Espanola Conducting Leaf And Yard Waste Pilot Project – Extending Yard Cleanup

The Town of Espanola is extending its leaf and yard waste collection program until Thursday, June 1st.

Originally scheduled for just the first week of May, it has been extended to create more opportunities for residents to clean up their properties and manage the organic waste responsibly, according to Public Works Manager, Joel Yusko. He adds the effort is a proactive measure to prepare for new regulations under the Water Free Ontario Act, which is expected to be enforced in late 2017 or early 2018.

"The act will prohibit all yard waste from entering landfills." The unstaffed collection site located near the ski hill will be open for the public to drop off their yard waste in paper bags. "If residents use plastic bags, they will have to empty them at the site and not leave any plastic bags behind."

Yusko adds the pilot project will assist the town in assessing and planning for the volume of collection and process efficiencies to prepare for the coming regulations.

So How Much Do You Know About The Number "4"?

By Grant Lewis - Who or what are the Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse anyway? How many years are "Fourscore and ten"? Why would anybody be "Four sheets to the Wind"? Is that a good thing or bad thing? What is the significance of finding a "Four Leaf Clover"? In golf, if your hear "FOUR" yelled why do you duck...or is it "FOR" ..or maybe "FORE"... aha, the mystery thickens.

There are countless other references to the number four, but they'll never print this article if I continue!!!

This last one is easy. "I pledge my head to clearer thinking; my heart to greater loyalty; my hands to larger service and my health to better living " Recognize the four H's. A.B. Graham started a youth program in Ohio in 1902. It was called the "Tomato Club" and sometimes the "Corn Growing Club". Jesse Shambough designed and developed the clover pin with an "H" in each leaf...and the 4H movement was off. It was indeed a youth movement since young farmers were more prone to new ideas and techniques in agriculture. Things haven't changed!

The movement arrived in Manitoba in 1913 and was helped by the Department of Agriculture. There were a few requirements for the membership. Age restrictions were enforced. Members were required to complete projects and present them to the group under the supervision of guides. "To do by Learning" was and still is the motto. However, in the 1950's the emphasis shifted from the best potato or calf to contributions to the community. Today, agriculture, food and the environment are crucial but the development of the individual is paramount. There are many urban 4H clubs that tackle non-agricultural topics. Thus, the 4H movement continues to be unique, relevant and always adapting.

Today, in Massey exists a very active 4H club consisting of 20 Cloverbuds, 55 regular members and 15 dedicated guides. Porch swings are being constructed by the "Construction Club". The "Pollinator Club" is studying the importance of pollinators in connection to farming. The "Rabbit Club" and "Dairy Calf Club are self-expanatory. In fact, on June 3rd the Massev Club is honoured to host the 4H "Discovery Days", one of six locations in the entire province.

The Espanola Horticultural Society is thrilled to have as its guest speaker in June, Logan Emiry. Logan was one of ten 4Her's from across Canada to travel to Ghana as part of Canada's Global Service Learning Project. Gardening beading, studying livestock plus much more were all part of this project. He visited schools, farms, and took part in many local 4H projects.

So please join us on Monday, June 5th to hear and see some amazing experiences. The meeting starts at 7:00 p.m. at the Queensway Pentecostal Church. Everyone is welcome.

kept repeating "Holy Crap!" - he was six years old.

The Ontario Provincial Police claimed no one got hurt, but it's likely the kids experienced some neck and shoulder pain from stretching to see over the dashboard. Plus the driver's legs probably cramped up from trying, but not quite reaching the brake.

When the OPP officer asked the driver his name, the six-year-old passenger yelled: "Don't tell 'em, Bobby!" When asked by the same police officer if the car he's driving was a stolen vehicle, the driver replied: "I'm not supposed to talk to strangers."

Also, the six-year-old may need some counselling because ever since the crash, he's only been able to say: "Really? They call that 'joyriding'?!?

Not to encourage the eight-year-old, but I'd have told the police: "Really? That's my dad's pickup? 'Cause it looks exactly like the Tonka Quarry Dump Truck I got for Christmas!"

Or ... "I'm a Boy Scout and my motto is 'Always Be Prepared!' I was just prepping for my Probationary G1 licence, Sir.'

Michael Mantha's News from the Park

Maybe it's just wishful thinking, but it seems that the people of Ontario have woken up now that spring is in full swing and the sun shines brighter. They are suddenly able to better see what is REALLY going on around them. You know, almost every day that I sit in the Legislature I hear the same person sitting across the aisle on the government side, who truly seems to live in an ivory tower. She claims to be just like the rest of us. Day after day I sit across the aisle from Kathleen Wynne and I hear her repeatedly say that she knows what Ontarians are going through when they face their hydro bills. Sometimes I honestly wonder if she has ever opened her own hydro bill within the last ten years. When she says she "gets it" I just want to say, "Sorry Ms. Wynne, but I don't think you get it at all."

