cooked egg noodles
- • 1/4 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- salt and pepper L

- ¹/₄ cup breadcrumbs
- (panko are my favourite)
- 1 tbsp butter, melted

Mix the cream of chicken, mayonnaise and milk together in a large bowl. Sauté onion and celery in a frying pan until just soft. (For more crunch, you can also add them raw) Add the diced celery and onion. Fold in the tuna, followed by the cooked egg noodles and shredded cheddar cheese. Add salt and pepper to your taste Place in a casserole dish. Mix breadcrumbs with melted butter and sprinkle on top of casserole. Cook at 375 degrees for about 40-45 minutes, ■ just until the top starts to brown.