As you know the Liberals have been touting their much anticipated Fair Hydro Plan, telling us not to worry - they've got it all figured out now. Kathleen Wynne says that she

knows now what they did wrong and help is on the way in the form of lowering hydro rates 25% by this summer. How you ask? They'll do this by spreading out the pain for generations to follow to pay for us by borrowing the money at a cost of adding an extra \$40 billion dollars to the bill. Furthermore, the savings are not guaranteed for the long term – just the next few years. Just far enough down the road to catapult them over the multitude of hurdles they have put in front of themselves as they head into an election next year.

For months now families, business owners and municipalities have all told the premier loud and clear to stop this wrong-headed sell-off of Hydro One. Yet she is still plowing ahead with her bizarre borrowing scheme, totally ignoring the wishes of the people of Ontario.

And now, just as the Liberals are about to introduce their Fair Hydro Plan to the legislature, a confidential cabinet document was leaked to opposition

members this week which proves beyond doubt that the Liberals already know that their plan will ultimately cause hydro bills to soar by an average of \$72 per month, to an average of \$195 per month for households. In this way we'll all be paying a Wynne Liberal 'adjustment.' After 2021, just four years from now, bills will shoot up sharply. Bills in 2026 will be as high as they would have been without the plan. Then they get higher – much higher than they would have been without the Liberal plan. Bills will rise from an average of \$133 in 2021 to \$215 in 2028, an increase of over 60% in just seven years. This is a faster increase than what Ontario ratepayers have experienced in the last seven years.

This leaked document just serves to prove just how out of touch Kathleen Wynne is. She doesn't really understand that Ontarians are desperately struggling to pay their hydro bills, feed their families and keep a roof over their heads. Her decision to continue privatizing Hydro One will only drive up hydro bills and further damage an electricity system broken by years of Liberal and Conservative private power deals.

The NDP has a plan to get hydro bills down by as much as 30 per cent - and keep them down. That includes putting Hydro One back into public hands. That's still the plan we support.

Also this week, Wynne popped into Sault Ste. Marie to weigh in on the upcoming byelection. While there she boasted that the Liberals are a true friend of Northern Ontarians and we are not forgotten. She backed this up saying how the Liberals have set aside \$2 billion to invest in developments needed for the Ring of Fire to become a reality. (The Ring of Fire is a chromite deposit that, if developed, would create thousands of jobs and billions of dollars in economic development.)

Once again, Wynne is up to her old tricks. She is bragging about how her budget will help the north, while at the same time committing no money at all for the Ring of Fire. The Liberals have a long history of empty promises when it comes to the Ring of Fire. We still haven't seen one shovel in the ground. This week in the Legislature I challenged the Premier to come good on her claims.

When will the premier learn that the people of Ontario see through her desperate political tactics? When will she start walking the walk? People just can't trust what the Premier says anymore.

Sagamok Anishnawbek To Deliver Hospitality Skills Training Program In The Algoma Region As Part Of Provincial Align Network

In response to the critical labour shortages facing many of Ontario's key sectors, Sagamok Anishnawbek and OTEC, in partnership with Ontario Restaurant Hotel and Motel Association (ORHMA), has announced an innovative youthtargeted employment model called the ALiGN Network.

Recently launched across Ontario, the initiative has brought together industry partners from across the province to develop a psychometric-based talent-to-role fit assessment and job-matching model designed initially for the hospitality and tourism industry.

The ALiGN pre-employment skills training program will be delivered at Sagamok Anishnawbek, beginning with a first cohort of 15 participants. Employers throughout the Algoma region can connect with Sagamok Anishnawbek, or, directly with OTEC, to identify and recruit ALiGN graduates.

"Sagamok Anishnawbek is proud to be a contributing partner of the ALiGN Network, allowing us to actively participate in the development of a regional workforce, to successfully respond to the labour demands of Ontario." says Andrea Hajt-Jacobs, ASETS Coordinator, Sagamok Anishnawbek. "This is a fantastic opportunity to be an integral part of building a strong, competent workforce, able to showcase our culturally enriched region."

The ALiGN network will be supported by Ryerson University's Magnet platform to bring this first-of-its-kind youth employment model online, making ALiGN accessible to businesses and job seekers anywhere in Ontario.

Through the ALiGN Network, youth will be matched to live job postings based on their own unique personality attributes and interests. Work-ready job seekers will be fast-tracked into employment. Candidates with skills or qualifications gaps based on the assessment process will receive industry-designed training and certification, either through the network of regional training partners, or, through an online suite of industry training programs that can be accessed remotely.

"The fact that our youth unemployment rate is over 14 per cent in this province while employers are struggling to fill entry-level positions demands that we start looking at things differently" says Adam Morrison. V.P. Projects and Partnerships, OTEC. "Businesses have been telling us for years that, if candidates are the right fit, they will hire them and train them for advancement. We now have a system that matches youth to real opportunities based on their unique attributes, attitudes and goals.'

Key industry partners include Magnet/Ryerson University, ORHMA, Mobilize Jobs, and a roster of prominent, independent and global brands. ORHMA which represents over 11,000 hospitality employers across the province has partnered with ALiGN. Since the assessment methodology is based on a behavioural and attitudinal benchmark established by industry, it will enable ALiGN's employment and training partners to refer candidates to participating employers with confidence in the job seeker's suitability for the position. It will also open up a new pool of potential candidates for employers: youth who might not have experience in the role, but are a natural fit for the work and the industry culture.

"The ALIGN Network will support our members and unemployed youth in the Algoma region," says Tony Elenis, President, ORHMA. "By working with key industry stakeholders and partners, we will address the issues of youth underemployment and labour shortages in the hospitality industry."

Funded in part by the Government of Ontario, with support from the Ministry of Economic Development and Growth, the ALIGN project will represent a significant investment in hospitality training programming for four other regions including Toronto, Ottawa, Thunder Bay and Niagara, while also seeking to address the overall labour shortage Ontario is facing for front line hospitality roles.

McColeman Trial Outcome Extended To Late June

The outcome in the Paul McColeman sex charges trial will be known in late June.

A date of June 20 was set Tuesday at the Sudbury Courthouse for Justice Patricia Hennessy to give her decision in the case.

McColeman, now 45, was facing 36 charges including communication for the purpose of child prostitution, luring children, sexual exploitation, and indecent exposure involving an alleged 17 male minors between 2006 and late June 2014 in Espanola. Two of those charges were stayed by the Crown May 1, leaving him with 34.

McColeman was initially arrested July 10, 2014 by Espanola Police and charged with 70 offences involving young boys.

After getting bail, McColeman was re-arrested in late August, 2014 and charged with breaching his recognizance. In December, 2014, he was acquitted of the two alleged breaches and released again on bail.

The Crown is alleging McColeman set up several personas or identities - Jennifer Johnstone/Jen Pooh and Treber Boucher on Facebook and Hyperchick on MSN Messenger - to contact teenage boys in Espanola and offer them favours such as drugs, alcohol or cash for participating in sexual acts with him or strangers. The sexual acts were referred to as "missions" or "dares" in the messages the teens received, according to the Crown.

In examination in chief by defence lawyer Darren Berlinguette during the trial, McColeman denied having sexual relations with various teen males over the eight-year period, and said he had never even heard of or met some of them.

The trial started back on March 13 and went 23 days. The Crown called more than a dozen witnesses while Berlinguette called nine including McColeman.

Fresh crisp spinach salad is taken to another level with the sweetness from fresh berries and buttery avocado. It is tossed in a sweet and

with crunchy nuts and creamy cheese. This spinach salad is summery and refreshing. If you are making the salad ahead, prep the ingredients and refrigerate. Then dress the salad about 15 minutes before serving. This will help keep the spinach from wilting.

Best Ever Strawberry Spinach Salad SERVES 6

Candied Pecan Ingredients

- 1 tablespoons butter
- 1 tablespoons packed light brown sugar
- 1/2 cup pecan halves
- pinch salt

Dressing Ingredients

- 2 tablespoons granulated sugar
- 1/4 cup extra light tasting olive oil
- 1/4 cup white wine vinegar
- 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon paprika

Salad Ingredients

- 10 ounces fresh baby spinach rinsed, dried and torn into bite-size pieces
- 1/4 small red onion, sliced
- 1 quart fresh strawberries, hulled and quartered
- 1/2 cup fresh blueberries
- 1/2 avocado, cut into bite sized pieces
- 5 ounces blue cheese crumbles or feta cheese

Place a silpat mat or a sheet of parchment paper on the counter top to dry the pecans. In a small skillet over medium heat melt butter. Add pecans, sugar and salt. Stir until pecans are well coated. Stir until the sugar caramelizes, about 3-5 minutes. Spread onto silpat or parchment paper. Separate pecans. Allow to cool. Meanwhile: in a pint size mason jar combine dressing ingredients. Seal and shake until well combined. Set aside on the counter. In a large bowl combine the spinach, onions, strawberries and blueberries. Pour about 1/2 of dressing over salad, and toss. Top with avocado, cheese and candied nuts. Serve remaining dressing on the side. Refrigerate for 15 minutes before serving (or serve immediately).
